## BANQUET LARGELY ATTENDED.

Men Get Together Supper at First Baptist Church Friday Night Great Success.

The second annual Men's Get Together Supper, given Friday evening at the First Baptist Church under the auspices of the Men's Bible class was attended by about sixty five men and was very successful from all viewpoints of view, a general feeling of "get together" spirit prevailed throughout the evening. The tables were set in a square in the Sunday school rooms, which still had the decorations of Halloween, tables had ornaments and decorations of pin pods and leaves.

Mr. H. H. Gaidis was requested to give the blessing and asked every one present to repeat the Lord's prayer with him.

After everyone had done full justice to the many delicious things served before the participants by the hostesses who waited on the tables, the toastmaster, Dr. D. E. Seller, gave a few brief remarks to the effect of bringing the men together at this time when questions of vital importance to every man of the community was at stake.

A male quartette consisting of M. Kendall, R. S. Waters, O. G. Luck and H. H. Hargreaves rendered several selections during the evening. The quartette stood to the inspirations as did the Victorian music given during the banquet.

The first speaker of the evening was Mr. W. T. Cornell, who spoke on "The benefit of Men's organizations" telling of what had been accomplished in the way of shorter hours, better pay and more safety for the laborers.

Rev. P. R. Leach spoke on "What Men Are Doing," in different lines in making a study of various additions and also of the Boy movement and evangelism.

Mr. Asher Fox spoke on "What Men Can Do," saying that in any cause the men don't realize their own power, and of how much more could be accomplished by standing together and support their past.

Mr. C. E. Kelsa, assistant of the pastor in the Presbyterian church and Mr. R. S. Waters, superintendent of the Sunday school in Methodist church were also called on for remarks by the toastmaster and both responded in well chosen words.

## LONG SUFFERING ENDED.

Mrs. Albert Engel was Called Beyond Saturday After Much Suffering.

Mrs. Albert Engel an aged and respected German lady died Saturday afternoon at the county hospital where she had been taken the week before in order to receive proper care.

Mrs. Engel was born in Cologne, Germany, April 17, 1845, and she had been seventy years of age at her next birthday. She came to New York in April, 1865, where for seven years, she was head lady in one of the largest millinery stores on Sixth Avenue. In 1875 during the famine she and her first husband lost \$15,000 in one day, and her husband died shortly after that.

In 1877 she came to Eden, Wis., and in 1881 she was married to her second husband, Albert Engel with whom she came to Manistique, where she resided until her death.

The funeral was held from the home on Cedar street Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. P. R. Leach officiating.

## HUGHES POINT MAN DEAD.

Mr. Lawrence Van Atta Has Attack of Heart Failure and Falls Off Dock.

Mr. Lawrence Van Atta an aged and highly respected citizen of Hughes Point near Hunts Spur, while suffering an attack of heart failure fell off the dock into about six inches of water and was found dead Saturday morning.

The deceased, who is the father of Van Atta Bros, manufacturers of box shucks was in the habit of strolling down to the dock in the evening, despite the warnings of his sons and on Friday evening as usual went out for his walk and failed to take a lantern with him as he usually did.

On arriving at the dock it is surmised that he suffered an attack of heart failure and fell off from the dock a distance of only three feet into the water and succumbed.

Mr. Sven Johnson of this city was notified as soon as the body was discovered and went to Hunts Spur where the body was prepared and taken to this city for burial.

Lawrence Van Atta was born in Bohemia, eighty-five years ago and came to this country thirty years ago landing in Chicago and later moved to Wisconsin, where he stayed until his wife died twelve years ago, when he moved to Hughes Point and made his home with his two sons, Wendell and Frank, who are the only survivors left to mourn his death.

The funeral was held Monday afternoon from Sven Johnson's undertaking establishment and services were conducted by Rev. P. R. Leach. The pallbearers were Robert, Cliff and Percy Laidlaw, Wm. Terrian, Mose LeLoock and Chas. Honcher.

About twenty-five friends from Hunts Spur and Hughes Point accompanied the remains to its last resting place.

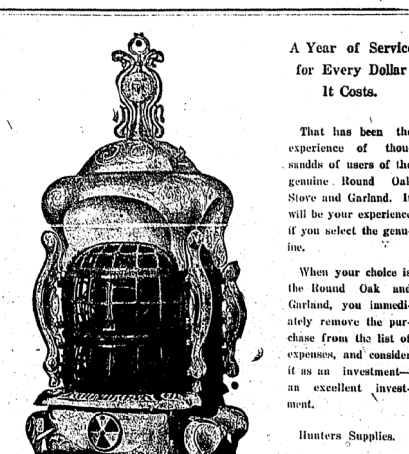

When sending through requisitions for either purchase of the rifle club or the purchase of the rifle club, you should send the name of the rifle club and the name of the rifle club to the Adjutant General of your state so that he can approve and transmit the same to the Ordnance Department to be filled. I am also enclosing herewith a blank to be used in reporting your members' match for the N. R. A. medals as well as blank forms on which to report the names and scores of these members of your club who qualify as expert sharpshooters. A man under the rifle club name. These reports should be sent quarterly, and the copies of the reports you will find in the literature also mentioned.

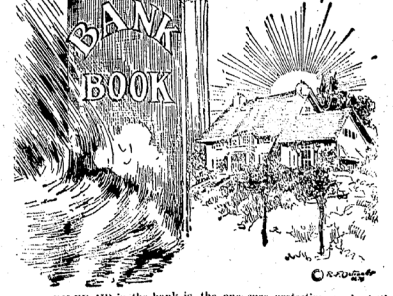
