Public Service Commission has jurisdiction over five general classes of utilities: Electric power, telephone, gas distribution, railroad and motor transportation, such as buses and trucks.

What the commission does is highly important to the people of Michigan. These utilities touch the lives and reach into the pocket-books of every citizen. Invested capital of Michigan utilities amounts to more than \$2,000,000,000. The people pay more than \$300,000,000 each year in fees—just about twice what the State of Michigan collects in all forms of taxes.

Nineteen million utility companies filed applications in 1948 for rate adjustments, as inflation locked up their cost of operation. Collectively, these utilities asked a total of \$400,000,000 additional income.

In addition to the high cost of doing business, utilities are forced by long-established policy to expand their service wherever the public demand more service. Private utilities would not put expansion, if prices were out of line. Utilities can't delay installation of telephones, laying of gas mains, generating plants, and so on.

Michigan Bell, for example, is now expanding its telephone service to the tune of \$120,000,000. Consumers and Detroit Edison are borrowing \$100,000,000 each. Detroit Edison stockholders number 44,000 persons—all of which have risked money for investment. This profit incentive makes American tick.

"The financial impact of an interruption in the service of a single utility," related Chairman White, "is well illustrated in the 17-day curtailment of natural gas to a number of Detroit industries in January, 1948."

"Approximately 100,000 workmen lost \$3,700,000 in wages. Unemployment compensation payments totaled \$1,250,000, while the state spent \$150,000 for additional administrative help to process the applications. It is estimated that the grand total—because around \$10,000,000—because one utility was unable to provide full service to all of its customers for only 17 days."

"Members of the commission sense an obligation, as representatives of the people, to do everything possible to assure adequate service by our public utilities. The consequences of our failure to do this would be costly, indeed."

When the commission does announce its findings on pending cases for higher utility rates, you may be sure that these three men—all appointees of Governor Kim Sigler—believe the rates to be the lowest rates consistent with good service.

The history of the utility commission has not been favorable to public interests. The average commissioner has held office for only three years. Salaries have not been always attractive to high-calibre business men. Appointments have been political, as a reward for political support, in too many instances.

The commission gets little publicity. Yet its work affects every Michigan citizen. The picture of the Michigan Public Service Commission in September, 1948.

Fresh Air Is Against Germs Best Weapon
An Airborn-Best way to keep the air in your home comparatively germ-free is to ventilate the house properly, a University of Michigan professor of bacteriology has commented.

Ultra violet lamps, which are occasionally used to reduce bacteria concentrations in the air, have definite limitations, he added. The effect of the rays is weakened in accordance with the distance they must travel. Also it is necessary to take precautions against burns to the skin and against eye damage which may result from over-exposure to the ultra violet rays.

Although many disease-causing bacteria are carried by air and dust particles—for example, tuberculosis, diphtheria, measles and mumps—it is not very easy to catch an airborne infection. Even if retained, they must be in sufficient numbers and strength to cause disease. Experiments indicate that getting chilled and drinking alcohol had increased susceptibility to airborne disease, Dr. Nungesser observed.

Control of the amount of dust particles in the air is important in combating airborne bacteria, the bacteriologist pointed out. Damp sweeping is one of the best ways of controlling floor dust.

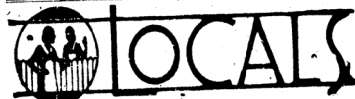

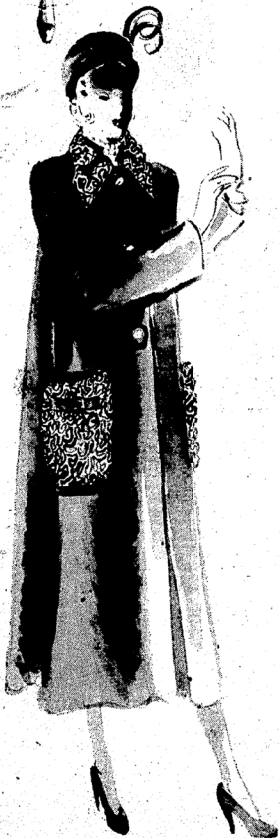

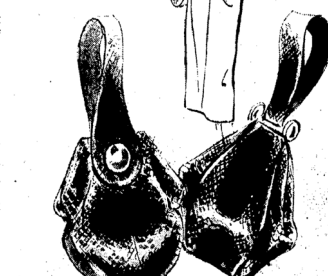

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More Peacetime Records Tumble In Lake Shipping

More peacetime records tumbling as the Great Lakes fleet continued all fall cargo space in August. Among the reasons established by the industry was—

—Greatest peacetime movement any month, 8,666,222 net tons previous best month was 8,046,517, net tons, Feb. 1947.

—Greatest peacetime movement of coal for any season as of September 1—22,727,463 net tons, comparing with 23,454,568 net tons this time in 1947; exceeded only the war years of 1945 and 1946 and then by less than one percent.

—Greatest movement of any peacetime season as of September, 54,569,769 gross tons, comparing with 51,914,753 gross tons year ago.

—Greatest postwar movement of ore, coal and grain for the month of August—22,653,370 net tons, comparing with 21,792,258 net tons of September 1 in 1947.

—Greatest cumulative movement of ore, coal and grain for peacetime season as of September 1—97,854,197 net tons, comparing with 91,637,206 net tons at same time in 1947.

—Masters of lake vessels a little time for statistics, but continuing on the present program the next scheduled dock, have led their crews for rugged work ahead as autumn winds whip up waves and rougher sailing conditions make lake operations difficult. Colder weather also the handling of iron ore is particular, and increases the time loading and unloading ships. Whatever the final figures for December, they will represent gallant all-out effort on the part of the lake fleet in a year ending the national economy.
