We Celebrate!

The 122nd Anniversary of American Independence to be Observed.

Will be the Most Successful Ever Held in the City's History.

Horse Races, Bicycle Races, Athletic Games and Other Attractions.

A Balloon Ascension and Parachute Drop May be a Feature.

Owing to the shock to the community caused by the receipt of the news of the sudden death of Abijah Weston, the Fourth of July meeting called for last Thursday was postponed until Monday evening of this week.

At this meeting a goodly number of our patriotic business men were present and the initial steps toward perfecting what promises to be the most successful Independence Day celebration ever held in the city, were taken.

The meeting was presided over by electing J. H. MacNaughton, chairman and E. E. Holmka, secretary. M. L. Casper, C. E. Kelso and V. P. Chappel were selected as a committee to solicit funds from the business men of the city to defray the necessary expenses.

A committee of arrangements to consist of five members who should be empowered to make all necessary arrangements and appoint all sub-committees was decided upon and upon motion the following gentlemen were selected: N. W. Fox, A. P. Ekstrom, Samuel M. Fox, A. McLarrin and W. L. Middlebrook. On motion of C. E. Kelso, V. P. Chappel was declared the unanimous choice for marshal of the day.

On motion of M. Blumrosen the soliciting committee was given until Monday next in which to perfect their report, a meeting for that purpose and to make all other necessary arrangements, to be held at the court house at 8 p. m. on that evening.

Tuesday morning, M. L. Casper, chairman of the soliciting committee, commenced his labors and at six p. m. had secured pledges to the amount of \$344, which was in excess of the total sum raised last year. The total sum subscribed up to the time of our going to press amounts to \$457 and is expected to easily swell it to \$750 by Monday evening. This amount will guarantee a hammer of a celebration and insure the success of the undertaking.

It is proposed to make the list of attractions far larger this year than ever before. The star attraction now receiving the attention of the arrangement committee is a balloon ascension and parachute drop by Prof. Ballevin & Collins of Collins, Mich. These gentlemen are artists in their line of work and their performance would prove the strongest drawing card that could be secured.

The usual horse and bicycle races will occupy a place on the program. Manistique has possessed the speediest bicycle riders on the peninsula for several years past and it is confidently expected that they will hold their proud position during the coming year.

Athletic and aquatic games will also be held and prizes will be offered to the men of brawn and muscle.

In the forenoon a monster parade of business firms, etc., will take place. It is expected that this feature of the day will be more extensively participated in than has been the custom before.

C. E. Kelso has informed the arrangement committee that the driving park will be thrown open for the various races, etc., free of charge. This insures ample grounds for this class of sports and will be an improvement over the custom of holding them on the streets.

An attempt will be made to secure a first class ball game as an attraction. V. P. Chappel has the matter in charge and will endeavor to get a game with some outside team. Manistique has a number of good players who would constitute a team that could put up a strong game.

The various sub committees will be appointed at the meeting next Monday evening and there should be a general turnout of our business men. Let every one put their shoulders to the wheel and make the 122nd anniversary of American Independence a day long to be remembered in Manistique.
