Department of Labor Cites
Advantages of Older Workers

WASHINGTON—A survey by the
department of labor indicates that
men and women workers in the 45-
or older age group offer "distinct
advantages" to employers over
younger workers.

The survey, made public by the
department's bureau of labor sta-
tistics, is a six month study of the
work records of about 18,000 workers
of all ages, including 1,300 women.
The summary, according to the
BLS, showed that:

"Not only may the worker in the
45-and-over age group offer more
highly developed skills, more mat-
ure judgment and more settled
work habits at a given time, but
he is frequently less likely to be absent
and is less prone to injury than the
younger worker."

The survey showed that the
younger worker has an advantage
over the older one in this respect,
however. Although the younger
worker is injured more often, the
older worker, when hurt, takes
longer to recover.

Workers not yet 20 had the high-
est absentee rate—an average 5.8
days out of 100 work days. The
absentee rate for the 45-year age
group was 2.4 out of 100.

Englishman Walks Across the
River Thames in 17 Minutes

LONDON—Joe Simms walked
across the River Thames—in the
water. That is, he walked in the
water, not on it.

Simms, a 51-year-old railway
checker at Southampton docks, was
demonstrating what he claims to
be a new method of progressing
through water developed after 18
years of research.

Simms entered the river wear-
ing a pair of bathing trunks and an
old tweed cap. With his arms
folded and his hands on his abou-
tments he took 17 minutes to cross
the river using "slow cycle action."
Two or three times he waded to
ground on a bridge and once took
off his cap.

Newspaperman who followed him
in a boat said he seemed to be
eering the whole time.

Arriving on the other side he
said, "This is something the Yanks
can't do."

Use of Natural Dyes
The merits of natural and veg-
etable dyes have been tried. For
fastness and greater variety of color
the commercial dyes are more reli-
able. However, the beauty of a veg-
etable dyed piece of cloth still holds
a charm for the weaver and the
embroiderer. The early pioneers of
Kansas used cotton skins, walnut
bark and other natural materials for
dyeing. Margaret Eberhardt
Shanklin points out in "Use of
Native Craft Materials." Easter eggs
were wrapped in onion skins and
placed in a hot salt or vinegar bath
to make them red or yellow. Little
boys' suits were dyed a rich dark
brown with walnut shells. The stain-
ing of berries was used for blue
and purple.

tion. Agner Dehlin, chairman of the
board, who cast a dissenting vote,
said at the time that resort commis-
sioners were seriously opposed to
this issue.

Now, no one denies that this is a very noble, very worthwhile, and very worthy project. But, Mr. Editor, what caused you to throw your good judgment to the winds and openly advocate the violation of the law unless that law demands a city attorney which you published in your own paper?
It seems to me that there is but one policy that can follow and that is to advocate that the law and the legal opinion of our law be carried out so long as it is that a man violate his duty to his God. At the same time it can advocate the changing of the law to what it deems the law ought to be. Any other policy is very dangerous and would inevitably cause chaos.
Furthermore, in the present situation, there is a perfectly legal solution although it is perhaps a little slower than the one you suggest. Also, I think it would prove to be a far safer course to follow. The people, who originally approved a \$150,000 appropriation for the purposes of erecting this hospital, can by democratic vote increase that appropriation, if they see fit. It would take a little longer but such action would be both legal and moral. If the need is so great, perhaps some time could be saved by calling a special election.
I beg that you reconsider this matter very carefully and if you do not deem the suggested proposal advisable kindly give us a solution that is both legal and moral.

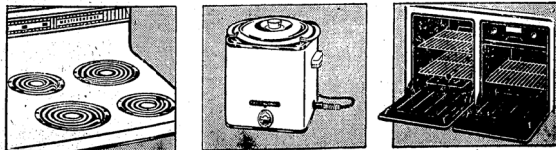

Christmas Music By Bach, Handel

For a great many people the music of Bach and Handel make difficult listening—until Christmas comes around. Then, suddenly, everybody starts singing and humming away by the top of their voices.

The reason for this is that both Bach and Handel were church-musicians. One of their tasks was to compose songs for church services. They proved themselves masters of beautiful, easily followed melodies in their Christmas music. Our most famous Christmas oratorios and carols came from Bach and Handel.

"How Brightly Burns the Morning Star" was composed by Bach and his "Christmas Oratorio" contains the themes of several other popular chorales.

In almost every town and village in America this Christmas a church choir will render at least a portion of George Frederick Handel's "Messiah." When chorales sing "Joy to the World" they'll be singing part of the "Messiah" too. Yet that carol comes from themes found in the great oratorio. Handel also composed the musical theme of "White Shepherds Watched Their Flocks."

It is a strange fact, but both Bach and Handel were born in 1685, lived for many years within thirty miles of each other, and never met. Yet today, the Christmas music they wrote is sung by men, women and children in countless churches of many faiths all over the world.

Pagan Rites Basis Of Many Customs

Strange as it may seem, most American Christmas customs stem largely from Pagan rites practiced long before the birth of Christ.

The custom of exchanging gifts is one of the few that springs from the Christian era. Christmas candies, bonfires and Yule logs arise from the heathen festivals observing the winter solstice, December 21, when the days begin to lengthen. That was a time of great rejoicing for ancient sun worshippers who built bonfires to give strength to the "winter sun-god."

Pre-Christian Romans ornamented their homes with green boughs and flowers for the Feast of Saturnalia which began December 17. Druids gathered mistletoe for that season, while ancient Saxons used holly, ivy and bay. Modern mistletoe and holly wreaths come from those people.

Christmas trees, too, spring from the ancient German days when Germanic tribes made sacrifices to the sacred oak tree of Odin. When the missionary St. Boniface traveled to Germany in the Eighth Century and saw these celebrations he persuaded the natives to substitute a fir tree for the oak and to adorn it in a tribute to the Christ Child.

During the Middle Ages the entire Christmas season was celebrated in equal fervor with that now shown on Christmas day. In some lands the celebration lasted from December 24 to January 6—Twelfth Night—and in others from December 21 to February 2. By the year 1644, Christmas in England had become such a wild orgy that the Puritans forbade its celebration by law.

Much Family Fun In Group Games

"Make it a real family Christmas this year by having Santa pack a few hobby supplies or games into his pack that the whole family can enjoy together." This suggestion comes from E. H. Rogner, a recreation specialist at the University of Illinois.

There are many hobbies that can help build companionship between parents and children. Mothers and daughters like jewelry construction and tapestry weaving. Dad and Junior go in for model-making—airplanes, boats, trains and other items of special interest to the male population.

Everyone enjoys operating a printing press. Small presses turn out newspapers that have a real professional look. Shellcraft and woodburning are hobbies that produce genuinely useful articles. For family fun, rubber-tipped darts, indoor plastic horseback and marble games are excellent. "Christmas is a time of 'togetherness,'" says Rogner. "Let's capitalize on the situation by starting a game or hobby that will encourage the same type of companionship the year around."

Santa Pictured By Thomas Nast

Thomas Nast, the famous cartoonist who created our conception of Uncle Sam, the Republican elephant and the Democratic donkey, is also credited with giving America its first modern pictorialization of Santa Claus.

Nast first sketched his notion of Santa Claus in 1873. This Santa was a rollicking, chubby old man smoking a pipe and dressed in what looked like a night shirt with a collar and cuffs. Since that day he has grown taller and rounder, has developed a full white beard and mustache and has acquired the traditional red suit bordered in ermine.

Allan Schuster, 19, Was Star Halfback On Post Grid Team

Fort Monmouth, N. J.—Cpl. Allan Schuster, star halfback on the post football team, was discharged from the Army this week. It was announced by post athletic authorities today.

Est Globe Artichoke

Although classed as a distinct species, the globe artichoke is closely related to the cardoon, grown commercially in California for its edible leaf stalk. Not so closely related, but frequently confused with the globe artichoke because of its name, is the Jerusalem artichoke, a tuberous-rooted sunflower—sometimes grown for its edible root. The globe artichoke is a herbaceous perennial; that is, the top dies down each year but are renewed from the roots below the soil. Each summer when the seeds mature, the leaves and stems above ground die, but the roots and crown remain alive and more or less dormant to await the advent of favorable growing conditions. The marketable portion of the plant, the so-called bud, is really the immature flower head made up of power buds and numerous bracts or scales, closely held one upon the other. The buds range from one to four inches in diameter. The edibility portion consists of the tender leaves at the base of the young flowers, and the acceptable, the latter being the fleshy base upon which the flowers are borne.

Students to Help Sell Christmas Tuberculosis Seals

The 1948 sale of Christmas TB seals started this week in local schools and the cooperation of the public is sought in the annual campaign for the treatment of tuberculosis sufferers.

Money from the seals provides free chest X-rays regularly. The X-ray service has been offered to the people of this community three times within the last five years.
