Newest MSC Frost Fighter



This new simplified model of the Michigan State College infrared frost damage prevention machine is to be commercially manufactured by a Detroit firm. It is expected that more than 50 machines will be made for field tests this spring. This machine, more efficient and less expensive design was developed by MSC agricultural engineers as a result of discovery of new improved materials. Field tests showed that when used in groups, the oil-burning heaters protected from frost damage plants 100 feet away from the heaters machine. Air temperature around the plants were 6 degrees below freezing. Here a W. Patrick, head of the agricultural engineering department, and P. J. Hlasler, engineer, check plans with the model.

U. P. Has Its Own Seven Wonders; Big Spring One

The ancient world had its seven man-made wonders, but the Upper Peninsula of Michigan offers its own seven wonders, all but one of which were fashioned by nature.

Nearly all are on or near Michigan's greatest wonder—Lake Superior. The upper peninsula's seven wonders are: the average summer temperature of 64 degrees and attracts 764 sunbathers to its pollen-free air.

In that lake is Isle Royale, America's top-ranking national park and probably the upper peninsula's. The island, a lava formation from some long extinct volcano, is about 50 miles long and from five to ten miles wide.

It is famed for its prehistoric mining pits, mouse herds, beaches where semi-precious stones are found, and for exceptional lake trout and other fishing. It is reached by the Georgian Bay Line from Buffalo, Cleveland, Detroit and Chicago, and by small boat service from Michigan's Copper Country; from Duluth and Grand Marais, Minn., and from Fort William and Port Arthur, Ontario, Canada.

The world's greatest native copper lode, extending southwestward from Keweenaw Point through Keweenaw, Houghton and Ontonagon counties and into Gogebic County and beyond is No. 2 on the "Seven Wonders" list. Mining operations have been practically continuous for a century and the formations are by no means exhausted.

From the top of Alouez hill northeast of Calumet, one can enjoy a remarkable view of the northern part of the lode and its surface workings.

No. 3 of the peninsula's "wonders" is the Lake of the Clouds and the Porcupine Mountains in Ontonagon County. This beautiful lake, in a fine setting of timber, is at the highest level in the central west.

Big Spring Fourth

Fourth is Kitchi-ti-pi Spring near Manistique in Schoolcraft county. About 100 feet across and 40 feet deep, the spring is fed with clear cold water from the highlands to the northward. A captive raft is provided for sight-seers' enjoyment.

The Pictured Rocks and Nagawadagon sand dunes of Alger county on the south shore of Lake Superior are next on the list. The cliffs, about 200 feet high, extend along the water's edge for more than 20 miles. East of them the high, shifting sand dunes reach almost to Grand Marais. The rocks and dunes are the background of a canto in Longfellow's "Song of Hiawatha."
