THREE YOUTHS BOUND OVER ON KNIFE THEFT

Tri-o Waive Examination in Justice Court; Bonds Are Set At \$500

Three Manistique youths, Gerald Tuffnell, 18, Richard Weber, 20, and Vernon Edwards, 19, were bound over to circuit court here Monday on a charge of breaking and entering with intent to commit larceny.

### Strangles Girl, Sets Body Afire, Boy Confesses

'Wanted to Kill Somebody,' Youth Explains When Admitting Crime.

OROVILLE, CALIF.—He "wanted to kill somebody," Albert Jones, a fraul 14-year-old high school student explained in confessing strangling Patricia Crandall, a teenage companion, and setting fire to her body.

After he had been taken into custody for questioning in the near-fatal shooting of Mrs. Bevel Nielsen, Jones broke down and confessed both crimes. He shot Mrs. Nielsen in the back on the way to get him some cigarettes.

In a tremulous, adolescent voice, Albert said he committed both crimes "I wasn't mad at Patricia," he said. "I just wanted to kill her. She didn't hurt me much."

Resented Soulding "She scolded me for playing with the cat," the youth said. "She made a fuss when I pulled its tail. She said I was hurting it."

In a later confession, Albert said he "got mad" when the girl struck the cat. It was then, he said, that he decided to kill her. "I got mad" when the girl struck the cat. "I put her on the floor and piled magazines around her. I poured the lighter fluid and set them on fire. Her hair was on fire and burning when I went out."

Sheriff Herb Forward said the girl was alive but unconscious when he was burned.

Jones told police, he "felt like killing somebody again." He rode over to the Nielsen house, where Mrs. Nielsen was eating apples.

He daughter, Betty, 18, was studying in the breakfast nook and a neighbor child was playing with water color.

Shot Her in Back Mrs. Nielsen offered to get the boy a cookie and he followed her to the kitchen, shooting her in the back as she reached for the cookie.

The bullet pierced her intestine and emerged from her hip. She slumped to the floor.

Then she stuffed cigarette pits in her mouth and gagged her with a towel.

After trying up Betty and the other girls, he picked up two parking meters.

"I could kill you with these and not make any noise, but I'm better 'at strangling,'" he bragged.

At length, the youth yielded to Betty's hysterical pleas to be allowed to be murdered. Her father, Nielsen, who rushed, borne from the garage where he had been working.

Nielsen pursued the boy into the bedroom and overpowered him, his leg caught in a duster which ripped through his shirt sleeve.

Crazed Yank Kills Two; Slayer Is Shot to Death

TIENTSIN.—An American marine and a Chinese national policeman were killed and several military policemen and Chinese pedestrians were wounded during a riot in this city.

The marine, whose comrades said he evidently was suffering from severe mental depression, shot and killed a marine sentry.

Man Hangs by Arm 90 Minutes to Escape Trains

CLEVELAND, OHIO.—A 65-year-old "knight of the road" who clung to a railroad tie with one arm for 90 minutes while two freight trains roared above him was rescued from a perch 100 feet above ground under a nickel plate trestle across the Cuyahoga river.

The rescued man was William W. Taylor of Chicago who had started across the bridge and saw a train overtaking him as he was midway between two safety platforms. He lowered himself over the end of a projecting tie and held on with his right arm, with the tips of his toes barely touching an I-beam part of the bridge structure.

A fire department ladder finally was raised and he was rescued.

This text and companion workbooks and test sheets are used by the University of Michigan correspondence study department in the citizenship course it offers for aliens. Citizenship lessons, given in

cooperation with the Federal Immigration Service, prepared the non-examinations which will be given him before he receives naturalization papers. Sample questions asked the citizenship applicant may relate to the Declaration of Independence, the purpose set forth in the preamble to the Constitution, the history of the Constitutional Convention, or the qualifications of a U. S. senator.

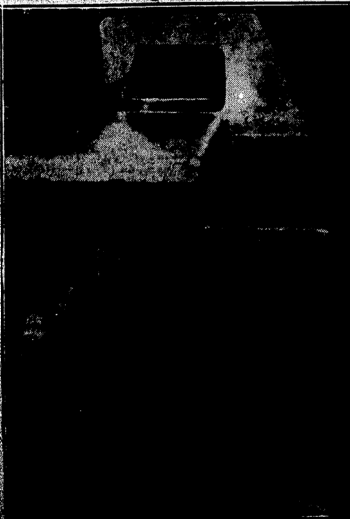

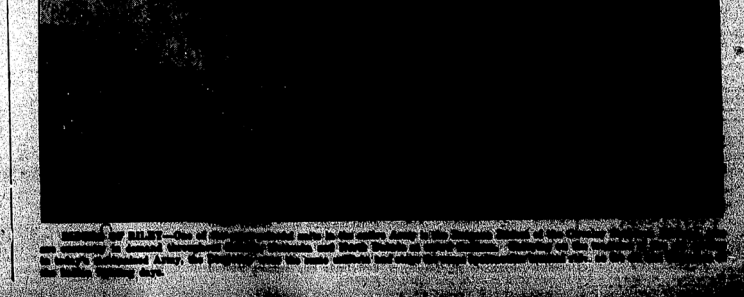
