Game Violation Cases Swell Local Coffers; Justice Court In Swing Of Busiest Season

Many Pre-Season Offenders Apprehended; Headlights Face Trial

Game violators, here of conservation officers just before and during the entire two weeks of the annual deer hunting season. The annual deer hunting season is being held in a steady procession into the hands of the Justice Court during the past week.

Fines, for a varying number of dollars, ranging from \$25 to \$10, and coupled with court costs in each case the city and county coffers are being replenished with "light" money from unwary hunters.

Two youths, 18, from Detroit, were fined \$25 and \$50 costs Thursday for headlighting. They were Bob Smith and Kenneth Macomber, arrested shortly after midnight Thursday by conservation Officer Ernest Darwin in Haw-towship. They are lodged in the county and pending payment of their fines.

Case Postponed

Three Manistiquette men charged with headlighting, Isadore Rook, William and Amos, were held in jail Monday for want of witnesses. The law court officers who would be called upon to testify would not have to leave their stings in the woods during the hunting season.

Six downstate hunters from the Detroit area were brought into court Monday for conservation Officer Lenox Walstrom, who arrested them in Seney township.

Three of them, Wallace Ward, Eugene Henze and Al Baumert, paid \$50 costs following their plea of guilty to a charge of illegal possession of a gun in a game area prior to the opening of the season, and two, James G. Brown and Alvin H. Brown, were fined \$10 and \$50 costs for carrying loaded guns prior to the opening of the season.

NONE KILLED IN DEER HUNT SO FAR IN SEASON

Township Supervisors, City Councilmen Approve Hospital Grants At Informal Meeting

Special Session Held Wednesday Evening; \$40,000 To Be Sought

LaGrange, Ill. Man Suffers Heart Attack Early Monday Morning

Joseph Kuhlman, 49, of LaGrange, Ill., was found dead of a heart attack about 10:00 a. m. Monday morning, opening day of the deer season, by George Schwickert, of Manistique, a hunting companion.

Kuhlman's body was approximately two miles from the camp on the West Branch where he and a party of hunters were spending several days. The body was taken to the Morton funeral home and was shipped to LaGrange Tuesday morning for burial. Kuhlman's brother, Frank, who was hunting with him, accompanied the body to LaGrange.

Kuhlman had been hunting in this area for several seasons. It is believed that the heart attack was induced by the exertion of walking over rough terrain. He had left the camp about 6:30 a. m.

SHRINERS GIVE \$1,500 TO BAY CLIFF WORKSHOP

Proceeds Of Circus At Marquette Last Summer To Aid Polio Victims

Ahmed Temple, Nubles of the Mystic Shrine, has presented a check for \$1,500 to Miss Ethel L. Morse, superintendent of the Bay Cliff health camp, for establishment of a workshop at the camp. The amount represents Ahmed's entire profits from the Polack Brothers Shrine circus, which appeared in Marquette last summer. Over 100 Manistique children attended.

Accompanying the check mailed to Miss Morse was a letter, signed by Yining L. Bjork, potestate; Walter C. Dredahl, recorder; and Roy C. Fongliuth, chairman of the circus committee. It follows:

"At a recent meeting of Ahmed Temple, it was voted unanimously to contribute the sum of \$1,500 to Bay Cliff health camp. This represents the entire proceeds to Ahmed Temple from the Polack Brothers Shrine circus, which was staged July 22, 23, and 24, 1948.

"The check is enclosed and we sincerely hope that it will bring as much pleasure and benefit to you and your organization as Ahmed Temple has in presenting it."

Only Part of Shriners' Aid— Presentation of the circus profits to the Bay Cliff health camp is only part of the Shrine program for helping underprivileged and crippled children.

Ahmed Temple— composed of 1,066 members from all parts of the upper peninsula—participates in maintaining Shrine hospitals in the United States, annually sending a part of each member's dues to the national organization for that purpose. It also has set up a fund for the purpose of defraying traveling expenses for needy persons going to the nearest Shrine hospital, in Minneapolis.

Then, early in December of each year, it stages a party for members in the Manistique temple. The price of admission is a gift or donation of money and all of the proceeds are used to spread Christmas cheer among underprivileged children in such institutions as the Holy Family orphans' home.

SPORTS ANFIELD

There is no quicker way to judge an out-of-control man than by the way he looks and uses his ax. Here's a check list, prepared by Writer Harold Rogers, so you can test yourself.

Keep your ax sharp. A dull ax is dangerous as well as useless. Keep the handle tight. An ax with a loose head is as dangerous as a loaded gun.

Male sure that brush, branches or other obstacles are cleared away before beginning to chop. Secure a firm footing.

In cold weather warm your ax before beginning to chop. Chop on a firm wood block, and direct each blow toward the block.

An ax is not a hammer or a wedge. Don't use it as such. When not in use, keep your ax sheathed and up off the ground.

If you are purchasing your first ax, choose the single bit type. It is by far the best from the standpoint of both safety and utility for the average camper. The ax should weigh at least two pounds, and under no consideration should the handle be less than 24 inches long.

Ordinarily a new ax will have to be sharpened to give its best performance. To put it in shape use a wet grindstone, not an emery wheel. Start the grind back two or three inches from the cutting edge, making the grind semicircular or fan-shaped. About one half inch from the edge make a level down to the edge. Once you have ground your ax on both sides you will seldom, if ever, need to use a grindstone again. You can keep it in fine shape with a flat file and a sharpening stone.

When using the file never drag it back over the ax. Push the file from the blade toward the back of the ax. Lift it up and carry it back before repeating your stroke.

Finally, to put a keen cutting edge on your ax, hone it with the sharpening stone, using a circular motion from heel to toe, then turn the ax over and hone it on the opposite side, this time from toe to heel.

Complete Study Of State Land Use In The Peninsula

An eight-year study of the best uses to which state-owned lands in the upper peninsula can be put is completed.

The conservation commission has approved the sale or exchange of 21,026 acres of state-owned lands and the dedication to public uses of an additional 17,110 acres of Haughton and Keweenaw counties.

County and township land use committees have worked with the conservation department since 1940 on studies of soil character, topography, forest growth and present uses of such state-owned lands, most of which reverted to the state because of non-payment of taxes. In most instances, recommendations of local committees have been accepted, although the department has reserved for public use those lands lying within dedicated projects such as state forests and game areas, water frontage lands and acreage needed for access sites to lakes and streams.

Disposition of the lands remaining in the four counties of Gogebic, Keweenaw, Ontonagon and Houghton completes the work in the upper peninsula and only a relatively small acreage below the Straits is still to be disposed of.

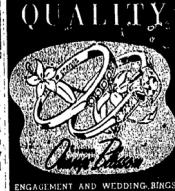

MSC Dean Defends Farmers in Blame For High Prices

Those who place the blame for high food prices on the American farmer are not familiar with facts or the philosophy of farm people according to E. J. Anthony, dean of the school of agriculture at Michigan State college. "Facts show the production of food products on American farms has increased steadily since 1938. Today the production of all farm products is 50 per cent greater than the base 1910-1914 average."

and nearly 30 percent higher than the 1936-1940 average," the dean pointed out. "The farmer is normally not a hoarder of surplus. He wants to produce more because he has always worked on the theory that the more he produces from his land without causing lasting harm to the soil, the more income he will have to spend for things that make life more enjoyable."

He remarked: "I see the latest federal survey shows the average Michigan farm operator is working only 11.8 hours a day compared with 12.1 hours a day in 1946. Perhaps they're enjoying that 20 minutes a day trying to figure out how they can buy the lumber at present day inflated prices to make needed repairs on their barns."
