Fire Chief Baul Issues Warning About Tree Lights Made In Japan

Fire Chief Elmer Baul appealed Wednesday to Manistique residents who have purchased Japanese-made Christmas tree lights not to use them because of the danger of fire.

Some of the Japanese bulbs have been sold here as in many other cities throughout the country, the fire chief has learned, and everyone who has purchased new bulbs this season are asked to examine them to be sure they are U. S. made.

The Japanese bulbs have "120V. Japan" stamped on the brass neck. One Japanese brand will set a piece of tissue paper on fire in three minutes.

Switches should be carefully checked for short circuits. No matches should never be lighted near the tree, he added.

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NEW CONTRACT NEGOTIATED BY INLAND, UNION

Six Cents Per Hour Wage Increase Granted; Good Year Predicted

A new labor contract for the year was negotiated Monday by officials of the Inland Linc and Stone company and the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers, Local 977, C. I. O., Monday morning. The contract becomes effective Jan. 1 and continues in force to Dec. 31, 1949.

Members of the union negotiating committee were Donald Arrowood, Charles Barley, Arthur Demers and Gene Sauri, International representative; W. Heitman, general superintendent of the company's operations, and Howard Graff represented the company.

Heitman announced that the new contract embodied a general wage increase of six cents per hour plus an adjustment in the rates of individual skilled and semi-skilled classifications to correct inequities amounting to the aggregate to an average of three cents per hour for a total average hourly increase of nine cents.

Heitman said that the business outlook for next year is good and indications are that employment will be at least equal to that of the past season. Inland will employ about 325 men this winter, only slightly less than its usual employment roll.

BABSON FORECAST TO BE PUBLISHED

Business And Financial Outlook To Appear In Pioneer-Tribune Dec. 30

Roger W. Babson's "Business and Financial Outlook for 1949" will appear in the Pioneer-Tribune on Dec. 30.

Mr. Babson, a pioneer in the field of business and financial statistics, enjoys a truly remarkable record for accuracy in his annual forecasts. His score for 1948 was 91% correct.

On January 1, 1948, Babson was the only commentator who dared to predict: (1) That there would be no World War III in 1948. (2) That "due to the bungling of the price controls, Mr. Truman has a fair chance of reelection."

(3) That the Dow-Jones Industrial Average would fluctuate between 100 and 150 during the year of around 185 and a floor of around 165, and that commodity speculation would be curbed.

RECORD FOR HOLIDAY MAIL AT POST OFFICE

Total of 23,580 Cards And Letters Go Through Cancelling Machine Monday

Holiday mailing in Manistique has reached an all-time high. Postmaster Frank M. Gierke reported Wednesday that a total of 23,580 cards and letters went through the cancelling machine on Monday.

Gierke said he believed the previous record for one day's mailing was something over 10,000. This figure does not include hand-cancelled envelopes which are not processed through the mailing machine.

Ivory Nuts for Baitless

The tagua plant grows wild in the steaming lowland jungles of the Pacific coast from Panama to Peru. Its cousin, the barba, is a similar stunted palm fern which grows in Brazil's upper Amazon valley. Big bur clusters develop all year round close to the stumpy trunks of the species. The nuts removed from mature clusters look very much like small potatoes and are used for making ivory buttons. Native laborers with machetes crack open the woody bur and take 15 to 200 nuts from each cluster. The nuts, a half year in forming, are first a clear, thirst-quenching liquid, then a sweet, milky substance and finally "vegetable ivory." The tagua nuts of the west coast are generally thought to be more like elephant ivory than those that grow in lowlands east of the high Andes range. Most of the ivory nuts are saved into flat slices, sorted for size and used in bags for shipping. It is now nearly a century since tagua first came to the rescue of the overtaxed supply of animal ivory.

Blaney Park Owners May Hire Own Officers To Guard Game Area From Hunting Violators

A decision to put special officers on Blaney Park property and to prosecute every hunter or fisherman who enters the fenced borders of the Blaney game preserve without permission was revealed recently by Ed Dreier, director of publicity for the Joe Hachmas resort, in a letter to P. J. Hoffmaster, conservation department director.

Declaring that game law violators "would turn your stomach," Dreier gave Hoffmaster a startling picture of the Blaney Park situation. His letter follows:

Dear Pete:
Maybe you get a lot of letters like this.

I have been hunting in Michigan for the past 22 years and I have never run across a year where deer hunting has been so much of a joke as it was this year.

and some of our native population, than the wildest land you have up here. Our guests have found deer does in the woods, not just a few, but a great many hunters up around the north line have told us they have seen from six to ten dead does.

A barber at Manistique heard a hunter boasting a companion for shooting a doe and a fawn, and the hunter said that he had hunted up here for five years without getting a buck and said he was going to shoot now until he got something with horns.

Another customer at the barber shop bragged that he had shot six deer before he got the one he wanted.

Some of our native population have brought hunters from Saginaw and other places onto Blaney Park property, and these hunters laughed at our guides when they were told to get off our property.

Your officer, Harold Peters, is doing a swell job up here, just as good a job as any one man could do, but it is more than a job for one man.

We have come to the conclusion that it is going to be necessary to put special officers on the property to protect our interests here but

that isn't going to protect all the deer that are being shot close to the borders and in the surrounding territory and shot regardless of age or sex. That is going to be something for the Department to do.

We have decided that we are going to prosecute every hunter or fisherman who comes within our fenced borders without permission, and we hope that we can find the proper lacking in the courts.

The law abiding citizens up here who have camps are getting scared about the way the deer are being shot. They feel that it will not be long until we won't have any deer around these parts, and that a man's life won't be worth much because these hunters shoot at anything that moves.

Here at Blaney Park we have promised protection to the hunters who come here as our guests, and we are going to see that they get it. I think this is a serious situation, this deer hunting business up here. 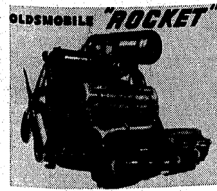

Mail Carriers Walk Many Weary Miles

Give a thought to the foot-sore mail carrier, who probably trudges more weary miles during Christmas week than does old St. Nick himself.

His mailbag will be even heavier this year than in 1947. Last December, the nation's postal service delivered 5,000,000,000 pieces of mail. They expect to break that record this Christmas.

You can help spare your mail carrier's burdens—and incidentally speed delivery of your own Yuletide letters, Christmas cards, and packages—by heading the Post Office Department's suggestions:

1. Shop now—get your Christmas mail and packages off as early as possible.
2. Wrap your gifts carefully. Address them plainly—Aunt Susie may be able to decipher your handwriting but not all postmen carry magnifying glasses and crystal balls. Register valuable letters. Insure valuable packages.
3. Be sure to put the full address on each piece of mail. Include city and zone numbers.
4. Send your Christmas cards by first-class mail. Put a three-cent stamp on every Christmas card and envelope. They are more personal that way, and if your friend has moved, the card will be forwarded. Third-class mail doesn't have that privilege.
5. Remember that Air Mail for letters and Christmas cards is only a nickel, and it will get them to distant points more quickly—especially if you slip up on Suggestion No. 1.

Whatever Name, Santa Is There

SANTA CLAUS is not always the merry, jovial, fat-clad saint behind a team of reindeer. There are almost as many versions of Santa as there are nationalities—Father Christmas, Kris Kringle, St. Nicholas or even Babouska. But, whatever his name, he is loved and welcomed by all children.

In America on Christmas Eve there is a merry tinkling of sleigh bells as Santa Claus drives in a sleigh drawn by eight reindeer, pauses just long enough to climb down each chimney. From a huge sack on his back he fills the children's stockings with toys and goodies. Gifts too large to be stuffed in the stockings are tied on glittering evergreen trees

as custom to single from Germany. In Finland Santa has elves who pass out gifts for him. This generous group is known as Wainemonten and Akko.

Babouska, a young and beautiful girl, brings her gifts in Russia. Grandfather Frost accompanies Babouska in a sleigh as he makes her rounds on Christmas Eve. In Italy has no Santa Claus, but in his place is a beneficent old witch, Befana, who sails through the air on a broom stick. She leaves her presents for the children beside the hearth.

Papa Noel, who is very similar to Santa Claus, reigns in Brazil. Like Santa, he wears a red suit and trav-



els in a sleigh drawn by reindeer, but he enters the house through a window instead of the chimney.

AN ANGEL, who descends on a golden cloud to accompany Santa, leads the gifts in Czechoslovakia.

Dwarfs bring the gifts to Scandinavian children, who in turn leave bowls of porridge on the doorstep for their benefactors. The gifts are distributed at the supper hour. In Sweden, every family places a sheet of grain on a pole or on fence posts for the birds' Christmas dinner.

Spanish children also place grain on the window sills so that the Magi may feed their horses when they bring the gifts. Older people also leave the room in general confusion for Christmas morning.

THE English children look for a J. Santa Claus who closely resembles our own. They also find gifts tied to a green Christmas tree but this custom has been in effect only since Queen Victoria was a young bride. Her husband, Albert, a German prince, introduced this Christmas tree.

FROM forests and woodlots of the United States a torrent of green rolls into the cities during the holiday weeks as farmers and growers market their annual crop of Christmas trees.

The twinkling tree which adds holiday cheer to practically every home in the nation is one of America's most invariable domestic habits. As a result, it has brought the Christmas tree business into the realm of "big business." Some 14 million evergreens are required annually. Their retail value has soared into the quarter billion dollar vicinity, the 1946 returns being estimated at \$2 billion dollars.

Cash returns from the sale of Christmas trees represent only a small fraction of their value to American agriculture. Thousands of farmers are using the lowly evergreen to anchor sand lands to protect the shifting soil from further erosion.

With exception of the prairie lands, virtually every state in the union produces Christmas trees, at least for local consumption. In the West, Colorado and Montana are the heavy exporters while in the East, the New England states compete with Canadian growers for the American market. Indeed, the heart of the Christmas tree country centers on upper Michigan, northern Wisconsin and Minnesota.

Thumb Sucking Not A Cause For Alarm Says State Expert

Your child sucks his thumb because it means security and comfort to him. It is advisable for you to let him do it. It is not a cause for alarm. Babies are born with a need to suck which comes to be associated with a pleasant, warm, full comforting feeling. It is no wonder that these young children turn to thumb sucking for them.

Many children under three years of age turn to thumb sucking when they are tired, hungry, excited or afraid. As children become older they find new sources of security and become better able to stand stress and strain.

It is better to steer away from the gadgets guaranteed to end thumb sucking—bitting mouthpieces, bandages, cuffs and guards. If your child is finding security and comfort in his thumb, it is too bad to invest money in a device that takes away his security. Devices don't always work.

The more you try to stop thumb sucking directly, the more it is likely to continue. The child turns to his thumb to ease him over some period of strain. If you try to stop him you just increase the strain for him and along with it you develop increased anxiety in yourself.

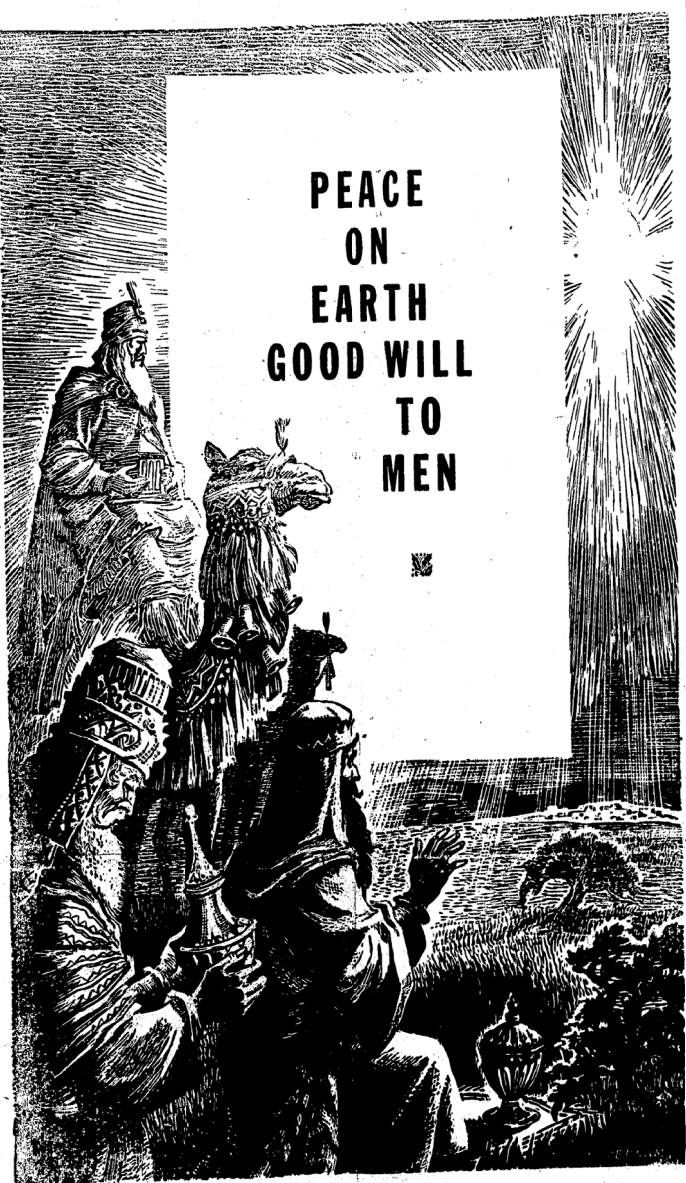

Columbus Unlucky On Christmas Eve

America's first Christmas was celebrated by Christopher Columbus. It happened on Christmas eve of the memorable year 1492. Columbus was planning to observe the Feast of the Nativity with the Indian chieftain, Guacanagari, who ruled over the island of Haiti. Already he had received fine presents from the chief who he believed to be great Khan of Cipango, that fabulous realm of the Orient. Columbus mistook the chief for a god but mistakenly thought he had found gold.

But Columbus' plans went wrong. He was so tired from long watches while the Santa Maria cruised the island channels that he retired to his cabin for a nap. While he was sleeping, the next in command also decided to take a rest and went below. The helmsman, as tired as the others, decided that he deserved a rest as much as they and turned the tiller over to a cabin boy.

Abandon Ship. The worst happened. Within a few minutes the Santa Maria was fast on a reef. The rolling surf drove the ship higher and higher upon the reef and opened her decks. Soon she fell over on her side and the water poured into her hull. Columbus and the crew were forced to seek refuge on his other ship, the Niña.

Early next morning Columbus sent word of the wreck to Chief Guacanagari. Promptly the chief sent a message to Columbus assuring him that he would give him all the assistance possible.

The noble chieftain was better than his word. He assembled a great flotilla of canoes and dispatched them to the Santa Maria to bring all its valuables ashore. Amid the cargo the natives saw many things that made their eyes open wide with envy. Yet so strong was their friendship for the white men and so careful Guacanagari's supervision that not a single article was stolen.

Christmas Banquet. After the last article had been brought ashore, Guacanagari had another plan. His guests had missed Christmas, but there was no reason why Columbus and the men should not enjoy the finest banquet he and his followers could provide.

There was game from the woods, lobster and fish from the sea; and all sorts of tropical fruits and vegetables. A thousand natives danced in Columbus' honor after the feasting and the climax of the ceremonies came when the chief brought out a coronet of gold and placed it upon Columbus' head. There were also presents of gold for the crew.

In the journal which he was keeping for Ferdinand and Isabella, Columbus wrote: "These people love their neighbors as themselves; their discourse is ever sweet and gentle, and accompanied by a smile. I swear to your majesties, there is not in the world a better nation or land."

Flowers Are Part Of Yule Legends

There are several flowers appropriate during the Yuletide season which are connected with the birth of Christ by the legends of history. "Soleilbon," or "Holy Hay," is said to have cradled the infant Christ in the manger. Early Report On Sale Of Christmas Seals Here Given

Dr. Albert E. Houstis, commissioner of the Michigan department of health, this past week urged "all Michigan people to buy double barred cross Christmas seals to the limit of their ability."

Dr. Houstis, whose appointment was confirmed on December 6 by the legislature at Lansing, stated that material contribution to the Christmas seal sale of the Michigan Tuberculosis association will result in continuing the Michigan tuberculosis association's "diligent work in cooperation with the state and local health departments to

reduce the toll of lives and human suffering caused by tuberculosis in this state." Report from the Michigan Tuberculosis association this week disclosed that Schoolcraft county residents had donated \$212.75 to the tuberculosis fight as of December 6, exclusive of school sales. Last year's grand total of funds raised in the "fight tuberculosis" campaign was \$832.23 in Schoolcraft county.

Forest Fire Loss Less Than In 1947

Statistics on the forest fire season for the upper peninsula this year reveal that the number of

fires handled and the acreage loss is less than in 1947, despite the fact that the past season was one of the driest in years. In District Four, which includes Schoolcraft, Lapeer, Mackinac and Chippewa counties and the east half of Alcona county, there were a total of 138 fires burning a total of 890.70 acres. The average acreage per fire was 6.45.

Increased Force Nabbed Violators

Violators of deer season regulation learned they had to fear not only the regular conservation staff and cooperating state park managers, but a sizable enforcement

crew transferred to the upstate hunting grounds. The conservation department reports that 1,438 violators have faced prosecution charges. Major conservation law violations included transporting loaded guns in an automobile, using artificial light to hunt deer possessing an illegal deer and hunting in closed seasons.

Arrests in the northern half of the lower peninsula totaled 633; the upper peninsula, 467, and southern Michigan, 58.

Adult Education Classes To Start Again On Jan. 4

Evening classes under the adult education program have been suspended until after the holidays. They will be resumed Jan. 4. It was announced this week by A. F. Hall, superintendent of schools.

Thousands of Bulbs On Largest Tree

Three thousand multi-colored electric bulbs and tons of Spanish moss decorate the world's largest Christmas tree located in Hilton Municipal Park at Wilmington, North Carolina. The giant, 300-year-old water oak rises to a height of 275 feet and its branches spread 110 feet.

Its magnificence has been enhanced by a radio station constructed beneath the spreading limbs from which emanates Christmas music that reaches the crowds from loud speakers concealed in the branches and an apparent voice from the heavens that comes from a speaker mounted atop a nearby giant water tower.

Thousands of people gather around it each night during December to listen or join in the Christmas caroling. The tree won its title as the largest Christmas tree in a contest held several years ago.

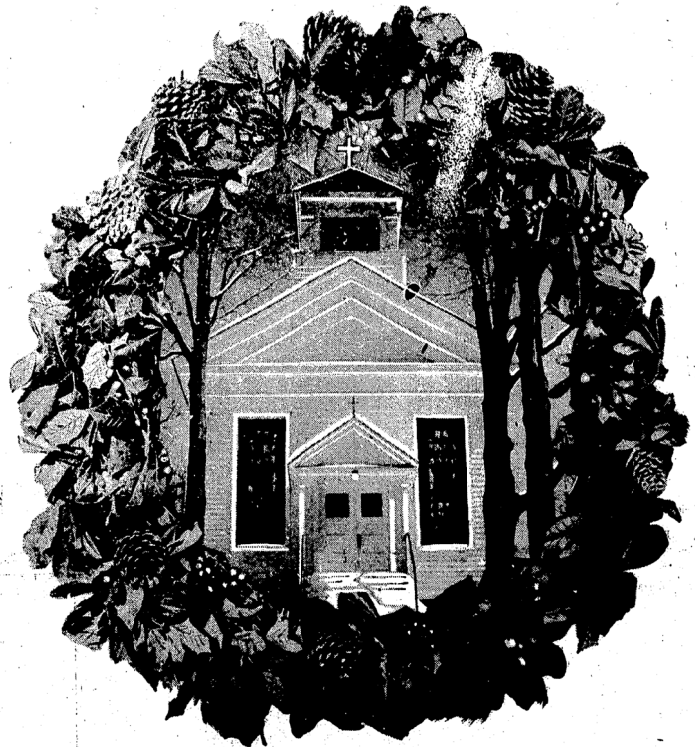

Buy a tree which has been cut as recently as possible.

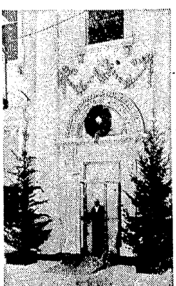

Some Safety Rules For Holiday Season It only takes a small amount of carelessness to turn the joyful Christmas holiday into a tragic event. The Christmas tree is the danger spot. There are a few simple precautions that will assure a safe and merry Christmas. Never burn real candles on your tree. Don't risk using frayed cords and broken plugs. Avoid placing powerful lamp bulbs near fancy ornaments, synthetic materials, paper or cotton. Don't go away and leave your tree lighted. Be very careful when smoking around Christmas package wrapping material. Secure the tree by wires to the wall so that tiny tots will not be able to bump or pull it over. Place your tree so that, standing or fallen, it cannot block a doorway which might be needed to escape from the room. If you go in for elaborate decorations, better make sure they're all made of incombustible material. Flameproofed materials can be purchased at many stores. Insist on them.
