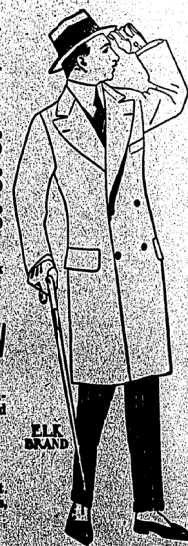

INDIAN TREATY WILL BE URGED.

Delta county may be made "dry" without any action by the voters, was the statement made by G. A. Young, district superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, to The Journal yesterday, continuing, Mr. Young said:

Delta county and a large part of the upper peninsula, is included in the dry limits fixed by an old treaty with the Indians; and it is this same treaty under which so much territory in Minnesota has already been made "dry." A part of Wisconsin also falls within the treaty limits, and the fact is that state have requested the Federal authorities to make the treaty operative in that state.

According to my understanding of the treaty it provides that in territory which includes nine full counties and parts of two other counties in the upper peninsula the sale of liquor shall forever be prohibited.

Edwin Hawden, attorney for the Michigan Anti-Saloon League is now making a thorough investigation of the treaty. It is found that very understanding is being given to the authorities at Washington will immediately be requested to make effective the terms of the treaty.—Excelsior Journal.

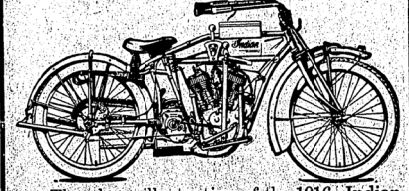

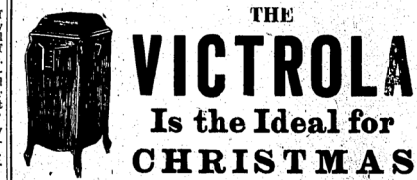
