Technocracy Given This Explanation

Ann Arbor, Feb. 9.—"Technocracy," the idea of a nation run by scientists and engineers, one in which machine and material as well as man, will be the source of energy required to do various jobs, in which industrial organization, national business, social and social customs would be naturally "planned," certain, some to the scientific community, has a disconcerting side. It is not only aspects of human nature and should have even its scientific claims carefully checked before we accept it as the next step after democracy, stated Professor E. L. Shariman, chairman of the department of economics in the University of Michigan, in an interview.

"While a road building machine may be possible which, worked by three two-man shifts will tear up and relay eight miles of 60 foot pavement in 24 hours, and while it may be true that similar machines might be performed right and left if engineering was given a free hand, they will get little popular backing, if it is necessary, as the technocrats demand, that the country be placed under a dictatorship of technical experts. It is probable that the people would junk the machines before they would submit to any such new technocracy of the trained few. The technocrats need more psychologists, sociologists and philosophers just now in their ranks, who know that human nature is a scientific fact as well as are power driven machines."

"Neither is it at all clear that our price and cost system is due to be displaced by some unit such as the electric kilowatt hour, whose nature and use is entirely vague. The technocrats have also governmental the number of men who are permanently thrown out of work by the machine. That large numbers are re-employed in new industries is common knowledge. Perhaps the best contribution of technocracy will be its energy survey. If this is accurate, it will furnish a background for reasonable change as well as for the millenium the technical enthusiasts predict."

"Technocracy is a vague term, apparently meaning a government by those who are skilled, "a reign of science" or "government by experts." Nothing very terrifying, although there seems to be an impression that to its proponents it implies domination and perhaps destruction of society by the machine, says Professor Alfred H. White, head of the chemical engineering department of the University of Michigan.

"Figures presented by the technocrats showing the recent great changes in industrial life through the application of science do not tell us anything distinctly new, but they do step upon new ground when they blandly state with little evidence, but as if self evident, that these figures imply the doom of our present economic system. Howard Scott, leader of the movement, holds that, it is the fact that all forms of energy, of whatever sort, may be measured in units of ergs, joules or calories, that is of the utmost importance. The solution of the social problems of our time depends upon the recognition of this fact. Here we have a statement of elementary physics coupled with another of apparently tremendous importance. The two, however, have no obvious connection, no evidence to show how a recognition of the fact that energy may be measured will bring about a solution of our social problems.

"Again the technocrat says, a dollar may be worth more, in buying power, so much today and more or less tomorrow, but a unit of work or heat is the same in 1900, 1925, 1933 or the year 2000. This merely states a very obvious and well known fact, and implies that units of work required to manufacture an article are the proper standards of its value. Yet

a crank shaft of soft steel, heavy and unsatisfactory, which requires more work to make is much inferior to the lighter and superior alloy steel shafts now in use.

"Investigations showing the effect of scientific developments and of the technocracy machinery upon the modern world are of value, but sweeping and apparent pronouncements about the effect of these upon the present organization of society are to be deprecated."

Some idea of what can be obtained from working a statement by John Royal, vice-president of the National Broadcasting Company Association, as Mr. Royal made is turning to the "producer" of the "Birth of a Nation" film, emphasizing the D. W. Griffith style of presentation. Mr. Royal intends to look all N. B. C. affiliated stations in the larger cities throughout the United States and have a "progressive" drama. Assisted by music, casts in the different cities would put on scenes from the drama of the evening so that there would be no break in the continuity. When heard over the air, the play would sound much like "The Birth of a Nation" appeared in the films.

Another sample of this "mass" effect in radio is now being used by the sponsors of the "Townsend Munk's Mystery," now heard over N. B. C. and WJML every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday at 10:15 p. m. More than 40 players appear in each 15-minute episode. But the most unusual part of the entire drama is that two negroes take the lead—for the first time in radio's history! Heretofore, negroes were seldom if ever employed, their parts being taken by imitators, as is the case in "Amos 'n' Andy." It is the first time that any drama has had adult negroes in important parts. The reason for the departure is undoubtedly due to the presence of Octavius Roy Cohen, who is writing the stories, especially for radio and who writes about negroes in most of his stories.

The mention of negro actors brings to mind the reaction of colored folk in Chicago when a station here presented a children's program with one of the chief characters of their race. The negro newspaper extolled the station expansively, praising it for its action in "doing right" and the historic ability of the colored race. "Emancipation, finally!"

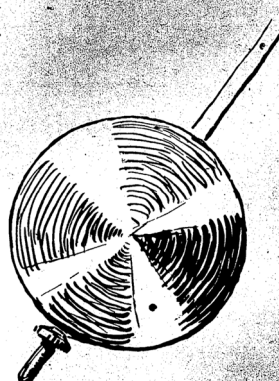
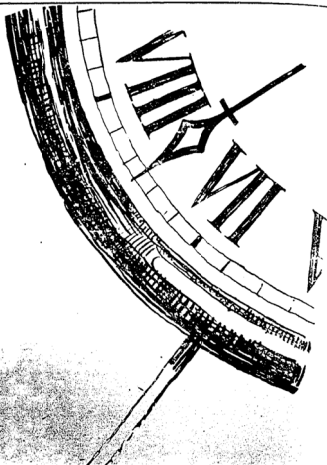

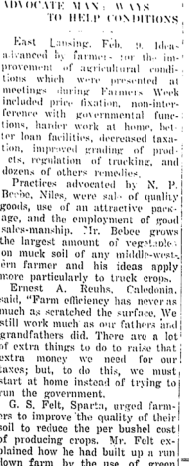

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REDUCE EXPENSES IN CONSERVATION

Director Cuts Down Personnel and Activities of the Organization

Lawson, Feb. 16.—Declining to show a defect at the end of the fiscal year, and experiencing an unprecedented drop-off in expenditures, Director Geo. R. Hogarth of the Department of Conservation has announced further reductions in personnel and activities of his organization.

All of the Divisions of the Department are affected by the reduced economies which were placed in effect at the beginning of February.

The budget of the Parks Division was lowered by \$2,000, through savings to be made in maintenance of state park equipment and personal service.

Release of new motion pictures by the Educational Division will be halted until the department's financial condition improves and other educational work will be curtailed.

No replacement of films now used in the motion picture loan service will be possible. A savings of \$5,000 will be accomplished by the Forestry Division in reducing replacement and maintenance of equipment.

Because some reduction has been made in the budget of the Geological work amounting \$5,000 of this amount.

The extension of pheasant rearing fields will not be operated this year and no new equipment for the state pheasant rearing, the Mason Game Farm will be purchased.

Replacement of forest fire fighting equipment will be reduced by \$8,000.

The budget of the Fish Division has been reduced by \$10,000 for the remaining five months of the fiscal year.

This will be accomplished through the elimination of three or four trout feeding stations, and the discontinuance of service in hatcheries; discontinuance of noxious fishing crews; shortening the active season of the National No. 1, and postponing repairs to buildings and fishing equipment.

Because of a reduction of \$10,000, the ranks of 25 conservation officers have been reduced, five have been removed from the payroll and 20 others are on furlough.
