SPUD PRODUCTION SMALLER FOR 1932

Michigan One Of Ten States To Show An Increase For Last Year

Production of certified seed potatoes was about one-fifth smaller than in 1931, but slightly larger than in 1930.

Decreases in production were reported in 15 states, the greatest being in New Hampshire, Maine, Minnesota, Wisconsin and New York.

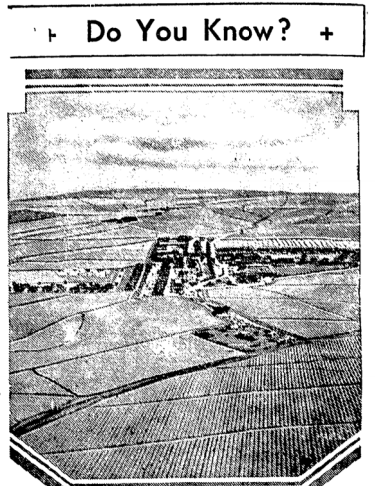
Another potato state of the north, Idaho, had a larger production of Early Ohio Triumph, Russet Idaho Rural and of miscellaneous varieties.

Sales of certified seed potatoes during the fall were smaller than those of a year ago, which in turn lagged behind those of the preceding year.

Prices paid to growers in the more important states ranged from 20 cents to 45 cents a bushel and averaged 47 cents as compared to 58 cents last year and \$125 two years ago.

A. W. STENCIL SAYS SAVE TAX MONEY; WATCH DEDUCTIONS

Through Rate Is Boosted To Four Percent; Says There Are More Deductions

Your head will probably be swimming before you reach the last line on this current income tax return, but here's how to get a little consolation and save money.

You can deduct state gasoline taxes, amusement taxes, state auto license charges, driver's license fees, contributions to churches, educational and charitable organizations, city, county and state taxes except special improvement assessments. And don't forget to deduct the 2-cent tax for every check you made out, the 3 per cent tax on the manufacturer or distributor and the tax on your safety deposit box.

Explaining deductible taxes on above items, William A. Stencil clerk in the Detroit office of the Internal Revenue Department, said an individual taxpayer cannot claim allowance for the federal taxes on gasoline, lubricating oil, tires, sporting goods, soft drinks, cosmetics and automobiles. The tax was levied against the manufacturer or distributor to the customer.

"How will your men check these small tax exemptions?" Stencil was asked. "Taxpayers should keep records, but if the report is reasonable and the exemption not excepted as true. Here's one way they might arrive at an honest saving: Say you drive your car 10,000 miles last year. You get about 10 miles a gallon. You get 1,000 gallons of gas."

Under the new income tax schedule, a single man must pay tax on all income over \$1,000 and married on all income over \$2,000. 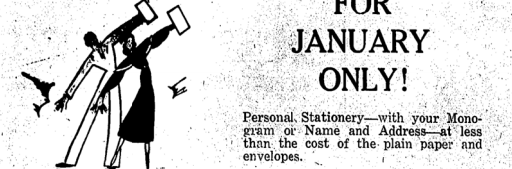

52,157 Persons Arrested In State During Past Year
Lansing, Mich., Jan. 26.—During the year ending June 30, 1922, a total of 52,157 persons were arrested and confined in Michigan jails, according to the annual abstract of sheriff reports recently prepared by the Governor by the Department of State. For 60 years, state laws have required the annual report to be made by the department.

Of those arrested, 15,885 were charged with major crimes, 34,106 with misdemeanors and 2,007 were not charged with any crime. Of 1,774 who were in one Michigan jail on July 1, 1921, 2,307 were convicted and sentenced to state prisons; 983 to the Michigan Reformatory; 2,199 to the Detroit House of Correction; 32 to the Boys' Vocational School and 1 in the Girls' Training School.

The report shows that cost of maintaining jails, traveling and other expenses was \$1,468,741.

New Truck Tax To Affect Farmers
Detroit, Mich., Jan. 24.—The country's farmers, the largest single group of motor truck owners in the United States, are likely to be most affected by legislation which probably will be introduced during the next few months in 42 states to further restrict, regulate and heavily tax trucks, according to Harvey C. Froehach, Detroit, known highway transportation figure.

Mr. Froehach recently completed an exhaustive study of highway transportation. His statistics show that 26 per cent of the motor trucks in operation today are owned by farmers.

"Much of the legislation to be introduced in the 42 states," Mr. Froehach said, "is being widely exploited as a cure for many of the ills suffered by the country's railroads, which contend that motor trucks and trailers are hauling much of the freight that formerly went to railroads."

Must Register And Mark Milk Bottles
Lansing, Mich., Jan. 26.—Few persons know that the Department of State is charged with the duty of registering names and distinctive markings of milk bottles. This duty is conferred by Act 361 of the Public Acts of 1927.

A company desiring exclusive use of words or marking on milk bottles must first file a copy of the desired marking with the county clerk of the county in which the company is located. Then it is mandatory under the law for the company to advertise its insertion for three weeks in some newspaper in the county. Upon certification of these facts to the department the words and markings are registered.

Birds Must Have Grit With Feed, Or Else Starve
Washington, D. C., Jan. 26.—"Supplying grit is just as important as supplying food. A bird may starve to death with full crop unless it has grit to grind it up," according to the advices of the Connecticut state board of fisheries and game.

"Remember the gizzard," the American Game Association reiterates in urging sportsmen and other nature lovers to feed birds during the snowing, "for a bird cannot make his food available without grinding it up in his gizzard and it takes grit or sand to grind it with; the gizzard only furnishes the muscular action."

This is proven by the birds themselves. Hundreds have been seen flocking to rural roads after snowstorms to get grit.

Sportsmen throughout the snow belts fed many tons of cracked corn and cracked wheat during the last big snow in December, but only a few of them remembered to include grit with the food.

About 10 per cent of animal and vegetable commercial feed should be thoroughly mixed with all grain mixtures to be scattered, and small gravel should be placed separately in a red, at winter feeding stations. The birds will find it.

Recognizing the value of bird life to agriculture and to all rural sections, the United States post office department has issued orders to rural mail carriers to feed wild life where the feed is furnished to them.

Farmers Will Get Long Sought Wish
East Lansing, Jan. 26.—Those farmers who have often said they would like to see one of those well-looked duties out on a farm where he had to make a living can have that opportunity at Michigan State college during Farmers week Jan. 29 to Feb. 9. When two of the speakers on the soils department programs are a graduate physician and a graduate from a University of Michigan, who are operating successful farms in Michigan.

N. P. Beebe, Niles, a graduate of the law department at the University of Michigan, deserted the law when his health failed and started growing cranberries near Niles, Mich. 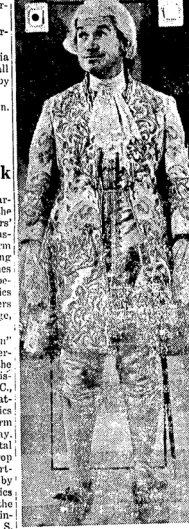
