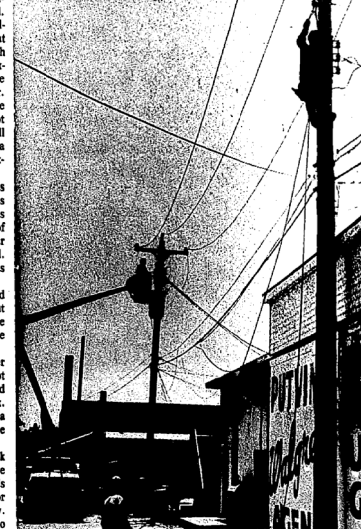

Indian Housing Thanks for telling us

Last month's news that the Sault Ste. Marie tribe of the Chippewa Indians was planning on constructing a 30-building housing development east of Manistique seemed to take the county and most everyone else by surprise.

That development project is well beyond the planning stage—ground-breaking is slated for Sept. 30. Why then, have local units of government been left in the dark about an extensive construction project that is certain to have some long-range effects on both Schoolcraft County and Manistique Township?

County officials asked the same question and sent a list of their concerns to George Nolan, housing director for the Soo Tribe. Nolan said that he won't be able to attend the July 20 meeting of the County Board as requested. But, he added that he will respond to the questions in writing and that he would be happy to meet with the board some other time.

The board's—and our—questions seem to address two basic points: what exactly is planned for the 40-acre site on the corner of the Manistique River Road and the Fackery Road and what will the local burden be once the project is finished?

It appears the local obligations of the 150-odd residents who will eventually live in the houses could be substantial.

Not only must services such as fire and police protection be provided, education for children in the housing project must also be provided. That's true even though, as federal property, the houses and real estate of the project will not be subject to property tax. (Payments in lieu of taxes to the county and "impact aid" for the school district may be provided for in some yet-to-be-negotiated "cooperation agreement," however.)

Despite those obligations by local government, it looks as if the project is beyond the reach of local control: while Nolan said he thought the plans would comply with the county building code and zoning ordinance, he made it clear that legally, they did not have to. The county zoning administrator could not say for sure, since he has yet to see any plans, but he thought the project packed too many buildings in too small an area to comply with the site's zoning.

There are other questions, the answers to which the Soo Tribe needs to spell out to the county: Will the houses for Indians become a reservation? (No such plans yet, Nolan said; currently the site is "land in trust.")

What are the "cooperation agreements" exactly and when will they be negotiated? Will the county have any bargaining power or will it be able to take only whatever is offered?

When those questions are finally explained to everyone's satisfaction, we'd like another one answered: What was the point of waiting to inform the local officials of the project's existence?

Clearly, Soo Tribe officials have known what was going to happen at the site for a long time, but wasn't until questions were brought to them that any specific information was forthcoming. It may be true that the tribe doesn't have to have the cooperation of local government to build the project, but some effort to address local concerns would go a long way towards alleviating the impression that the Indian housing is being jammed down our throats.

I recently returned from trip to Norway where we visited the birthplace of my grandmother in Larvik, Norway. She was born in Larvik in 1885. In many ways, the family home in Larvik resembles the log home my grandparents, Bill and Inger Haagenen, built on Indian Lake.

My fond remembrances of the many summers I spent with my grandparents are as strong today as if they just happened yesterday. My love for Indian Lake and Manistique as well as the entire Upper Peninsula did not die with my grandparents, for I went on to graduate from Northern Michigan University, following in the footsteps of my oldest brother, Ken, also a graduate of N.M.U., and who also spent many summers on Indian Lake.

My fondest remembrances were the almost daily, and sometimes twice daily, trips into town to shop at the Smith Brother's Grocery Store. The grandchildren always ate a lot, and it seemed that Grandma and Grandpa were always grocery shopping for us! Grandpa would always stop at John's Bar so the younger kids would go over to the People's Store. I was enthralled with the overhead baskets the employees would move along the ceiling carrying merchandise, etc. Then there was Putnam's Drug Store and the soda fountain we frequented all the time, and the special treat of an ice cream cone at Hoholik's Dairy! I remember trying to earn some extra money at my grandparents' in hopes that when I had enough, saved I could buy a sweater at the Northern Woolen Goods Store.

These are just a few of the happy memories and times I enjoyed while growing up on Indian Lake in Manistique. I am just one of nine grandchildren born to the three boys, Kenneth, Robert, and Stuart Haagenen, the children of Bill and Inger Haagenen. I am also just one of the many children who played and ran through the woods the entire summer months, and who were grandchildren of the neighbors of Grandpa and Grandma. So the stories from all of us will certainly fill an evening at the Hansen's on July 17.

Our oh kids are still there as well as the Forstners and the Petersons. In all, it will be a gala reunion on the bluff overlooking Indian Lake.

If you would like further information on the development of that side of Indian Lake, we cordially invite you to send out one of your feature writers to join us. I can assure you that you will not be hard pressed for information. The oldest member attending this reunion is 92 years old. She is my grandmother's sister and will be coming back to Indian Lake to see her many friends for her first time in many years. The youngest attendee will be 2 years old.

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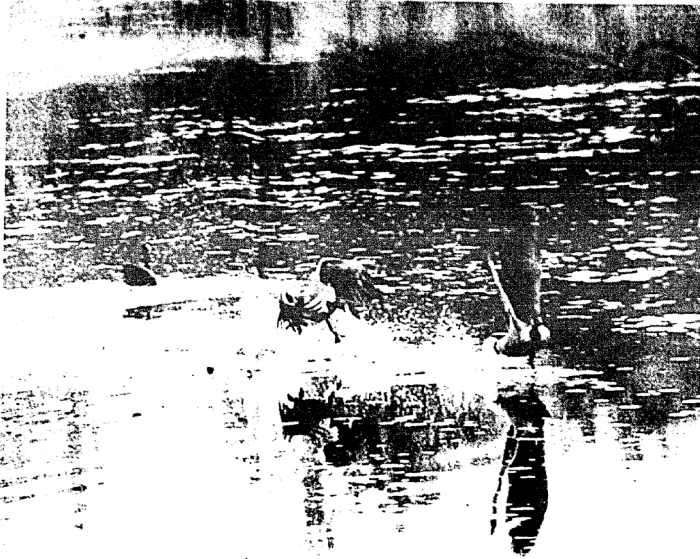
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Taking off

—Heard from Matthews that General Telephone had paid the city \$3,528 in back rent for use of a pole yard on city property. "The pole yard issue is now closed," Matthews said.
