Stiffer Penalties For Game Law Violations Reported in Michigan

A reaction that began during the summer when evidence of more severe penalties for the violation of conservation laws became apparent, continued through September, according to conservation officers who in fines paid in and accumulated jail sentences reached the highest figure reported for two years.

While a year ago more than 50 per cent of the convicted violators were placed on probation or were let off with suspended fines, less than a third of the 236 men convicted in September this year received such treatment, the report indicates.

The report shows that 236 convicted violators paid a total of \$1,211.52. Jail sentences reached an aggregate of 1,456 days.

Twenty-two violators were paroled or were placed on probation; 54 were given suspended fines and two violators appended their cases to the circuit courts.

The increasing severity with which local justices of the peace are dealing with conservation law violators, is an indication that the public is awakening to the amount of damage that is being done to Michigan's game and fish resources by ineffective sentences that have been given violators in the past two years, Director George B. Hogarth said.

There is no doubt that the number of game and fish law violators has increased enormously in the past two years, due partly to the fact that violators realized that they would be dealt with leniently in the local courts where they received some sympathy on their pleas of needing the illegally taken game for food, Director Hogarth said.

The attitude being taken by local courts together with steps that the Department is taking to tighten enforcement in addition to two men, six traps and in cleaning up a situation that

had developed into one of the most critical that conservation in Michigan has had to face, he stated.

With 236 violators convicted in September, 150 were for breaking game laws; 79 for violating fishing laws; four for breaking trapping laws and the rest for miscellaneous violations.

Fifty of the violations were for carrying loaded guns in hunting areas during the closed season for taking small game. Those taking and keeping undrized fish followed in number.

The violations of various laws together with the number convicted for each violation in September were as follows:

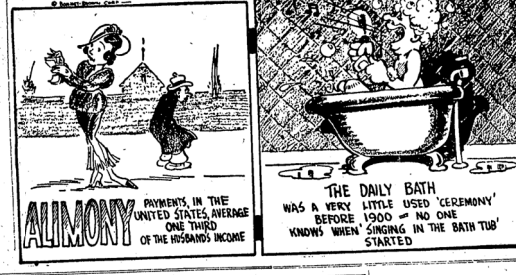
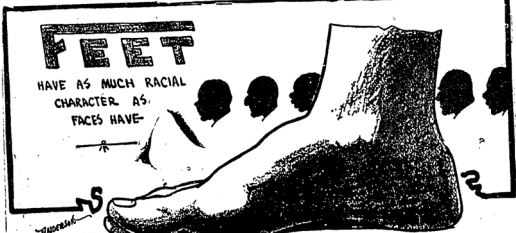
Loaded gun in automobile 4; illegal possession of venison 7; head lighting deer 4; hunting deer in closed season 5; loaded gun in game area 50; fishing trout without a license 1; nonresident fishing without a license 6; possession of undrized fish 29; selling game fish 1.

Shooting game in a wild life sanctuary 1; illegal possession of partridges 3; using nets to take game fish 13; taking trout during closed season 3; fishing with borrowed license 1; buying fur without a license 1; failing to report fur 1; taking muskrats in closed season 5; possession of fox squirrels during closed season 8; starting a fire without a permit 1; claiming without a license 6; trapping muskrats in closed season 2.

Shooting song birds 3; killing game bear in closed season 1; illegal possession of raccoons 1; taking turkeys during closed season 1; training dogs before legal time 6; negligence in care of fires 1.

Economic Highlights

Happenings that Affect the Dinner Table, Dividend Checks and Tax Bills of Every Individual, National and International Problems Inseparable From Local Welfare.

Power—Steady and continued electric consumption have been registered in practically all parts of the country.

Chemicals—Activity has been affected by declining production in the major productive lines which constitute the market for chemicals. Demand was dull so far as paints and varnishes were concerned, with a seasonal increase in alcohol orders. Prices have been

Farm—The August wheat movement, because of the short crop, was comparatively slight. The month's receipts were down 27 per cent as compared with July and wholesale wheat prices declined. Corn prospects were slightly better. Hog receipts were much higher than before, and sheep and lamb receipts likewise showed improvement. Butter receipts showed the usual seasonal decline.

Food—Production in the food processing industry declined 8 per cent in August, with allowance made for the customary seasonal change. However, activity was 8 per cent above a year ago and employment and pay roll levels were encouraging.

Lumber—Continual in receipts of new orders has caused an increase in stocks on hand and a lessening of production. Prices continued to advance, as did payrolls and employment.

Iron and Steel—Steel production declined during August, and still sharper drop followed during first half of September. Orders have come in slowly. Unfilled orders of U. S. Steel at end of August were lowest since April.

Textiles—Though production has slackened, August production was the best in payrolls and employment.

Credit—The most significant recent change in the credit situation is that open-market purchase of U. S. Government securities by the Federal Reserve has increased. Purchases rose to a weekly rate of \$35,000,000, as compared with \$10,000,000 previously. The Federal credit expansion drive, which includes liberating of assets in closed banks, is apt to work sudden and unexpected changes.

Securities—Market action has been confusing and unpredictable. Generally speaking, stock prices have advanced, with exchange quotations on the dollar. Among bonds, high-grade domestic issues have stood up well, and issues of foreign gold standard countries have advanced.

Foreign Trade—Exports have declined and imports increased. The outlook for increased exporting is not bright at the moment.

Construction—Contracts jumped 28 per cent in August, due principally to public works and utility undertakings. Building activity, however, is lower than it was last year or the year before.

Transportation—There was a contrasessional decline of 6 per cent in freight traffic in August, save the decline continued through September. However, comparison with the months preceding July, and with 1932, are not favorable.

Automobiles—Production schedules dropped in September, but less than seasonal trend. Sales were indicated. Demand at end of month was holding up well.

Autumn—In August, while sales were weak, the month was not as bad as August level since
