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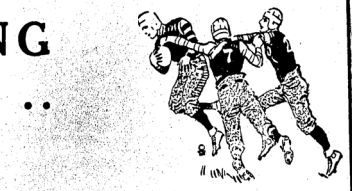

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THE "BUY NOW" CAMPAIGN

The co-operation of the consuming public and retail merchants is asked by President Roosevelt in his gigantic "Buy Now" campaign which is just getting underway.

The purpose of the purchasing drive is to give impetus to the National Recovery Act, in the nation-wide effort to increase employment and elevate commodity prices and wages.

While appealing to consumers to increase their retail purchases as far as they are financially able, the President emphasizes that responsibility for the success of the campaign rests largely on manufacturers and retail merchants.

In his announcement of the campaign, he appeals to manufacturers to expand their national advertising campaign and calls upon retail merchants to increase the amount of advertising space they have been using in the newspapers.

The President's drive to increase commodity sales will be successful only insofar as manufacturers and retailers make use of additional newspaper advertising space, and if they fail to heed the President's advice, retail sales will not increase to any great extent above the normal average.

Details Of State's New Auto Financial Law Are Explained

This is the first of a series of "question and answer" discussions on the subject of Michigan's Financial Responsibility Law—Editor.

Q. What is the purpose of the Michigan Motor Vehicle Financial Responsibility Act?
A. The purpose is two-fold (1) To provide compensation for the innocent victims of motor vehicle accidents, and (2) to increase safety on the streets and highways by the grading and elimination of the reckless and irresponsible driver.

Q. What penalties does the law provide for a criminal violation of the law?
A. A criminal law violator is not only subject to revocation of his operator's license but may never thereafter drive or own an automobile in the State of Michigan unless he can give "proof of financial responsibility" for a three-year period.

Q. What are penalties for the so-called criminal law violator?

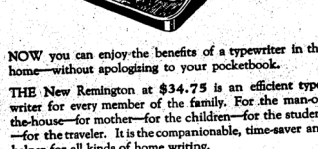

STANLEY CLAUSEN, ESCANABA PRESS MANAGER HERE, WAS LOST IN WOODS

After spending all night in the woods between Barque Point and Little Harbor, without a fire and inadequately clad to keep out the rain and cold, Stanley E. Clausen, manager of the Manistique office of the Escanaba Daily Press, was discovered by a searching party shortly before 6 o'clock last Friday morning.

Mr. Clausen, who left about 4 o'clock last Thursday afternoon to go on a partridge hunting, was overtaken by darkness in the woods about a mile and a half north of Little Harbor, beyond Thompson. Realizing his inability to make his way out of the forest in the darkness, he built a fire about 6 o'clock Thursday night. Shortly afterwards, however, he deserted the fire, believing that he could get out of the woods by walking in the direction of the moon. Instead of reaching a road or stream, however, his moon-directed wandering brought him into a swamp where he became hopelessly confused in the dense undergrowth that shut out the moonlight and made further progress impossible.

Determined to spend the night as comfortably as possible, he gathered some twigs and started a fire, but accidentally dropped his remaining supply of matches on the ground nearby. The fire went

ended a night of painful anxiety on the part of Mrs. Clausen and friends, he spent the most of the day catching up on sleep and recuperating from his experience. He returned to work Saturday morning.

A searching party of about 25, headed by conservation officers and representatives of the sheriff's department, was organized Thursday evening after Mr. Clausen failed to return. The search was conducted by scouting the trails in various parts of the county in search of the lost man's car before 1 o'clock in the morning he thought he heard an automobile horn, and fired three shots. The direction of the horn sound, however, was confusing, as it was intermingled with the cry of a loon from a different direction. It would have been impossible to follow the sound, anyway, in the darkness. Earlier in the night, after he realized his predicament, Mr. Clausen also fired several shots.

During the remainder of the night, the lost man managed to get some intermittent sleep, but the chill of the air practically nullified any effort to rest. About 6 o'clock in the morning it started to rain. About a half hour later, shouts of the searching party drew closer and Mr. Clausen was able to walk to them.

One leg had been torn from his trousers during the night, and his leg was badly scratched by bushes necessitating medical attention. After returning home, where his

PORK ARRIVED SATURDAY FOR COUNTY NEEDY

15-Ton Carload Arrived For Distribution To Six Peninsula Counties

Allocation Of Schoolcraft's Share To County Units Is Announced

Manistique township, 4 crates; Doyle township, 4 crates; Hiawatha township, 4 crates; Seney township, 2 crates; Thompson township, 2 crates; Inwood township, 3 crates; Mueller township, 2 crates; city of Manistique, 25 crates.

Distribution of the pork to needy families in each township will be under the direction of the respective supervisor, while the local welfare agency will oversee the city disposal. Schoolcraft county relief commission trucks will transport the meat to the townships. The amount reserved for the city will remain stored in the county infirmary basement.

Indigent persons receiving the pork, according to instructions issued by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, are to receive the free meat in addition to regular relief. With their allotment of pork they will receive circulars showing a dozen different ways in which the meat may be prepared into tasty dishes.

The meat, it is understood, consists of choice pork cuts, processed by the dry-salt cure in established packing plants throughout the county.

The pork was received for distribution to the counties of Michigan through the efforts of Governor William Comstock and Fred Johnson, state relief administrator. Processing, packing and arrangements for distribution to the various states for relief purposes were made by the Federal Emergency Relief Administration in cooperation with the Agricultural Adjustment administration.

According to word received from Fred Johnson by W. G. Stephens, chairman of the local welfare relief commission, another shipment of pork will arrive here in November.
