Migraine Is Most Usual Headache Says Instructor

Causes of headaches are almost as numerous as the people who have them, but one of the most common recurring forms is the migraine headache.

headaches, though some estimates run as high as 50 per cent of the population who have such headaches at one time or another.

"The patient with migraine, or so-called 'sick headache,' has a double problem of preventing the headache if possible and of treating it after it begins, she continued.

Other common types of headache were listed by Dr. Westenberg as those accompanying high blood pressure, eye diseases, nervous tension and fatigue, sinus, and low blood sugar.

"Sinus headaches are less common than many people surmise," she cautioned.

the University instructor continues. There are drugs which can be prescribed for migraine, but no one with chronic headache should use habit forming narcotics for them, she cautioned.

There seems to be an hereditary tendency to migraine, Dr. Westenberg said. Most persons who have this type of headache have a family history of it, especially on the maternal side.

(2) These terms will continue until a contract is signed with the Union.
(3) The pay increase of 7 1/2% is one of the terms.

We have repeatedly said we have to have a contract before we can start work. This means each of you who wish to work will sign an individual contract.

This offer was explained to the Bargaining Committee at a meeting on March 1, 1948. We told them exactly what we were going to do and advised them we are willing to enter into a contract with them. The same contract we have posted.

We would prefer a contract with the Union. However, so many employees have asked to return to work, I am opening the plant on this basis so that those who wish to work may do so.

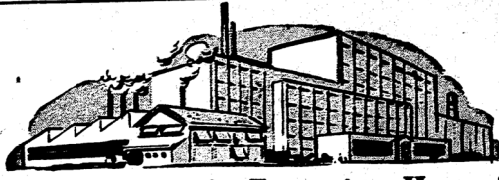

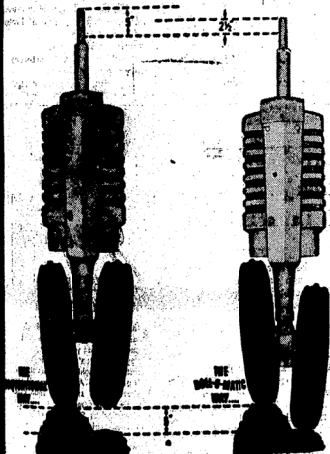

At this point the union official declared Thursday, the union offered to submit

all issues in dispute to an arbitration committee, findings to be final and binding on both parties. This offer was flatly rejected by the company. Arrowood and Huber declared. **Offer Second Proposal** "The union submitted another proposal," they went on, "suggesting that a fact-finding panel be established consisting of one representative from the company, one from the union and a disinterested member from the City of Manistique. This committee would delve into the facts of the case and make a recommendation of a fair settlement. The recommendation of this committee would not be a mandatory one, only the company and the union would be required to apply good faith in trying to reach the agreement based on the fact-finding committee's recommendation. The company notified the union that this proposal was also unacceptable." Arrowood and Huber declared that "in a serious effort to arrive at a settlement, the union has submitted all known methods so that a fair agreement could be reached between the company and the membership. All such efforts have been of no avail. In the meanwhile, the lockout continues, which is having ill effects on the welfare of the entire community.

At the present time, there are no indications when the company will terminate their lockout of the employees. However, despite the strenuous efforts of the union, to read an early and fair disposition of the issues in dispute, the company has restored to subterfuge and the effectuation of modern-time yellow-dog contracts. **Enlistments For Air Forces Cut, Recruiter Says** Because enlistments for the air forces are running well ahead of their needs throughout the country, they are being limited to specified quotas after March 1, Sgt. Charles McQuay, local recruiter, announced this week. In Wisconsin and Upper Michigan, air corps enlistments will be held down to 25 a week. Unemployed high school graduates who enlist for specific air force schooling will not come under this quota. Veterans must re-enlist within 90 days after expiration of their enlistment. In the Escanaba area, which includes Manistique, only two recruits are allowed a week.

### Drive For Scrap Iron And Steel Is Launched Here

The purpose of the drive is to get every pound of scrap metal out of the homes, farms and factories and other business places and into the steel mill furnaces as rapidly as possible.
