Tony Popish Is Held For Killing Pal

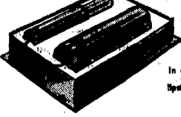
Former Manistique Resident Confesses Murder To Marquette Police

Tony Popish, 65, former Manistique bootlegger, confessed to police in Marquette Saturday that he had shot and killed Frank Melich, 61, in the shack they shared on the outskirts of Marquette Sunday morning, Feb. 8. Popish confessed the killing shortly before his arraignment in Marquette municipal court on a charge of murder. He had been arrested the day before following investigation of the death of Melich, at first thought to have been suicide. According to information received here by state police, Melich's body was discovered on the day after the killing by a neighbor who glimpsed it through a window of the shack where he had gone to buy eggs. Melich was in bed and a shotgun lay across his body. Popish was in the rear feeding the chickens. Questioned as to why Melich was in bed with a gun over him, Popish reportedly said he "didn't know," and returned to the shack with his caller supposedly to discover Melich's suicide. Police investigation disclosed, however, that Melich had been dead 24 hours, and that because of a crippled hand, it would have been impossible for him to have fired the shot which caused his death. He had been struck in the chest. Popish was arrested on a charge of murder and confessed as he was about to be arraigned. At the arraignment, he waived examination and was bound over to circuit court. He is being held in Marquette jail.

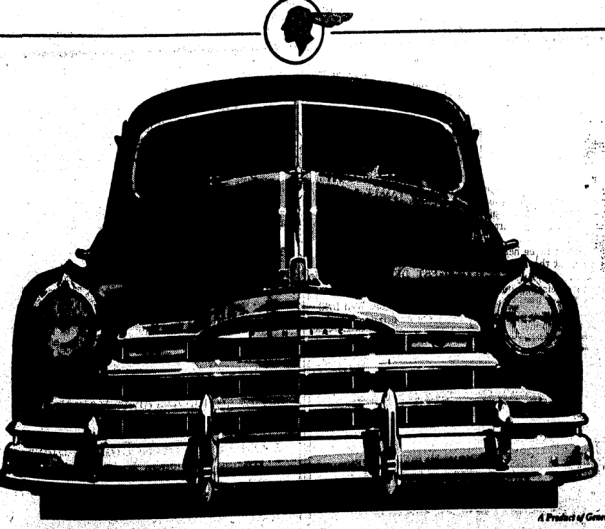

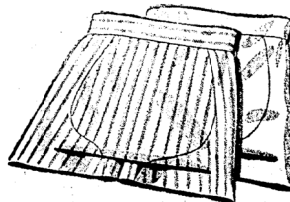
