NO PARKING IN STATE FORESTS

Lansing, Jan. 12.—There will be no parking on Michigan's twelve state forests next spring as the stock at the Higgins Lake Nursery must have at least one growing season before the trees will be large enough for forest planting purposes. Preparations for the first time in twelve years for the first time in twelve years the entire control of the forest is now in the hands of the State Forestry Division of the Conservation Department since two growing seasons for Norway and jack pine and three for white pine are required to produce seedlings which has proven suitable for planting on the state forests.

The activities of the state forest nursery have been considerably reduced during the past two years. The nursery inventory now shows only 100,000 pine seedlings, which is less than half the number for a similar inventory of 1930.

However, despite the curtailment of planting activity, the seedlings and transplants will be available as usual for distribution to individuals and for public school and municipal plantings. Only the small part of the nursery output is disposed of in this manner, and enough stock has been reserved to care for such demands.

The first state forest was set aside in 1902 with a segregation of 36,000 acres. Michigan now has 12 state forests with a net area of approximately 800,000 acres. While plantings were made shortly after the first forest was established, less than 300 acres had been reforested up to 1910. The areas reforested annually increased steadily up to 1927 when 7,500 acres were reclaimed. Since then progress has been even more marked and the 1931 planting of 92,000 acres still stands as a record for the largest area planted by any state in one year.

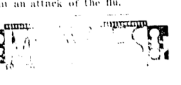

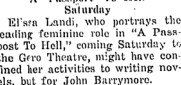

SIMPLE MENUS

The mere expenditure of money does not assure an attractive table nor a delicious meal. Taste in arranging the table decorations and great care expended on the planning of a simple supper or dinner party. There are some dishes so tempting in themselves that they need a few additions to make them absolutely satisfying and if they are served at a table that harmonizes with their general character the hostess who serves them will find herself with an established reputation as an exceptional cook. Menus that follow are typical.

An Italian Dinner

Italy gives us an synonym in many American minds, and when such spaghetti as this is served the reputation of Italy as a source of delicious foods is enhanced. There are other versions of this savory dish—but few more tempting. Salt and pepper to taste. Preparation of this dish is the slow, careful cooking of the sauce.

Spaghetti Sauce For Four People

One and one-half pounds of round steak, ground medium fine and browned; the butter until every particle of the meat is separated but not too deeply browned. Into this is poured the strained, onion, carrot and large can of tomatoes and two cups of water. Add two cloves of garlic and one leaf of marjoram. Salt and pepper to taste. Bring to a boil and then turn down the flame to its lowest possible point. Cook the sauce from five to six hours, stir occasionally and add water as needed to keep the sauce moderately thin. One-half hour before serving add two tablespoons of grated Italian or strong domestic cheese.

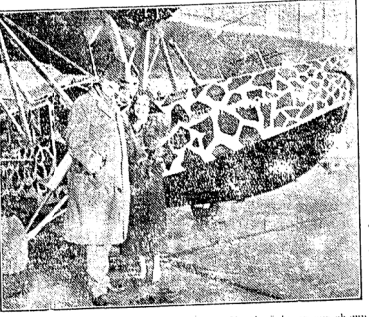

A UTILITY TRAGEDY

Continuing a column which has been followed for some time, the Alabama Power Company in paying its taxes two and three months before they are due, to relieve the pressure on the state and the schools in their present financial plight. FALSE CONFESSIONS

FRIENDLY ADVERTISING

Illustrating the present trend of well advertising, plan adopted by a railroad in the South is interesting.

Recognizing the important function of the local station agent, through whom most patrons of the road have their only contact with the management and its policies, the new advertising policy of the agent in closer touch with his community.

This is done in a quarter-page space in the local paper, with a picture of the agent and a little sketch of his services with the road, accompanied by a recommended matter explaining how he may be of greater service in advising the public concerning their traveling and its problems.

This is in line with the policy of many retail stores, which include pictures of their leading salespeople in their advertising from time to time. There is something about this kind of advertising which commands attention for nothing in the world is more interesting than people, particularly local people.

Intimate, friendly, advertising to the extent of including the picture of the bombastic, exaggerated style so prevalent a few years ago. The new method is more pleasing and interesting—more profitable to the advertiser.

LAST OF THE 600

Although the famous charge of the Light Brigade at Balaklava, immortalized by Tennyson, occurred 78 years ago, on October 25, 1854, the last survivor of that "gallant six hundred" died only recently.

He was Edwin Hughes, a sergeant major, who until his death received assistance from a special fund raised for veterans of that heroic charge, which was an incident of the Crimean War, in which Turkey, with aid from England, France and Sardinia, defeated Russia.

The Light Brigade, composed of 73 British cavalrymen, charged the Russian field artillery over a distance of a mile and a half, losing 247 men and 497 horses in 20 minutes. They cut down many of the Russian gunners, but were forced to retreat in disorder. Their slashing exploit raised the morale of the allies, however, and diminished that of the Russians.

A few days later, at the battle of Inkerman on November 5, 8,000 British held 50,000 Russians at bay in a hand to hand conflict until the French arrived and routed the enemy. Then, after a year's siege, during which the allies suffered untold hardships, the great fort of Sevastopol was evacuated by the Russians and the war was ended. It was during this siege that Florence Nightingale organized the first nursing system in military hospitals.

Thus, while the charge of the Light Brigade was unsuccessful, it was a moral victory which probably turned the tide of war against the forces of the Tsar. It is a stirring memory that Edwin Hughes carried with him during his long life.

ODD SUPERSTITIONS

Superstition rules many people of the world, even in such a common practice as washing clothes. Morocco's women are sure that clothes washed on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Saturday are washed soiler. Rumania's housewives, on the contrary, wash on Wednesdays, but are sure their clothes would turn to blood if they should attempt to wash on Good Friday.

English peasants say a death will occur soon in the family if anyone wakes this the most tragic of all of our religious anniversaries her weekly.

Russian women believe that if they wash clothes at Whitensuntide much-feared water spirits will show their displeasure.

Only in the United States do women have no such foolish ideas. Our wives and mothers make no distinction between the days. Perhaps it is because manufacturers have made it so easy for them to wash whenever they please. With electrical washers in two-fifths of all the wired homes, and other power washers in many thousands of other homes, washing no longer is a task postponed as long as possible, upsetting the whole home when it cannot be further avoided. Cleansing is done swiftly and easily now, and economically, too.

On the Isle of Skye, it is said that a man dies and his family does not wash his clothes, the ghost of a woman will appear and do it for him. That would be a far more tender than those in our rightly equipped homes, but
