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Conservation Men Seeking Money For Education

Conservation department educational representatives of 21 states meeting in Ohio recently voted to seek an amendment to the federal Pittman-Robertson act which would apply a portion of the funds raised by a tax on sporting arms and ammunition to educational purposes.

Michigan's share of the funds for the current year is \$599,001, highest on record. The funds are prorated among the states for wildlife restoration.

So choose your curtains or drapes and then match your paint or paper to them. If possible try out a large sample at the windows of your room before deciding. You can see how the material looks in the daytime and also under artificial light as well as with the other colors in the room.

Attractive and interesting window treatments can do more to make a room attractive than any other one thing. They can do a great deal to improve the appearance of a poorly proportioned room.

Design, color and the texture of part in the window treatment. Each should blend with these features. The material all play an important part of the other room furnishings.

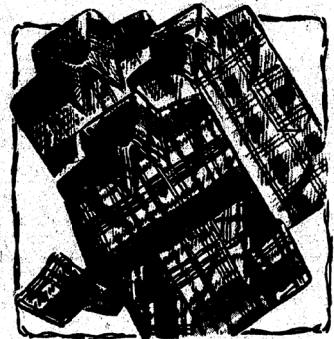

Information On Waterfowl Shooting Explained On Maps

Homecoming At St. Norbert's To Open Ober's 22

Waterfowl hunters who want to know when they may start shooting in the morning and when they may stop firing at night can get answers now. Time maps showing shooting hours for every day of the state have been made available in all districts and regional offices of the conservation department. One was printed in the Pioneer-Tribune last week. The answer to the hunters' question is the earliest hour on any day, of course, is noon. Shooting hours for state hunters will vary from 5:16 p. m. on any day in the northwest to 11 p. m. in the southeast on the 14th day of the season. The maps show counties in which Sunday hunting laws exist and in which they are unprotested. Stop in Manistique.

Duck Season Opens Oct. 15

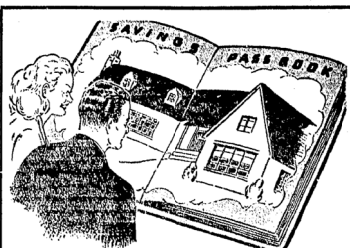
The place a sportsman chooses to hunt and the kind of game he is after on October 15, opening day of the migratory bird season throughout the state and of the small game season in the lower peninsula, determine the time he can legally start shooting. Opening hours, eastern standard time, on various species for the first days of the open seasons are: Upper Peninsula (Zone 1), October 15; woodcock, one-half hour before sunrise; ducks, geese, coots, rails, gallinules, 12:00 noon; small game (season open since October 1) 7:00 a. m. Report Given On Duck Stamp Sales

Michigan wildfowlers bought 91,234 federal "duck stamps" last year to put the state in fourth place in the nation. A total of 1,722,677 stamps was sold. There was a big drop, nationwide and state, from the 1946 sale of 2,016,819 stamps. Michigan gunners bought 117,294 stamps that year. The decline is attributed by Albin K. Day, director of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, to drastic waterfowl hunting regulations and specially selected stamps of 1947 which were designed to bring about a substantial reduction in the kill of ducks and geese. Largest sale in the fiscal year was in Minnesota. California was second with 137,279, and Texas third with 121,156. Sold for \$1 at post offices, the duck stamps provide funds that help finance the federal government wildlife refuge programs. Every person over 16 years who hunts migratory waterfowl is required to carry a stamp of current issue with his signature in ink across the face. Many stamps are sold to collectors.

Joan McNamara Has Scholarship At Michigan State

Miss Joan McNamara, of Manistique, is one of 64 freshmen who entered Michigan state college this fall under a scholarship provided by MSC alumni. Candidates for scholarships are recommended by high school principals to alumni committees set up in each Michigan Senatorial district. After being screened by these committees, lists of candidates are sent to the faculty scholarship committee at Michigan State College. At least one scholarship is awarded in each district. A grade point of 1.6 must be maintained by winning students to hold the scholarship which pays the college tuition, after their freshman year. In the past such students at Michigan State College Manistique have held an overall two point, or "B" average. Miss McNamara is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold McNamara, Oak street. INTERESTING NEWS

The Michigan political campaign has reached the interesting stage of alternating doldrums and jitters.

Encouraged by public opinion polls, Michigan Republican leaders have been cocksure and confident of a G. O. P. landslide in November.

Some voters have even wondered who is running for governor on the Democratic ticket: Mennon Williams or Attorney General Eugene C. Black.

At present, the 1909 constitution sets their salaries at sums so low the legislature has had to authorize "expenses" for the governor, secretary of state, state treasurer, auditor general and attorney general.

No. 4 amendment would remove the \$3 daily salary of members of the state legislature and it would permit legislators to fix salaries for the next term of office.

The fifth proposed amendment would liberalize the present 16-mill limitation of real estate taxes by authorizing the following: Extending from 5 to 20 years the period for which millage might be raised from 15 mills up to 50 mills; decreasing the two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The referendum concerns the Callahan act, adopted by the 1947 legislature, which provides for regulation and registration of foreign agents. This law was aimed at Communist agitators. The referendum was sponsored by "left-wing" elements.

In less than three weeks these issues will come before voters for

decision. The deadline is approaching fast.

No. 2 of the proposed amendments is the controversial repeal of sales tax diversion. Such diversion was approved by a majority of voters two years ago under a campaign sponsored jointly by critics and school teachers.

Unless this amendment is repealed, the legislature is likely to enact new or higher taxes to offset an inevitable deficit. One plan is a 5-cent sales tax.

School teachers and city employees are campaigning to defeat repeal of the amendment. They have a pocketbook interest in the outcome.

INDIANS MADE FIRST GIFT TO UNIVERSITY

Land, Totalling 1,920 Acres, Donated By Chiefs Back In 1817

First gift to the University of Michigan was 1,920 acres of land donated by some Indian chiefs 131 years ago on Sept. 29.

Located in the present Wayne and Oakland counties, the land was presented at the treaty of Fort Meigs in 1817. By the treaty the United States purchased a tract of land now in Ohio and Michigan, according to information in the Michigan Historical Collections at the University.

Fort Meigs was on the Maumee River at the site of the present Perryburg, Ohio.

Although the land never became a part of the University, its subsequent sale for \$5,888 did help to finance the infant institution which had been chartered Aug. 26 as the Catholopigenia or University of Michigan.

In recognition of this earliest gift, the University in 1932 established the scholarships for American Indians. To date 35 persons have qualified for the scholarships. Those eligible are recommended to the University by the office of Indian Affairs, Department of the Interior.

It is suspected that the Indians granted the land at the suggestion of Lewis Cass, then governor of Michigan, who acted as Indian superintendent for the U. S. at the treaty negotiations and who was greatly interested in the establishment of the University.

The Indian chiefs who participated in the treaty were representatives of the Wyandot, Seneca, Delaware, Shawnee, Potawatomi, Ottawa and Chippewa tribes.

Seven Lakes Being Readied For Fishermen

Seven trout lakes above the Straits, are being readied for fishermen, the conservation department reports.

Stunted fish populations have been poisoned in recent weeks by conservation department crews, preparatory to the planting of trout.

The U. P. lakes are Hemlock Lake, Luce county; Lost, Peasaut, Musgraves and Young, Luce; Inman, Marquette; and Ashford, Schoolcraft.

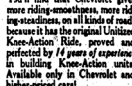


