Mrs. George Gray, 60, Killed Instantly Near Isabella Monday Evening

An accident in heavy fog early Monday evening claimed the life of Mrs. George Gray, 60, of Isabella, Mich. Mrs. Gray was driving her car on U.S. 2 near Isabella on U.S. 2. Mrs. Gray, his wife and his mother were traveling west to Manistique when the car driven by Gray crashed into the rear of a heavy trailer used for moving road building equipment, also traveling west at slow speed.

Mrs. Gray, who was killed instantly, suffered a broken neck and other injuries. Mrs. Gray, Sr. received severe head injuries, a broken nose and is suffering from shock. For several hours following the accident there was little hope that she would recover but her condition is improving. Benefits To County In Social Security Money Catalogued

Benefits under the Federal Old Age and Survivors Insurance program totalling \$57,460 a month are now in force for 2,122 residents of Chippewa, Delta, Luce, Mackinac, Manistowick and Schoolcraft counties, Carl L. Johnson, manager of the Escanaba field office of the Social Security administration announced this week.

The monthly benefits in the above area are distributed as follows: 953 retired workers, age 65 or over, receiving \$21,252 a month; 244 retired worker's wives, age 65 or over, receiving \$2,924 a month; 119 young widows with children workers, receiving \$2,640 a month; 661 children of retired or deceased workers, receiving \$8,105 a month; 132 widows, 65 or over, of insured workers, receiving \$2,640 monthly; and 13 dependent parents of deceased workers, receiving \$159 a month.

Gives Recipe For Prolonging Life Of Inlaid Linoleum

If you want your inlaid linoleum to have lasting good looks and give long wear, give it gentle care. Too much water, strong soaps and harsh cleaning agents are the worst enemies of linoleum.

Homemakers will shorten the life of their linoleum by trying to keep them clean with abrasive floor polish, extension home management specialist at Michigan State college.

Best method of cleaning and protecting inlaid linoleum is to wash it with a mop or cloth wrung almost dry. Warm water and mild soap may safely be used for washing. It should be rinsed with clear warm water. After it has thoroughly dried give it two thin coats of wax and polish thoroughly.

A good way to apply paste wax is to put about one-half cup of wax in an old stocking or two thicknesses of cheese cloth. Rub the cloth over the surface of the linoleum. Enough wax will work through the cloth to coat the surface evenly.

Worn places can be renewed by washing and rewaxing the spot. From time to time it is well to wash the linoleum with a damp cloth or mop wrung from water. Liquid wax of the self-polishing type may be applied occasionally to renew the finish and add to its wearing quality.

Dor's for linoleum care listed by Miss Meyer include using too much water which rots linoleum and loosens the edges or coating it with plastic, varnish or shellac. Finishes make linoleum hard, brittle and discolored.

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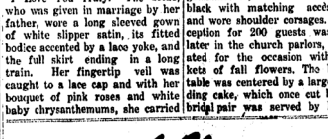
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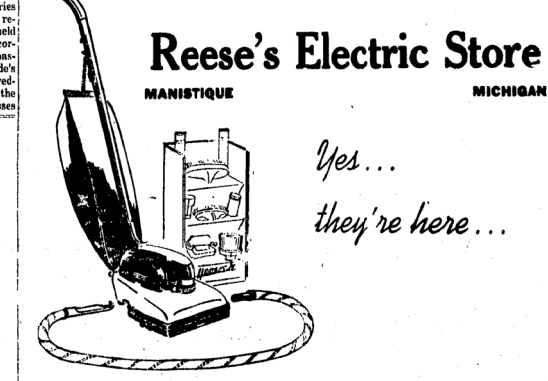

Manistique, Mich., Sept. 27, 1918. A regular meeting of the City Council was held at the City Hall on Monday, Sept. 27, 1918, at 7:30 o'clock p. m. There were present: Councilmen Berger, Burns, Schubert, Selman and Stephens. Absent: None.

The minutes of the meeting of Sept. 15, 1918, were approved as read. The minutes of the special meeting of Sept. 20, 1918, were approved as read. Street Superintendent Livermore presented an estimate of \$1192.95 as the cost of installing sewer and water on Bear Street west from Houghton Avenue, to serve Paul Marchand, Lots 5 and 6, Block 1, 1st addition to Village of Hiawatha, and All Hutchinson, Lots 10 and 11, Block 1, Riverside Addition. After considerable discussion it was agreed that because of possible future benefits to City if the installation is made, a cost of \$1200.00 to the two applicants would be fair, provided that an initial cash payment of \$100 is made to conform to City charter requirements.

Mrs. Louise Welch, 306 Chipewa Avenue, spoke to the Council on the need of a sickle ordinance. She was informed that the Council was not prepared at this

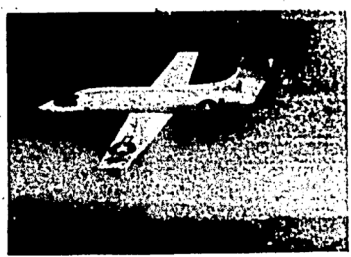
time to take definite action. Edith Hallinger, 550 Delta Avenue, asked for a lowering of her City tax on the basis of inability to pay. She was advised to appear before the Board of Review in June, 1919.

Willis Burns, Fairview Cemetery Station, spoke to the Council about the need of a power lawn mower and a new water system at the Cemetery. City Clerk was directed to advertise for bids on a complete new water system.

RESOLVED that after inspection of City shop plant, necessary repairs be, and they are hereby authorized to be made. Yeas: Councilmen Berger, Stephens, Berger, Burns and Selman. Nays: None.

A communication from Schoolcraft County Dept. of Social Welfare was read, showing direct expenditures of \$74292 in the city for August, 1918. Ordered placed on file. A letter from Francis Engineering- craft County Dept. of Social Welfare was read for information only. Milk Report dated Sept. 22, 1918,
