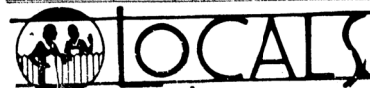

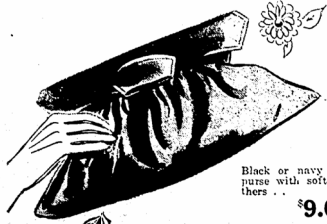

## Philip Grondin, Senev Pioneer, Dies In East At 86

Philip Grondin, pioneer Senev pioneer who came to Senev county in 1880 during the height of the "white pine era" and who lived in Senev during the brush early days when the village was dubbed the "Gomorrhah of the North" died Wednesday in New York at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Allen W. Lander, in Wood, N. J.

Mr. Grondin, four years a prominent merchant, lumberman and hotel-resort operator in the Senev area and sometime public official, had been living with Mrs. Lander for the past three years. He had been in failing health for some time. He was born in St. Aubin, Quebec, Canada, in 1860, and settled in Senev when he was 20 years old. He first worked for a logging company as camp cook, but in 1889, took over a bar and hotel which he operated for many years as the Grondin hotel, and which became a center of village activity. In 1901 the building was destroyed in a fire which damaged a number of other business places. Mr. Grondin rebuilt immediately, however, operating the new structure under the name of the Star hotel, but flames also leveled this establishment. Although he had suffered a severe loss, without assistance to cover it, Grondin again erected a building in which he entered the mercantile business and conducted it for over 20 years. He also engaged in lumbering and a number of years ago started in the resort business, his last venture in this line a new establishment on Big Manitique Lake.

Mr. Grondin was active in community affairs as well as the large business life, serving many years as township supervisor and also as township commissioner.

In recent years, Mr. Grondin had secured a publication which have pointed Senev in early days as a tough, wide open town where women could safely appear on the streets in dark and showings were common. Senev was as orderly as a frontier town, he declared.

Survivors are two daughters, Mrs. Allen Lander, of May and Mrs. I. H. Horton, of Alma, and a number of years ago, Canada; a brother, E. A. Grondin, of Newberry; and grandchildren. He was married in 1924 and two sons, William Earl, also preceded their father's death.

The body was brought to Senev for burial, where services were held Tuesday at the St. Mary's Catholic church.

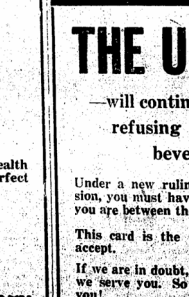
