BICYCLISTS MUST CARRY 1948 TAGS

Other Provisions of Local
Bike Ordinance Listed
By Police Chief

Manistique bike riders were re-
minded this week by Chief of Pol-
ice Roy Anderson that they must
equip their bicycles with 1948 li-
cense tags before May 1.

Other important provisions of
the Manistique bicycle ordi-
nance listed by the police chief for the
attention of bicyclists are as fol-
lows:
All bicycles shall be equipped
with a red glass reflector to be
placed on the rear of the bicycle
so as to be visible from the rear.
This reflector shall not be smaller
than one and one-half inches in
diameter and of such a type as
may meet with the approval of the
chief of police.

All bicycles used within the city
limits shall, during the hours
from one-half hour after sunset
and one-half hour before sunrise,
display a headlight on the for-
ward part of the bicycle, said
headlight to be stationary thereto
and to have illumination equal to
that produced by a one and two-
tyclic handdrill volt electric
bulb and battery.

It shall be unlawful for any per-
son to ride or operate a bicycle
upon the sidewalks in said city.
It shall be unlawful for any per-
son riding or operating a bicycle
to carry extra passengers there-
on at any time. Bicyclists riding or
traveling upon any street of said
city shall not ride except in single
file with both hands upon the han-
dle bars and as near the right curb
as possible.

All persons riding bicycles upon
any street within said city shall
observe all traffic rules as to traf-
fic light and highway stop signs
and shall signal any change of
direction or course of traveling in
the same manner and in the same
way as such signals are required
as possible.

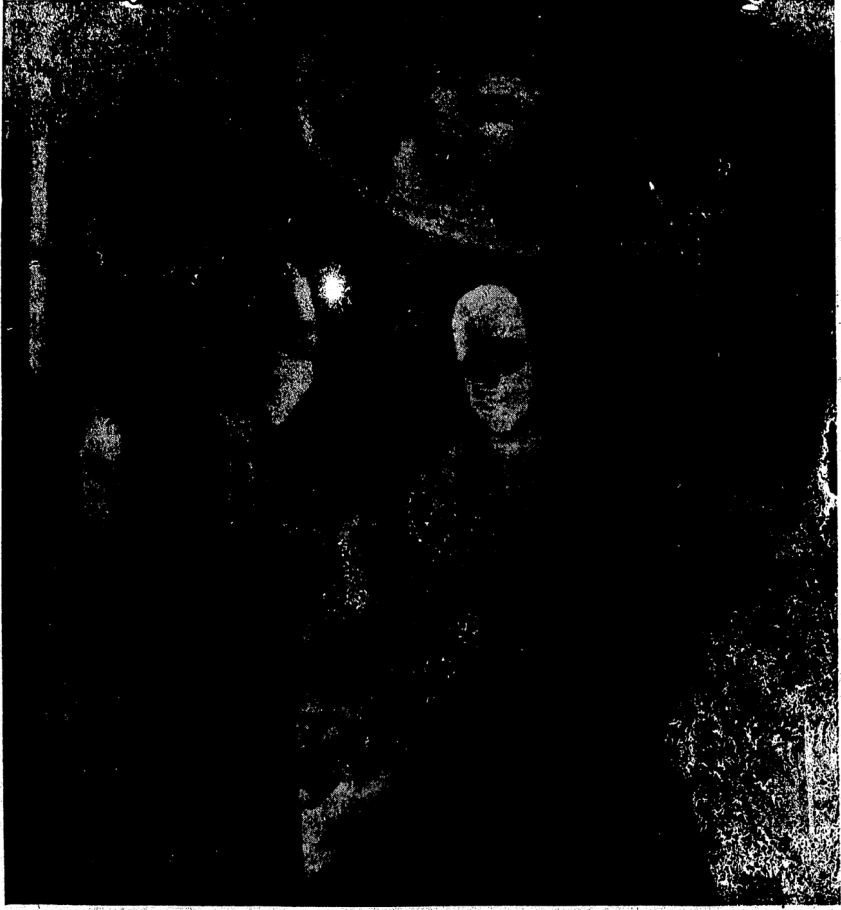

BILL IS EXPLAINED

No Waiver Of Hunting And
Fishing Rights, Conserva-
tion Men Say
"The so-called 'search and seizure'
bill introduced in the special
session of the legislature last
Thursday," said Governor Kim
Sigler, "is the result of an attempt
by the attorney general's office and
the department of conservation to
work out an effective proposal
which would permit law enforce-
ment officers to give adequate pro-
tection to Michigan's important
and valuable fish and game re-
sources."
According to the conservation of-
ficials, there is no waiver of any
constitutional rights by hunters
and fishermen. It is based upon the
fundamental fact, recognized by
the courts, that fish and game are
the property of the state and that
the taking of that property by an
individual is a privilege granted
by the legislature under such re-
strictions and limitations as it may
see fit to impose.
The proposed law would provide

for the inspection and examination
of game or fish taken by the hun-
ter or fisherman and of hunting and
fishing equipment, used by him. The
sequences of the present statutes
have been pointed out in re-
cent attorney general's opinion.

Accompanying his talk with the showing of a film, "The Traitor Within," Dr. Shaw explained to members of the Zion Lutheran Brotherhood Tuesday evening and to the First Baptist Ladies Aid Wednesday afternoon what cancer symptoms are, how they can be treated and what is being done now to relieve and lessen the dread of cancer.

"Most cancer can be cured if it is found and treated early enough," he emphasized. "There are several signs and symptoms of cancer; they may not mean cancer but they do mean you should see your doctor," he pointed out. He listed these seven:

1. Persistent indigestion.
2. Irregular bleeding or discharge from any natural body opening.
3. Any sore that does not heal—particularly about the tongue, mouth or lips.
4. Progressive change in color or size of a wart, mole or blemish.
5. Persistent hoarseness, unexplained cough, or difficulty in swallowing.
6. A painless lump or thickening, especially in the breast, lip or tongue.
7. Any persistent change in normal bowel habits.

April is Cancer Control Month and the public is urged to be curious about the progress in the cure of cancer. The Schoolcraft Chapter of the Cancer Society is anxious that everyone be informed of "The Traitor Within" and understand the ways by which cancer can be cured.
