The Baltimore will also go on this route, and as the business between that city and points on the big bay is not considered sufficient to warrant so much tonnage it will probably be a case of a "survival of the fittest."

The Monongah River Lumber Co. last week effected a deal with the Diamond Match Co. of Ohio, and the sale of a million feet of select stock. The lumber is now in the Monongahue yards and will be brought to the match block factory in Menominee, where it will be converted into match blocks and the waste sent to the match factory at Ashlock, where it will be made into lumber.

Employees of the machine shop of the Chicago Northwestern Ry Co. at Escanaba on Friday presented J. W. Clark, the retiring master mechanic with a beautiful diamond ring token of their appreciation of his treatment of them since his connection with the company which he has served in that capacity and has been brought in daily contact with them. Universal regret was expressed at his departure.

A stir was caused in Menominee church circles last week by the announcement of the resignation of Rev. George C. Lamb, pastor of the Presbyterian Church. The matter was kept secret until Wednesday evening, when Rev. Lamb handed in his resignation to the session. After prayer meeting a meeting of the session or directors of the church was called. The board was greatly surprised at the receipt of the resignation and begged time to consider.

A message from Watersmeet, Mich. a village fifty five miles east of Ironwood says that fire started on Main street, in the building formerly occupied by F. C. Payne & Co. Tuesday night, destroying the Commercial house, M. Kelley's store building, which was occupied as a dwelling, John Kelly's dry goods store, Ted Kelly's, saloon and Kelley's barber shop. The Iron building occupied by F. C. Payne & Co. was the only building on Main street that was saved. This is nearly the whole business portion of Watersmeet and amount of having no waterworks, the village was practically at the mercy of the flames.

Title to 27,000 Acres. The use of the title and the Michigan Land & Iron Company, over the title of the company to the lands which it purchased from the M. H. & O. railroad secured by that company as a government grant to aid in construction, came to a close Tuesday.

The hearing was held before Register Scudler and Receiver Halsey in the local land office. It was probably the hardest fought and certainly one of the most important cases ever tried before that tribunal. The amount of land involved is 27,000 acres, which includes valuable pine and mineral lands. For convenience in the hearing the land was divided into three classes and testimony was taken regarding each class separately. There have been several hearings, but in all seven days were occupied. As the points are substantially the same in all three cases the attorneys made the arguments for the three in one. The arguments which closed yesterday occupied two days.

Receiver Halsey Tuesday evening refused to give an opinion as to how long it would take himself and Mr. Scudler to reach a decision. The question is to be from three weeks to a month. Whichever way the case is decided an appeal is a practical certainty still both sides are anxious to win in the initial fight.

Makes Butter and Cigars. While in Detroit last week ex-Congressman S. M. Stephenson was approached by Senator Burrows who said: "Sam, I want to thank you for the roll of butter you sent. I did not know that you was a farmer until that butter came." "I am a farmer," said Stephenson, "and a dairyman. I am down on politicians and I stand with the farmers. You had better take steps accordingly. You will want no farmers to stand by." "When I went to Sam's house," said Senator Burrows, "he told me he was a farmer and he gave me a cigar. The tobacco of which he said was grown in the lot behind the barn." "It was," replied Stephenson. "You have not smoked a cigar like that since that day. Do you want another good cigar?" Here is one. "Thank you," smiled the senator accepting the cigar. "Sam makes those himself. He is poor and has to be like a hog rolls them out on rainy days from the tobacco grown behind the barn." "I am a farmer," said Stephenson, "and work my farm. Not in politics. I have 100 Jersey cows, make good butter and lots of it. And these cigars from my own tobacco."

CHARGED WITH BREWERY. Tim Nester Causes Arrest of Agent of Shaw Kendall Company at Manistique. News reached here today of sensational developments in the fight which is now in progress in Manistique over the building of the water works plant in that village. The plant was put in by the Shaw Kendall company of Dayton, Ohio. It is alleged the work was done in a haphazard and the village has so far refused to make a settlement.

Saturday on warrants got out by Village President Nester four of the complainants, Bissell, P. Moore, Bruno and Hanson, C. W. Case, a banker, and a representative of the Shaw Kendall company were arrested and put in jail. All of them secured bail and are at liberty pending their examination, which has not yet taken place.

The charges against the complainants are that they were guilty of influencing to favoring a settlement with the company. The charge against Mr. Case is not known. The charge against the representative of the company is that he had bribed the aldermen and attempted to bribe the President Nester. The latter alleges that the representative of the Shaw Kendall company sought a private interview with him. It was granted, and during the course of the interview the president was tendered a bribe of \$200 if he would stop the investigation. Mr. Nester claims that he can support this with indisputable proof in the local newspaper which would be in his office. The conversation was taken down verbatim.

As Mr. Nester was formerly mayor of Manistique the outcome of the case will be watched here with interest. Mining Journal, Manist.
