





Still a source of pride

With the Fourth of July and the Bicentennial Celebration upon us

With the Fourth of July and the Bicentennial Celebration upon us increasing attention is paid to the history of the nation. It is a history which although troubled, is still a source of pride. When the Declaration of Independence was signed in 1776 the colonies still faced five years of fighting and it was two more years before the Treaty of Paris was signed with Britain in 1783. It was still five more years before the colonies ratified the constitution in 1790

still five more years before the colonies rating the constitution in 1788. From that tumultuous beginning was formed a nation with a constitution which has survived and even strengthened by events which would have torn other nations apart. Among other things we have survived a civil war and scandals which have reached to the

among these are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness. cursory study of those words reveal something of the thought of the time

Notice the capitalization of the words Rights, Life, Liberty and

Notice the capitalization of the works Aigns, Life, Libery and Happiness. These words became the basis for war with England and eventually the Constitution of the United States. With the increasing involvement of government, these 200-year-old phrases should become watch-words for today. History has repeatedly proven that freedom, once oblained, is not always maintained. Unless it's guarded jealously it can all too easily slip

maintainet: oness it's guitate the features in the cost of star away. The Declaration, a document penned in the spirit of revolution, urges revolution when a government takes these rights and freedom from its people. "...that whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive to these Ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its Foundation on such Principles, and organizing its Powers in such Form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Sector and Unspinces. Safety and Happiness.'

Something so drastic as revolution has not been necessary for the protection of our freedom. This is due primarily to the involvement of the people, in their government. Through our right to vote, change can be effected in an orderly fashion.

change can be effected in an orderly fashion. In recent years various groups have attempted to effect change through violence and revolution. A case in point were the demonstrations against the Vietnam War. Arrests were made for violations of law, but still the demonstrators had their freedom to voice their opinions. They were eventually a major influence in the changing of public opinion which in turn caused a change in government policy towards Vietnam. A second example of the system at work was the resignation of, Richard Nixon. Whether guilty or not of the charges, his effectiveness as President of the United States was lost. His resignation, forced by public opinion brought the nation back together.

together. In both cases and countless others, a major role was played by the nation's press. Throughout history newspapers have been alternately praised as the watchdog of government and criticized for conducting trials in their pages. But what would have happened to Watergate and related matter had it not been for newspapers? A free and independent press is essential to a free and independent people in any country. Thomas Jefferson, the major author of the Declaration, said once that if given a choice between two institutions by awould tabe
