## THE HIXSON-WHITE WEDDING WEDNESDAY

An Epoch in Manistique's Social Life—Church Handsomely Decorated—Reception Held at Home of Bride.



An alliance between two prominent and influential families was established yesterday in the marriage of Miss Blanche Virginia Hixson, to Mr. Alan Hubbard White of Meriden, Connecticut, at the Church of the Redeemer.

The ceremony was performed by Dr. J. R. Mitchell, pastor of the church, in the presence of a large number of the friends of the bride. Within and without the decorations at the church were profuse; from curb to building's entrance by an evergreen bordered path and on the body of the church itself to the pulpit, was ordered by tall vases of killarney roses. On these were draped the white ribbons which marked off the aisle for the wedding procession. Stately evergreen trees were grouped at the back of the rostrum which was further beautified by Boston ferns and masses of pink roses. The minstreling was completely covered with branches of evergreens above which the window boxes of snowy bridal wreath were particularly effective. Baskets of the same were suspended

from every arch. Promptly at six o'clock Mr. George C. Grenney began the organ concert which was highly appreciated by a most attentive audience. ## THEY DESERVE MUCH CREDIT.

Swedish Lutheran Congregation Practically Out of Debt, and Possess a Church Edifice That Is a Credit to City.

The Swedish Lutheran congregation is a living example of what can be accomplished if concerted effort is made upon the part of a church membership. The congregation in question erected a church edifice a few years ago, that is considered the handsomest building of the kind in the city. It went into debt for the greater portion of the cost, and has been faithfully meeting \$1,000 payments annually with interest, and the amount has been reduced to \$300.00 of which \$200 represents balance due on the building.

This is a remarkable feat when it is taken into consideration that the congregation in question possesses no rich people, but is made up of almost wholly of men that earn their daily bread doing manual labor at small wages. It shows that they were imbued with the proper spirit, and that they were willing to sacrifice creature comforts of times to pay their portion of the debt. It also shows that it possesses in Rev. A. Nelson, a pastor that has fostered and encouraged this spirit among his flock.

Every member gave a percentage of their income. The maids in the kitchen faithfully paid their proportion, and the women by giving frequent socials and festivals, also swelled the amount.

## A TRAIN BUILT HERE.

The Iron Co. Has Constructed a Palatial Train for Its Woods Operations.

The iron and chemical company have constructed a train of cars in the local yards, for their woods operations, and its appointments are of such a nature, that when the average woodsman hears of it, he will insist on securing a position with the company and living on the train.

The train consists of five cars, each forty-seven feet in length. One is fitted up as sleeping quarters. Another will be utilized for van purposes and as an office. A dining car fitted up not unlike a modern dining car is also a link of the train. A horse car where the horses used in the woods will be quartered is also a feature. Included in the equipment is a mammoth steam sander and loader, and saw mill. The living cars are fitted up with shower baths, hot and cold water, electric lights, and every modern convenience. Every employee will be compelled to bathe regularly, and the fellow that does not believe in bathing will be summarily fired.

The train was taken to the Doty branch Sunday and will be placed in commission shortly.

The train has been lettered by Chas. Adkins, and each car is labeled "I. C. Co., Manistique Division." The train takes the place of permanent camps, with all their lack of accommodations, and can be moved at will, thus obviating the necessity for the men to spend much of their time in walking to and from their work.

## MR. J. D. MERSEREAU DIED TUESDAY

Decensed Was at One Time Manistique's Foremost Citizen, Being Factor in Religious and Business Circles.



Mr. Charles R. Orr received a telegram from Miss Irene Mersereau Tuesday evening announcing the death of her father, Mr. John D. Mersereau, which occurred at Pasadena, Calif., at 8:30 o'clock that morning.

While his death was not unexpected, owing to the nature of the disease from which he was suffering, yet the news that he had passed away, shocked his many friends in this city.

He had been ill for several years, but his ailment did not take a serious turn until several months ago.

Mr. Mersereau came to this city when a youth, and for many years

was identified with the Chicago Lumbering Co. as a stockholder and secretary and treasurer of that company as well as of the Weston Lumber Co.

He was a good business man, and a man of strong religious convictions. He was really the founder of the local Presbyterian congregation, and was the main financial stay of the congregation during the many years that he was identified with that church home.

He was frequently honored by the city and county in official capacities, and was never found wanting.
