ELMER N. ORR, POSTMASTER.
Manistique's New P. M. Appointed on Friday Last

Elmer N. Orr, of E. N. Orr & Co., Druggists, was on Friday last appointed by the President as postmaster of this city and the confirmation will follow the official notification. The first intimation of his being appointed came by telegram from Fred Smith, Chicago, Friday afternoon, then came the announcements the following morning in the daily paper.

The appointment is a satisfactory one to the Republicans and to Manistiquites generally. Mr. Orr has always been an ardent, hardworking Republican since coming to this county some twenty years ago, he held positions of trust at the hands of the people, and at the present time is chairman of the Republican county committee; thus the appointment tendered him is a just recognition of his services to the party.

A. S. Putnam, the present postmaster, was appointed as Gray's Cleveland on March 15th, 1891 and the transfer of the office was made to him by W. H. Hill on April 1st following, thus his term of office will expire on the 14th of next month. It is hardly possible the new incumbent will take the office at that time as he has to be forwarded to Washington before the commission is issued. Elmer will devote his entire time to the post-office and will have an experienced man to assist him in the work.

From Mr. Orr we learn that the office will remain in its present location.

A Ford Murder at Lansing.

In a room over O'Leary's feed store, on Washburn street, Lansing, aged 25 body of Katherine C. Lauzon, April 25 was found. A large pool of blood with his head crushed almost to a pulp. Apparently he had been murdered with a hatchet or a hammer. There were fragments of the shirt left in front and rear. One blow struck the right eye, both ears were split, and the occipital bone was badly broken. The walls and floor of the room were covered with blood. The motive for the crime was evidently robbery, as Lauzon's pocketbook, open, bloodstained and empty was found. It is known that the murdered man had exhibited a large roll of bills on several occasions, and nothing was found in his pockets. Lauzon has been leading a dissolute life, associating with gamblers and fast women. About a year ago Lauzon married a Miss McDonald, of Lansing, who committed suicide for a divorce in Missaukee county a couple of weeks ago.

Sugar Heats a Success in Michigan.

A bulletin giving the results of experiments in the raising of sugar beets in Michigan has been prepared by Prof. K. V. and Dr. J. H. M. of the Michigan Agricultural college. Seed was distributed in 55 counties and samples of beets have been received from 41. The average percent of sugar in beets, with proper soil and seed, is 12.07. The range of yields per acre is 1,200 to 12,000 lbs. The professors state that the results on the soil are full of promise. The labor cost of growing an acre of sugar beets on the ordinary farm, under average conditions is \$2.75. The average yield per acre at the college farm was 10 tons and 325 pounds.

Various Hotel Fires.

The copper mines of Houghton county are worth about \$1,000,000. Test shafts have revealed deposits of anthracite coal about Saginaw. The Catholic church at Berlin, Tenn. has a value of \$100,000. MATTERS IN BRIEF.

Gen. Alger has recovered sufficiently to travel to Fort Monroe for his health. He was confined to a bed for some time at a cabin in Michigan. A gas engine is about to issue an order exempting from the provisions of the civil service law a large number of positions in the various departments in order to gratify highway office seekers. Capt. Lantz, in command of the Alert, has called the navy department that he has had married Miss Dunn, daughter of the American consul there, owing to the fact that a revolution has broken out in that country. Alfred Bradley, president of the Bradley Geddes & Taine Co., whose factory was destroyed by fire at Dayton, Ohio, from heart disease, brought back and from a vacation in Michigan, where he was treated at the configuration. He was overcome by the fire. Pando has issued instructions to his drivers prohibiting them to drive directly or indirectly in disregard of the effects being made to secure power, or to make attacks upon autonomy. The manufacturers prohibit also the driving of trucks and other vehicles in a friendly manner and prohibits with a declaration that any newspapers failing to comply with these instructions will be suppressed. Five men started to return over the line from their work on the Cleveland waterworks, which is five miles out in the lake. When they returned from land they discovered that they were on a detached ledge which was being blown into the lake. Their cries and frantic waving of their hands attracted the attention of states near the shore who telephoned for the fire boat the lumber. The lumber crashed her way through the heavy ice and rescued the men. Spain is seriously urging the Glasgow shipbuilders to hurry the work on the new Spanish war vessels.

ITEMS OF INTEREST.

PUNGENT PARAGRAPHS PICKED PROMISCUOUSLY.

The European Powers Harmonized on the question of China Grabbing—Lovers Characters Causing a Dignity of Terror at Skagway and Dyea.

Powers Agreed on Chinese Question.

In the British house of lords and in response to a speech by the earl of Kimberley, Premier Salisbury said that the British government is of the opinion that the Chinese government should be allowed to have a free hand to open a trade treaty port as a condition of the proposed loan, because China objected, until the railroad reached Tai-Lien-Wan when it should be opened. The loan negotiations are still pending. The premier added: "I have received spontaneous assurances from the Russian government that for any port they open in China will be open to free commerce, and that similar assurances have been made us by the German government respecting the territory they are occupying."

A TERRIBLE CATASTROPHE.

Eleven People Killed, 27 Missing and 100 Injured at Skagway. A fire mysteriously ignited completely destroyed the large six-story old store-plant of the Chitanaqua Lake Ice Co., at Pittsburg, within three hours, and struck down with it three heavy fire walls into practically four buildings. The ice company had its ice-making plant and storage warehouse on the top of the building, and the Union Stock Co. occupied the balance of the building with the stored property of innumerable householders and the city had no other means of getting whisky in bond. When they reached the whisky the stuff exploded, blowing out the Mulberry alley wall with a crash, and in a moment the firemen, policemen and reporters, and the large substance of W. A. Howler, president of the stock exchange, were opposite the Chitanaqua Co. building was also destroyed.

Scotch Being Found at Skagway.

Senator Wilson, of Washington, called at the war department and urged that no whisky be allowed to pass out of the army of the government to the military camp at Dyea and Skagway, Alaska, especially at the latter place where fears are expressed that whisky will be smuggled with the aid of some gold seekers.

LABOR BILLS IN CONGRESS.

The House committee on Labor has reported four bills that will interest all wage earners. The first one provides for the appointment of a non-partisan commission to collate information and to consider and recommend legislation to meet the problems presented by labor, agricultural and capital.
