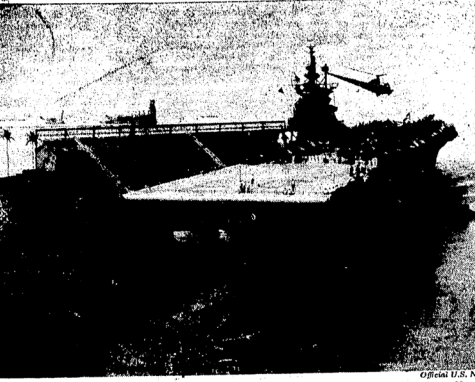

TIPS FOR FARMERS

Are you one of those home gardeners who like to be first in your neighborhood with some produce? Here is a tip on how you can get a head-start on a juicy red-centered watermelon or a golden mellow muskmelon.

These are warm season crops, and all the danger of frost must be gone before they are set outside. So seed them indoors anytime now. Fill flower pots, plant bands or even strawberry boxes with a good mixture of sandy loam soil. Dust the seed with a copious oxide or mercuric dust to control disease. Plant about six melon seeds in each container and place them in a warm location.

If the containers are kept moist the plants will soon break through; then they need plenty of sunlight. When large enough, thin to three plants in a container.

After May 20—or when all danger of frost is past, dig holes three to five feet apart in the garden for muskmelon and six to eight feet apart for watermelons. Dig the holes 12 to 15 inches deep and fill half full of well-rotted manure. Work in soil and set the plants. If plant bands or strawberry boxes are used set in the entire container and break down the sides so the roots will grow out. If pots are used, remove the plants carefully saving the soil. Place hot caps over plants until about the first week in June to avoid a possible late frost.

Keep the plants dusted with rotenone to control bugs and beetles and you are on the way to a melon crop. Recommended varieties are Honey Rock or Heart of Gold as cantaloupe varieties and Dixie Queen, Northern Sweet or Honey Green for watermelons for Michigan gardeners.

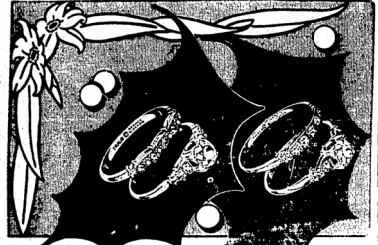

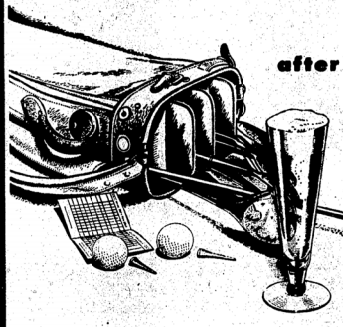

serious drought this summer—and meteorologists hint that one is overdue—the food situation would become more critical. The "ally-to, popular drinking spot in Lansing is contesting the right of the state liquor control commission to deny a renewal of its liquor license. For many years the club has been operated by a Lansing business man as a high-class saloon. Admission was by a membership card. Now dried up by the commission which insists that it should operate as a private club for benefit of its members, the "ally-to has filed a suit. The present commission has probably done more to enforce Michigan liquor laws than any other commission in recent years. Slot machines—a source of high profit to private clubs throughout the state—are being in storage. Money-laundering clubs are being out of business.

When the secretary of the Michigan Temperance Commission will come out and praise a state liquor control commission for doing a good job, the near-miracle has taken place. But such is the case in 1946. Signing of a federal airport bill will make possible as further improvement of Michigan airports. A state aeronautics conference was held in Lansing last Friday and Saturday. During war years 42 landing fields and airports were built in Michigan. The total is 106. Newspapers in New York City just published an advertisement by the Pennsylvania Central Airlines Inc., promoting air travel to Michigan resorts. P. C. A., Detroit, and Sault Ste. Marie, Great Lakes Greyhound Lines is offering a schedule of helicopter service as feeder lines to its bus routes.

If the state sales tax had been reduced, Michigan would have lost \$101,000,000 in revenue during the past five years, according to Governor Harry F. Kelly. In a talk at Saginaw the governor said that the state, according to received \$46 millions. "In lieu of the \$16 millions in sales taxes that was demanded in 1945, there will be returned to the cities before this year has closed a total of \$18.5 millions (from liquor and intangible taxes) which is \$2.5 millions more than was asked." Governor Kelly is proud of the fact that the state's government fund created during his two-term administration. Certain to face the 1947 state legislature: Demand for a veterans' cash bonus.

The trust fund will be administered by county committees of veterans. Each county will have four members each, representing the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans and the American Veterans of World War II. REPORT GIVEN ON DENTAL SERVICES

Figures Released This Week By Children's Fund; Ten At Bay Cliff

The Alger-Schoolcraft health department received dental service from the Children's Fund of Michigan for three and one-half months this year, a recent report shows. Dr. J. G. Morris, the Children's Fund dentist, assigned to this area, resigned on August 11, 1918. During the time he was on duty, 424 children made 629 visits to the clinic. A total 420 extractions were done and 629 fillings inserted.

There were 268 children who received service at the Northern Michigan Children's Clinic at Marquette, and ten children from each of the two counties had a six-weeks' vacation at Bay Cliff Health Camp.

Use Loud Speaker To Locate Men

Locating returning servicemen for the delivery of emergency messages immediately after their arrival in port from the Pacific is one of the "biggest" tasks assigned to American Red Cross field directors are encountering, says Richard W. Williams, field director at Camp Anza, Arlington, California.

Locator cards usually do not catch up with the men while they are at the base he said, and the quantity of orders covering returns makes it physically impossible for the military to look through all of them in each in-

stance to find the name of an individual soldier.

Williams' only chance of finding a man for delivery of an emergency message is by way of the camp audio system. Names of departees for whom messages have been received are broadcast repeatedly over the loud speaker.
