Have Hugged \$7,500.

The following from Lansing appeared in Wednesday's issue of the Detroit News: "State Game Warden Chase S. Osborn, of the Soc. is here looking after some game legislation, and he gives out the bit of interesting information that county clerks have hugged about \$7,500 in the past two years that was contemplated should be used to increase the strength and efficiency of the staff of deputy game wardens. The law of '96 fixed the license fee for resident deer hunters at 50 cents, one-half of which was to go to the county

clerk who issued a license and the other half to the state fund for the game warden's department. About \$15,000 was collected but not a penny was turned in to the fund. The county clerks kept it all. What the game warden wants done this year is to increase the license fee to \$1, the clerk to keep 25 cents for himself and to pay over the balance to the state treasury for the warden's department."

Some of the amount received for licenses have required the state treasurer, for county clerk Ashford holds a receipt for \$25, that amount being one-half of the sum received for non-resident licenses. The law says nothing regarding the disposition of the money received for licenses from resident hunters so it remains with the county clerk.
