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Bill Hooker Writes of His Old Friend, Chase Osborn, Sage of Sault

In the Wisconsin News of recent date, under the heading of "Earlier Lights of Milwaukee" Bill Hooker writes the following about Chase S. Osborn, who is so well known and loved here: "Old friends must together sigh." So an old German friend used to say; and that was when Chase S. Osborn, one time governor of Michigan, was a sidekick of mine chasing the festive news flow up and down the streets and alleyways of Milwaukee—away back in the 80's. So, having been identified with my affairs in the early years of the last quarter century, to the extent at least of helping the best free lunches and beating to form routes of these places, when he writes to me to day and says he read the story about George Peck and remarks that "it is perfect," we feel like telling our daily followers.

call him nowadays, is at the moment slowly moving southward in his car to his winter home at Poulain, Worth county, Georgia, where he owns an estate called "Poussin Lake in Poussin Lake." Here with his daughter, an educated chauffer who drives his Pierce Arrow, and a few Negro servants, Chase Osborn spends the season in the wilds where pines grow, and a few bears crash around the chauffer's also where he reads, and from which place he travels to colleges and other educational institutions to expound his philosophy of life from the rostrum. And he does it all for the love of it, treating the matter of compensation with something approaching contempt. For he is having already given away, \$17,000.00 in cash, securities, forest lands and islands, is pretty well healed, though, as he says, he has reduced his pile to a size that

easy to handle, and in doing so has made hearts to be glad. This includes his alma mater in Indiana—Purdue—Michigan university, the University of Mississippi, and other educational institutions.

It may interest readers of "Earlier Lights" to know that Chase Osborn as a young man—he is now 74—came to Milwaukee about from Chicago where he had been working as a dishwasher, in a W. Madison St. collar restaurant which is now a hotel, in a building that catered to the riffraff of the lodging-house neighborhood in which it was located. He was just looking for a job, and he didn't care what it might be so long as he could earn enough to pay his rent and lodging; so when a dealer in real lumber and wood employed him to drive a span of horses he was elated, even though the wages were small and the unladen lumber, coal and wood to the man's customers.

But one day a piece of news broke over on the South Side, and he drove his team to the curb on Virginia St., where he sat on a horse block with a pad of paper then he dropped into the office of the Evening Wisconsin, told the city editor about it and handed him what he had written. The editor read it over carefully, and turning to the sanctified teatimer said:

"Young man, why do you drive a delivery wagon when you can write like that?"

Chase Osborn replied that he had never had any experiences as a reporter, but that he had a good notion, and was a lover of literature.

Here's where Chase Osborn began his newspaper career, which ended so far as Milwaukee is concerned, as city editor of one of the newspapers. Then he bought a country paper in Florence, Wis., one of the booming iron mining towns of the north, established the Mining News, cleaned up a gang of bandits, closed several "stock" programs he had for a long time had up his sleeve. He put a bag of grub over his shoulder, a hatchet in his belt, took a rifle in his right hand and marched into the wilderness.

First, however, he had been studying geology, which he mastered by reading the works of Chamberlain and others in a short time, so he knew iron ore when he ran across it. But he was several years doing this, and during his forays into the wilderness he found time to publish another newspaper at Sault Ste. Marie—the News, now a daily.

But his excursions into the wilds

finally included the north shore of Lake Superior before there was a pair of important cities called Port William and Port Arthur. And then one day, when far from a human habitation, with a crust or two left in his grub bag, his miniature pickax turned over what he instantly saw was a fine grade of bessemer ore. In a few weeks he had acquired ownership of the land and found himself in New York city—in Wall Street to be exact, in consultation with men of great means and who were coming in on the bessemer they could find, it meant \$3,000,000 right off the bat for my reporter pal and he let go of only a small part of his find.

Then began a whirl around the world which ended only a year or so ago, after there was no more of the world for him to see, for he had been in every civilized part of the world, and visited the undeveloped parts, and existed every iron mine in existence.

It wasn't all traveling, however, for he found time to write a number of books that have made his name known in almost every language. These included the "Iron Hunter," an autobiographical work that reads like a novel, and his "Madagascar," a classic in historical research that has been published in eight editions in London. In doing this job he lived in Mandanville for two years, mostly out of doors, and frequently in great peril. His story of the "man eating tree" and his discovery of a grass in the earth that extends from one continent into another, and which has interested all great scholars are part of this wonderful work. Every dollar he got from publishers for his books has gone to charitable institutions.

Do you wonder that Chase Osborn came to see me once a year and puts his feet under my dining room table; and that we go together to look at the somewhat dilapidated cottage on Eleventh St. just across Wells, that was his home 60 years ago, and that we sometimes take a snapshot of it? Or that we spend hours of a night talking over not only four youthful experiences here, but of what the whirling of time has done to both of us?

Chase Osborn has no use for money except for the actual ordinary necessities of life; so he has reduced his chattels to two homes, one on Duck Island, Chippewa county, Mich., and the other at Poulain, has invested in an annuity, and has no cares of great wealth.

Former Resident Passes In Garden

The death of another former well known Manistique resident is chronicled with the passing of Joseph N. Chenord, 66, at 5:45 o'clock Monday morning of last week in the Garden hospital. A complication of diseases was given as the cause of death. Mr. Chenord had been in failing health for the last six years.

The deceased was a resident of Manistique Heights for 25 years and for the past eight years he operated a gasoline station at Garden Junction. He was county surveyor for 30 years and about 12 years ago he served two terms as supervisor of Hiawatha township.

Mr. Chenord was united in marriage to Miss Goldie Byers of Hiawatha, on December 14, 1905. She survives him.

He is survived by his widow; three daughters, Mrs. Norma Gnefc, of Iron Mountain, Mrs. Frank Weber, of Manistique, and Miss Elizabeth Chenord, of Iron Mountain; a sister, Mrs. Frank Sliven, of San Francisco; two step-brothers, Louis and Thomas Francis, of San Francisco; four grandchildren and several nephews and nieces; two cousins, Dr. T. W. Scholtes and Joseph Berubo, of Manistique.

Funeral services were conducted last Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock from the St. Francis Sales church, with the Rev. B. J. P. Schevers officiating. Burial was made in Fairview cemetery under the direction of Gunnarson and Kefauver.

Queer Answers Are Given In Quizzes

The conservation department is learning something about what the average individual in Michigan thinks of various conservation problems.

As the result of five competitive examinations recently held to obtain additional conservation officers, 650 examinations papers, each listing the answer to seven questions were turned over to the Division of Field Administration for grading. The examinations were written by men whom the department considers to represent a fair cross section through the state.

In answer to a question asking the number of counties in Michigan, 101 papers were read before a correct answer was given. The number of counties, in the opinion of most of those examined ranged from 29 to 95. In answer to a question as to the counties farthest apart, one man replied "Chippewa and Kalkaska."

More than a majority of those examined replied to a question for a definition of the duties of the department of Conservation, that the Department's sole function was to enforce game and fish laws. Few considered any other duties as existing or necessary.

"Paranoia is a disease of Africans," one paper stated, while another hazarded that "nose fly is a disease of trout fishermen."

A meander line is a line to which books are allotted, one individual answered while another stated that "perjury is that which cleanses." Several papers expressed belief that conservation laws were made by Congress.

With completion of the correction and grading of all papers and tabulations as to the results of oral examinations made at the line of the written examinations, appointments to fill the positions sought to be filled, are expected to be made soon.

For three days we bucked adverse weather conditions—but wouldn't be convinced that they had us licked until the old car refused to plow through a couple feet of snow. When the gears let go, we figured it was time to call a halt and reconcile ourselves. That, briefly, is the story of our hunting trip.

We passed up perfectly fine deer territory below the Straits, where a light snowfall offered fine hunting, to answer the lure of distance and seclusion. Away back in the lake-dotted swamp-lands of the Sturgeon, we believed the bucks were bigger and more numerous than in any other part of Michigan. When we got there, we found that the snow was also deeper than anywhere else, and that it had snowed steadily for 10 days. Another foot of snow fell the night after we arrived.

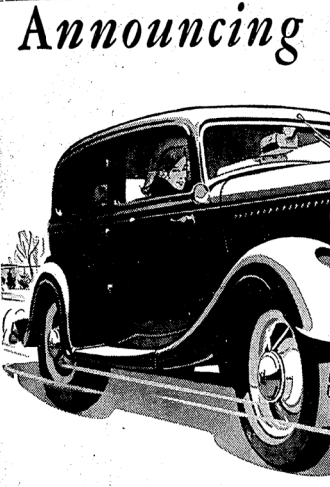

Report of Engineers Outlines Features of Sewage Disposal Plans

Modernization of Manistique's sewer system, to comply with a Michigan law and to provide work for local unemployed persons under the lenient borrowing facilities of the national public works administration, is contemplated by the special municipal election on Monday, January 2, when local taxpayers will be given an opportunity to express their views on issuing self-liquidating revenue bonds to finance a sewage disposal plant and general obligation bonds to defray the costs of installing a system of badly needed storm sewers in the main residential section of the community.

An outline of the two propositions, which will appear on one ballot at the election, is graphically presented in the preliminary report submitted recently to the city council by Shoecraft, Drury and McNamee, Ann Arbor consulting engineers, who made the sur-

vey of the present sewage disposal facilities. The report, which has not been published heretofore because of its length, is as follows: The report outlines a complete system of sewage collection and disposal together with a system of relief storm sewers for carrying away surface water in those districts which are most in need of better drainage facilities. In addition to the descriptive matter in the report there are two drawings, one of which is a map of the city showing existing sewers and the general location of new sewers and sewage treatment and disposal works, and the other is a general plan of the sewage pumping station and treatment plant. Plans for these new structures have worked out in a preliminary way in sufficient detail for the making of preliminary estimates of cost sufficient for consideration by the city in working out a plan of fi-

Present Sewerage The city is sewered on the combined plan with sewers ranging in size from 10-inch to 24-inch. Under this plan of sewerage both the sanitary sewage from buildings and storm water run-off from streets and roof areas are carried in one system of sewers. This type of sewer system is the most common one and when properly designed and built serves a city's needs in an acceptable manner.

The present sewers as a rule are somewhat shallower in depth than in general they are deep enough to serve the basements of residences and other buildings. On the east side of the river the presence of rock fairly close to the surface of the ground precludes the construction of deep basements and results in shallow sewers with no necessity for deep sewers built down in the rock. On the west side of the river, however, rock does not occur close to the surface and sewers could be built at deeper depths but the type of development is such that deep sewers are not as the rule required.

The principal difficulty that is experienced with the present existing sewers is that they are too small to carry away storm water quickly. This results in flooded streets during periods of heavy storms of rapidly melting snow. The only remedy for this condition is to provide more sewer capacity by the construction of relief sewers.

The sewers are adequate to carry the dry weather flow or sanitary sewage which comes from houses, stores and other buildings, but the points of discharge of this sewage into the river and lake are such as to make nuisances at several points. There are three sewer outlets into the river, one on the west side which carries all of the sewage from the west side of the city, one opposite the foot of Oak street and one opposite the angle in Arbutus Avenue on the east side of the river. Another outlet at the foot of Range street and one at the easterly end of Garden Avenue discharge into Lake Michigan directly. The Range street outlet is immediately adjacent to the city park and bathing beach which is being developed and is an especially serious menace to public health.

The type of sewage disposal system which should be provided for the city is determined by the

extent of the nuisances created by the existing sewer outlets and the needs of the city's bathing beach and shore of Lake Michigan. The city's water supply is taken from Indian River with an intake a mile or so above the city. The city's sewage, therefore, has no effect whatsoever on the public water supply. The most serious situation is that of the pollution of the bathing beach and the unsightly condition of the river and shore of the lake caused by the discharge of untreated sewage into these waters. The type of sewage treatment recommended to remedy these conditions is one which will remove and dispose of the solid materials in the sewage and will sterilize the liquid effluent during the bathing season in the summer. This effluent should be discharged into the river and be diffused in the river water which will carry it into the lake through the harbor entrance and effect an adequate and permanent purification of the sewage after it has been treated to remove the solid material.

Sewage Collection and Disposal System

In order to treat the sewage from the entire city a system of collecting or intercepting sewers must be provided to carry the sewage to one point for treatment and disposal. Several plans have been considered for collecting and disposing of the sewage, but after careful estimates of cost and a thorough consideration of all feasible plans the one described herewith is recommended as the best and most economical plan. A general plan of this sewage disposal system is shown on the accompanying map.

An intercepting sewer, starting at the intersection of Saginaw street and Garden avenue, is planned to follow the route of U. S. 8 Highway to the sewage treatment plant site near the mouth of the river. This sewer will take the flow from the Garden avenue sewer which now discharges into Lake Michigan and will also provide an outlet for the area on the east and south sides of the city which will develop into residential areas with future growth and development of the city. It will also pick up the flow of sewage from the Range street sewer now going into Lake Michigan.

The sewage from the west side of the city now discharging into the river just below the pulp and paper company plant will be carried in an intercepting sewer starting at a point just east of the intersection of Beaver street and Chippeva avenue and turning southeasterly crossing the river on the east side, and from thence in a southeasterly direction paralleling the east bank of the river to the sewage treatment plant site.

This intercepting sewer will also pick up the flow from the two outlets now discharging sewage into the river from the east side. A small sewer is planned extending from the Brown Lumber company plant northerly into the proposed intercepting sewer at a point where it starts into the river crossing.

These intercepting sewers will be built of vitrified sewer pipe, except the river crossing which will be built of cast iron pipe laid in the bed of the river, and so designed that the flow of sewage will be controlled so as to give self-cleaning velocities, and to meet the pipe force of deposits. Provision will be made in addition for flushing out the river crossing in case serious deposits should occur.

At the sewage treatment plant site there will be built a structure consisting of sewage pumping station and sewage treatment plant of the type shown on the accompanying drawing. In this plant the sewage will be pumped by means of motor-driven centrifugal pumps, automatically controlled by float switches, into a grit chamber where sand and gravel will be removed and from the grit chamber through a screen for removing trash and debris and coarser solids from the sewage. From the settling tanks the sewage will be discharged into the river through an outfall sewer and diffuser in the flowing water. During the summer months the settling sewage will be sterilized by a liberal application of liquid chlorine before it is discharged in the river. The solid materials which are removed by the screen, together with any oil and grease that accumulates in the settling tanks, will be burned up in an incinerator which will be installed in the plant. Sand and grit from grit chamber will be hauled away in a truck which can be loaded inside the building.

Solid materials removed by the settling tanks, in the form of a thick sludge, will be pumped into a sludge digestion tank for bacterial decomposition and digestion. The gases of decomposition will be collected in the covered digestion tank and utilized for fuel for heating the plant and the digestion tank and for operating the incinerator above mentioned. In a tank of this type 4,000 to 5,000 cu. ft. of gas per day will be produced having a heat value somewhat greater than that of commercial gas. The fuel value will be equivalent to that of about one ton of coal per week. The finally digested sludge will be removed from the digestion tank and dried on glass-enclosed sludge drying beds from which it will finally be removed and hauled away as a low grade fertilizer.

Every part of the sewage pumping station and treatment plant where sewage or sludge may be exposed to the air will be covered by substantial buildings so that any odors which may occur will be entirely under control. A simple ventilating system will be installed where by gases of decomposition as well as the air in the building will be discharged well above the ground through a ventilating chimney. In this way the plant, with proper operation, will be absolutely odorless and there should be no cause for criticism of it by the public. The plant itself will be built of substantial brick and stone construction, architecturally pleasing in appearance and substantially built. The grounds around the plant will be so spaced and landscaped with shrubbery and driveways making a pleasing appearance in harmony with the park development contemplated east of the plant along the lake shore.

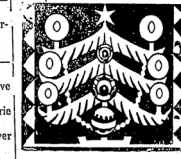

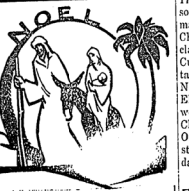
