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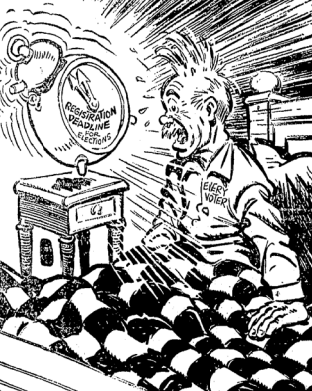

TREE FARM PROGRAM LAUNCHED BY STATE

Two Manistique Men On 50-Member Committee

Appointed By Governor

A "Tree Farm" program to give recognition to the owners of the state's 11,000,000 acres of private woodlands and forests who are managing their holdings so as to "assure continued production of commercial forest crops" is being launched this week by the conservation department in cooperation with Michigan Forest Industries, Carl Makiel, district forester here, announces.

A 50-member committee, to which Frank Heinz, timberland owner and operator, and R. G. Hentschell, manager of the Manistique Pulp and Paper company, have been named, will act as advisors to the program. Governor Sigler is honorary chairman.

"Timber is a crop," declared P. J. Hoffmaster, conservation director in commenting on the program. "Properly managed timberland can be harvested, not once, but again and again. The tree farm system encourages woodland owners to follow practices which will benefit them by greater sales of forest products, and at the same time, help maintain one of the important industries in Michigan.

The conservation department and the Michigan Forest Industries will present a certificate and a free 18x26 inch tree farm sign to owners of woodlots or forests of more than six acres which meet the standards set up in the program, Makiel reported.

Facts Show Farmers Not To Blame For High Food Prices

Farmers should feel flattered that they are being blamed for high food prices thinks Arthur March, agricultural economist at Michigan State college. That would mean, he concludes, that the farmer has the power to fix the prices the consumer pays. If he had that power, the farmer wouldn't worry about a depression.

But, recalling a little history and using a little simple arithmetic, March shows that it isn't so.

Farm prices are always the first to drop in a depression. The farmer always takes for his product what the consumer is willing to pay after the middleman gets out their costs of processing, transporting, and selling, plus a profit.

The real reason for high food prices, March believes, is that consumers have two and one-half to three times as much money to spend as they had in 1933. That represents demand—power to buy food. Farm production has increased about a third, and that is an outstanding performance since we have fewer farmers today. This food represents supply.

Economists have contended for years that the relation between supply and demand determines the price. Using simple arithmetic, March then divided the goods into money available to buy and the price is twice as high.

"The fault lies in too much money to spend in relation to the goods to buy and the consumer's willingness to bid up prices. The farmer influences the price by his effect on supply. 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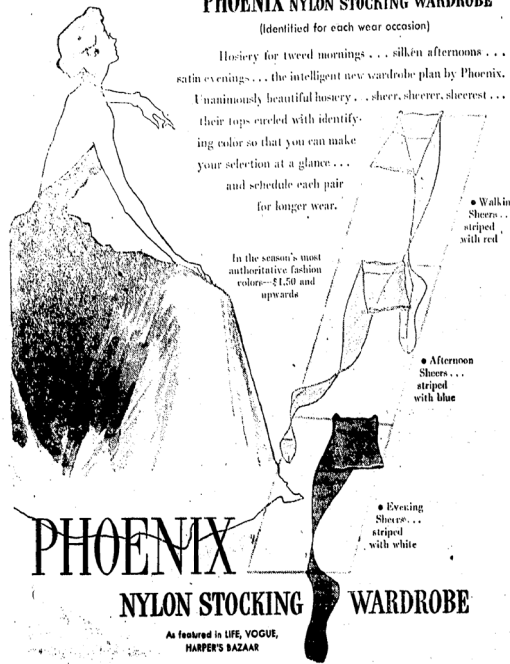
