If you remember a dessert as long as I have remembered this one, you know it is outstanding to have made such an impression. This dessert was served at a church circle ten years ago - I don't even remember at what house it was held because the hostess has long since moved away from Manis-

tique. I do remember that Sally Ott was the co-hostess and she made this dessert for the occasion. It is really a special treat and no other word better describes it than "Yummy." It is as pretty as a picture, also. So, if you want a dessert to serve for something special, try this ice cream pie.

### CHOCOLATE FUDGE PIE

- 1 quart vanilla ice cream
- 1 box vanilla wafers
- Pecans
- pinch salt
- 6 oz. chocolate chips
- 1 cup miniature marshmallows
- 1 cup canned milk

Melt together salt, chocolate chips, marshmallows and canned milk. Stir until smooth; set aside and cool. Remove ice cream from freezer and let it set until spreading consistency (do not let it get soupy or it will get grainy when you refreeze it). Line a 9 inch pie pan with vanilla wafers. Layer 1/4 of the ice cream (about 1 cupful) over wafers. Cover with a layer of chocolate sauce that has cooled. Continue for 4 layers, using up all ice cream and chocolate sauce. Garnish with pecan halves on top. Return to freezer to harden. Serves 6 to 8.

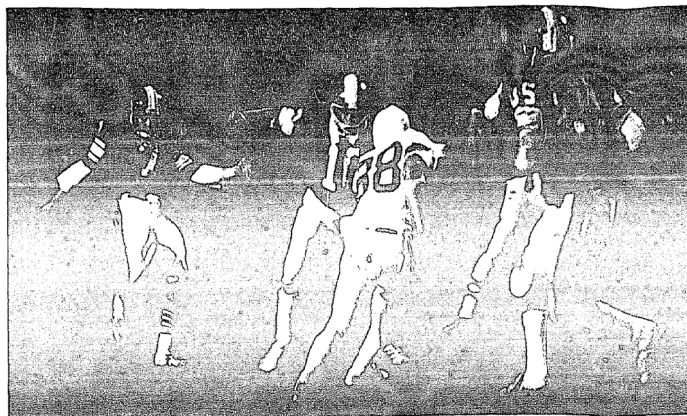

Beat Westwood for second win, 16-12

Emeralds look for win in finale against Indians

Emerald coach Jim Hunter will be looking to close out the 1982 season this Friday by putting together the first "win streak" in his five years in coaching Manistique football. A win at Newberry this Friday would give the Emerald varsity squad back-to-back victories after Manistique pleased a homecoming crowd last week by beating Westwood 16-12 in a come-from-behind win.

The Mid-Pen Conference victory gave the Emeralds a 2-5 conference record and 2-6 mark overall. If the Emeralds beat the Indians at Newberry Friday, it would give Hunter his most successful season in his three years as head varsity coach. Game time at Newberry is 7:30 p.m. Although Newberry is one of the weaker teams faced by Manistique in this year's schedule and the Emeralds are coming off a confidence-boosting win, Hunter doesn't see the season finale as a cakewalk. He noted that the Indians won last week over the Soo, 8-0, for their second victory of the season. Also, Friday's game will be Newberry's homecoming.

Westwood took the lead. "This was an awful big ball game for us. It's just too bad we didn't do this earlier. For our kids to just suck it up and score on Westwood—it was the most impressive drive I've seen in five years I've been up here. I'm really proud of them. When we needed to score we went right down and got it."

Manistique drew first blood against the Patriots with 1:53 left in the first quarter when it put together an 80-yard run in 10 plays to score on a 12-yard run by Troy Farley. That drive was paced by a 35-yard run by Mark Hoholik and another 17-yarder by Farley. Quarterback Mike Godlewski connected to George Bosanic to complete a two-point conversion and give the Emeralds an 8-0 lead going into the second quarter.

The Emeralds had one more chance to score in the first half, midway through the second quarter, when they put together four first downs to drive from their own 35 to inside the Patriots' 20. That scoring threat was killed by a Manistique fumble. Just before the end of the half, the Patriots assembled a long drive of their own only to see any scoring hopes dashed by a Doug Mickelson interception at the Manistique 15-yard line.

Big Bay wraps up season

An injury-plagued Big Bay de Noc football team wound up its season last Saturday by dropping a game at North Dickinson 34-6. The loss to the Nordics gives the Black Bears a 1-7 record overall and an 0-5 mark to secure last place in Wolverine Conference standings. The Black Bears were ill-prepared to face the powerful Nordics, who are a good bet for Class D playoff action if they beat Stephenson this Saturday. Big Bay coach Jeff Pierce was forced to start five junior varsity players against North Dickinson, ranked fourth in the U.P., to fill in for injured varsity squad members. "We were in real tough shape," he noted. "Actually, we didn't play that bad of a ball game for our young kids. They fought the whole game and just before halftime, we had a scoring opportunity that would have tied it up," Pierce said.

The big problem was that Big Bay had no running game and the Nordics knew it. Sophomore quarterback Tracey Casey made 40 passes and North Dickinson was able to intercept five times. "Our J.V. quarterback did a pretty decent job, but when you lay the ball up 40 times you're going to have some interceptions and some incompletions," Pierce said. Casey completed 13 passes good for 168 yards. Starting quarterback Steve Anselin was injured early in the ball game. Big Bay managed to hold the Nordics scoreless in the first quarter, but in the second stanza North Dickinson quickly put up two touchdowns on 1-and-13-yard runs. Good kicks made the score 14-0.

Big Bay's lone score of the contest came in the second quarter on a Rich Ranguette reception from Casey North Dickinson overwhelmed Big Bay on the ground, rushing for 253 yards to the Black Bears' 20. In the air, Big Bay had 168 to the Nordics' 93 yards, but the Nordics had only one interception. "Those five interceptions were a pretty big part of the ball game," Pierce said.

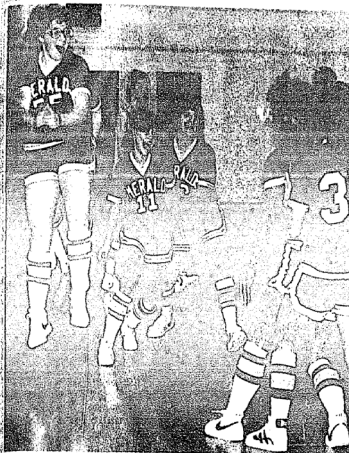

# Emerald girls lose 2; record dips to 4-10

The Manistique Emeralds girls basketball team was defeated for the second time this season by the Knights from Norway. The final score of Tuesday's game was Norway 68, Manistique 34.

That loss, along with Thursday's 61-30 defeat at the hands of the Gwin Modestowners, drops the Emeralds girls' record to 4-10 overall.

"Tonight we had trouble hitting the inside shot," said coach Don Videtich. "We just aren't scoring. We can't win when we only shoot 23 percent." Manistique was outscored in every quarter. At the end of the first quarter Norway was leading 19-7 and by the half their lead widened to 34-18. Manistique scored 10 points to Norway's 14 for a third quarter score of 48-28. As the final buzzer sounded, Norway was on top, 68-34.

Manistique did shoot better from the free throw line against Norway, making 8 of 13 attempts for 62 percent.

The Knights outrebounded the Emeralds 49-45. High rebounders for Manistique were Barb Calhoun with 11 and Nancy Krusic with 8. Denise Anderson was high rebounder for Norway with 14.

Calhoun was also high scorer on the night with 9. Shelly Lash with 7, Julie Larson and Mary McNamara with 6 apiece, Nancy Krusic with 4 and Donna Paradise 2.

"We were playing a good club. They were stronger than we were and taller than we were," commented Videtich. On the positive side, Videtich said that the Emeralds improved on breaking their pressure. "Their pressure didn't seem to bother us too much."

The J.V.'s were also defeated by a strong Norway team, 63-15. Scorers for Manistique were Amy Klarich 6, Stacey Zellar 4, Mary Brulla 3 and Cathy Paquin 2.

Last Thursday, Manistique faced top-rated Gwin in a home conference game and was defeated 61-30. Manistique shot 27 percent in the first half of the game and 23 percent in the second half for a 25 percent overall.

Gwin got off to a blazing start, outscoring Manistique 16-4 in the first quarter. Gwin's lead widened to 26-9 at the half. Manistique scored 21 points in the second half, but it wasn't enough to threaten Gwin's lead as they won 61-30.

Coach Videtich commented, "Our biggest problem is putting the ball in the basket. We get good shots, but they just don't fall. Tonight we didn't put up enough shots either. Gwin put up 76 to our 40! We also had too many turnovers on the offensive end. You can't win unless you get a shot at the basket."

Manistique shot 14 of 21 free throws for 66 percent. Videtich noted that Nancy Krusic was 4 for 4, Shelly Lash was 4 for 5 and Julie Carlson

was 2 for 2 from the line.

The Emeralds also came up on the short end in rebounding. Gwin outrebounded Manistique 46-23. Of their 46 rebounds, 25 were offensive rebounds. "We can't keep giving them 2 or 3 shots at the basket," said Videtich. Barb Calhoun was high rebounder for Manistique with 9 and Nancy Krusic had 6.

Calhoun was high scorer with 10, Lash added 6, Barb Desjardens 5, Krusic 4, Mary McNamara and Julie Carlson with 2 each and Julie Larson with 1.

"Gwin is a big, strong team. They are the number one team in the conference and right now look to be a shoe-in for the conference crown," said Videtich. "Hopefully we'll come back and play better ball against Ishpeming and Iron Mountain, both teams who are in the top four in the conference."

"We played good ball for three quarters," said Coach Sandy Histed after the J.V. basketball team fell to Gwin 58-41.

One of Manistique's problems was stopping Gwin's Jode Ghiardi who scored 31 points on the night. Manistique stayed with Gwin through three quarters of ball. At the end of the first period Gwin held a four-point lead, 12-8. They held on to that lead through the second period, leaving a half-time score of 22-18. During the third quarter, Manistique tied the game, finished the period

down by 2, 32-30, but was outscored by the Emeralds 26-11 in the final quarter of play to come up with the 58-41 win.

Mary Kay Brulla was high scorer for the Emeralds with 10. Additional scorers were Wendy Miller 9, Cathy Paquin 8, Amy Krantz 5, Amy Klarich 4, Stacey Zellar 3 and Cheri Zellar 2.

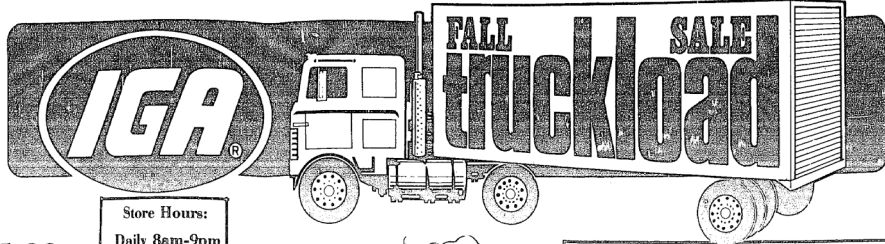

# So you think things are pretty bad now?

As you may remember from last week's column, Mrs. Margaret Curley first arrived in Manistique one hundred years ago, and in 1934 a Pioneer-Tribune reporter interviewed her about the Good Old Days. The conclusion of her story follows:

## Memories Jack On

"The hardships of life in South Manistique in the eighties and nineties are still vivid in the mind of Mrs. Curley. Present residents of the city, especially the younger people, cannot realize how life would be without good roads, automobiles, and railroad trains that operate on regular inter-city schedules. The Soo Line did not get a track through to Manistique until 1886, six years after Mrs. Curley moved here. The necessities of life were brought in during the navigation season by boats, but in the winter, with the lake ice-locked, it was impossible to bring in food and clothing except by long, tiresome sleigh trips through the snow. Usually enough had to be brought in during the summer to last through the winter. The hinterland had not been developed agriculturally except around Garden Bay, and it was impossible to procure fresh meat and vegetables from farmers. As a result the price of living shot sky-high in the winter. Mrs. Curley remembers the South Manistique butcher shop operator, Dominic Harzan, who would sometimes drive a team over the ice to Green Bay to get fresh meat and other foodstuffs. John Hruska, who now resides on the Westside, was 16 years old when he worked in Harzan's butcher shop. After the railroad came in 1888, living became much easier.

"Mrs. Curley recalls that there was no church in Manistique when she came here. Traveling preachers would hold services and she recalls that her first daughter born in Manistique, Mrs. John Vezina,

was baptized in a building near the present pop factory (Now the site of the Pioneer-Trib: J.O.) between Cedar Street and Maple Ave., where religious services were sometimes conducted.

"Mrs. Curley has voted the Democratic ticket since women's suffrage was inaugurated. In 1919, never missing an election. Most of her children, however, have become Republicans. She has lived through five depressions and she remembers the panic of 1893 the worst of the group. 'Poor people then didn't have much, but then they didn't ask for much. There was less complaining and Green Bay. She remembers back to the depression which immediately preceded the Civil War, when her father worked for fifty cents a day. 'But as I remember, we always had in 1927 at the Geno theatre. The name of the show was "In Hinky Doodle Town," and special mention was made of some of the individual acts, especially the dancing of Mrs. Alice Gerro. We have since received a letter regarding this item, and in the interest of sharing the news therein with old friends of the writer, we herewith repeat it for your benefit:

"Dear Memories:

"I was with interest and nostalgia that your column was read recently. When my son Bob Gerro, his wife Anne and I visited your town in September, we were sorry not to be able to meet with you. Time was limited and we crowded in as much sight-seeing as we could. We hope to take another trip to the Upper Peninsula soon.

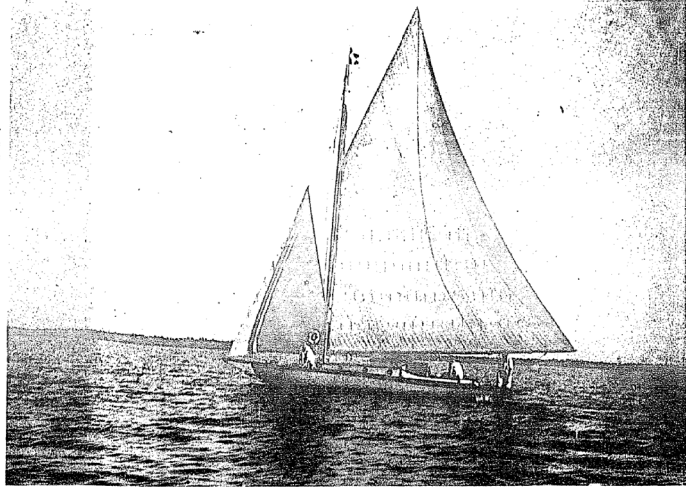

## Diabetes testing set in Curtis for Nov. 11

For the fifth year in a row, Helen Newberry Joy Hospital in conjunction with the American Diabetes Association, will sponsor a free diabetes screening program as part of "Diabetes Detection Week" beginning Nov. 9, 1982.

Testing will take place in Curtis on Nov. 10 in the Curtis Town Hall from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Participating in the program this year, as in years past, will be the lab personnel from Helen Newberry Joy Hospital.

It is estimated that there are 200,000 people in Michigan who have diabetes and are not aware of it. The purpose of this screening program is to identify these people and alert them to the importance of MHS to give military tests

proper treatment of the disease. The most common symptoms of diabetes are: excessive thirst; frequent urination; blurred vision; constant hunger and the slow healing of cuts and scratches. However, it is important to understand that the disease may still be present without the obvious symptoms. People who are over-weight, over 35 and are blood relatives of diabetics are in the "high-risk" category and are most likely to develop diabetes.

Whether the symptoms are present or not, people living in Newberry

and its surrounding communities are urged to take part in this free diabetes testing program. The testing will be limited to those persons over 18 years of age who have not been previously diagnosed as diabetics.

To ensure accurate testing results, it is suggested that a meal high in carbohydrates with large amounts of starches and sugars should be eaten two hours before the test is taken. Breakfast, for example, could be fruit or juice; cereal with milk and sugar; two slices of buttered toast

with jam and coffee or tea. Anyone planning to take the test after lunch could have soup or sandwich; cake or pie, and a glass of milk. The meal should be eaten within a 15-minute time period. After the meal, nothing but water should be taken before the test.

Other locations and times for testing are: Helen Newberry Joy Hospital, Nov. 9, 10 and 11, 9 a.m.-2 p.m.; in Engadine, at the Fire Hall, Nov. 11, 10 a.m.-2 p.m.; and in Curtis, at the Curtis Town Hall, Nov. 10, 10 a.m.-2 p.m.

## Dr. Waters receives fellowship

Dr. Duane L. Waters of Manistique has been named a fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians.

The degree of fellowship may be attained in either of two ways: Successful completion of 600 or more hours of accredited continuing medical study, or achievement of diploma status in the specialty of family practice as a result of passing a certifying examination administered by the American Board of Family Practice.

Fellowship entitles the conferee to use the title, "Fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians," or "FAAFP." The degree was conferred Oct. 5, upon more than 1,200 members of the Academy in

conjunction with AAFP's annual convention and scientific assembly in San Francisco. Ceremonies were held in the California Masonic Memorial Temple before some 2,200 persons. Fellowship candidates wore academic robes and mortarboard caps. They were recognized according to state chapter groups and recited the oath of fellowship.

The Academy, comprising more than 54,000 members in practice and in training, was the pioneer national medical group requiring members to take continuing study, a minimum of 150 accredited hours every three years. The AAFP, headquartered in Kansas City, is the largest of medicine's specialty groups.

## Review earnings now for S.S. exemptions

People in Schoolcraft County who receive Social Security benefits while working should take some time to review how much they have earned this year to make sure they do not unintentionally exceed the annual exempt amount.

When a person's annual earnings exceed the exempt amount, some Social Security benefits will be withheld. Also, if a person fails to notify Social Security, he or she may be overpaid and any overpayment must be repaid.

The annual exempt amounts for 1982 are \$4,440 for people under 65 all of 1982 and \$6,000 for people 65-72. People should remember that gross earnings count, not just take-home pay.

If a person finds that his or her earnings are nearing the annual limit, he or she will have to decide whether to keep on working. If the decision is to keep working, the person should contact Social Security immediately to avoid an overpayment.

Total annual earnings are the only consideration for all years except for "Grace Year"—the first year a person is entitled to benefits and has a month in which he or she has little or no earnings. In that one year, a monthly test is used to determine whether benefits are payable.

For more information about how earnings affect Social Security benefits, contact your local Social Security Office. The office in Manistiquie is at the Court House and is open every First and Third Wednesday of each month from 10:00 a.m.-1:00 p.m. Most Social Security business can be handled by telephoning 1-800-362-4828.

Recipients do not always understand that if their name is on a bank account, even if they consider the account to be the other person's account, it is considered a resource to the recipient for SSI purposes.

## SSE recipients must report changes

Supplemental security income (SSI) payments in Schoolcraft County are responsible for reporting any change in their circumstances that could affect the amount of their payment. Generally these are changes in one's income, resources, living arrangements or other means of support.

SSI payments are made to people with limited income and resources who are 65 and over or blind or disabled. The maximum federal payments may be as high as \$284.30 for an individual and \$426.40 for a couple. Many states supplement the federal payment. The actual payment a person receives will vary, depending on the person's income, resources, and living arrangements.

Although benefit eligibility and payment amounts are reviewed periodically, the primary responsibility for reporting any change in the conditions upon which the payments are based rests with the beneficiary. Failure to report changes that affect one's eligibility for payments could result in overpayments. The law requires that overpayments be paid back. In addition, a penalty may be imposed if it is determined that failure to report the change in circumstances was intentional.

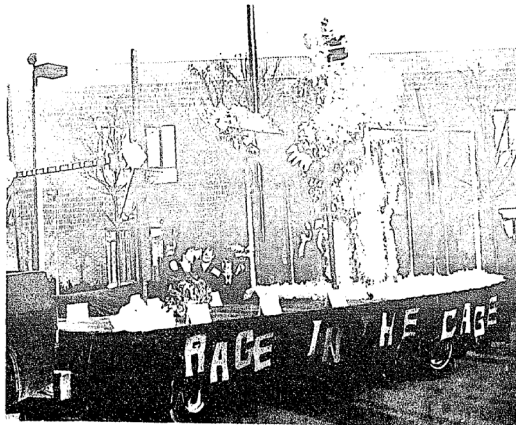

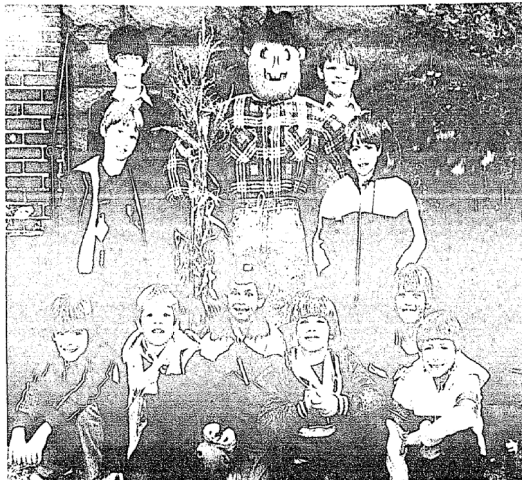
