Death of I. M. Weston.

I. M. Weston, formerly proprietor of The Grand Rapids Democrat and at one time a resident of Milwaukee, died a few days ago in New York of Bright's disease. ORDINANCE NO. 22.

AN ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO THE SALE OF GOODS, WARES, MERCHANDISE AND SUPPLIES.

The Village of Manistique ordains:

SEC. 1. It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to be engaged in the sale or peddling of any goods, wares, merchandise or supplies on the public streets or from house to house or from vehicle, booth, stand, table, or on and upon the wharves, public grounds or buildings or by auction, except mortgage sales and sales under the judgments of courts, within the limits of the Village of Manistique, whether by sample or otherwise and whether for present or future delivery without having an established place of business within the limits of said Village or having obtained a license therefor from the Clerk of said Village.

SEC. 2. The Clerk of said Village of Manistique shall issue a license for the purpose mentioned in the preceding section, to any person or persons applying for the same upon payment of the following license fee:

For the sale or peddling of merchandise, goods, wares or supplies from house to house Two (2) dollars per each day.

For the sale or peddling of merchandise, goods, wares or supplies from booths, stands, tables, hotels or in and upon wharves, public grounds or buildings. Four (4) dollars for each day.

For the sale of merchandise, goods, wares or supplies by auction Ten (10) dollars for each day.

SEC. 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding Thirty (30) dollars and the costs of prosecution and in default of the payment of such fine and costs, such person shall be imprisoned in the common jail of Schoolcraft County for a period not exceeding Forty (40) days, or until such fine and costs are paid, provided that the whole term of such imprisonment shall not exceed forty days.

SEC. 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after twenty days from the date of its passage and approval.

SEC. 5. An ordinance heretofore entitled "An ordinance relative to the sale of goods, wares and merchandise" passed and approved by the Council of the Village of Manistique on the 20th day of June A. D. 1891 is hereby repealed.

CONSTITUTED HIMSELF A KING.

Neil Gallagher Wants War Department to protect his People.

Deputy Attorney General Chase returned to his home at Lansing from Charlevoix Wednesday morning where he went Monday to prosecute the Beaver Island fishermen. The case was postponed until Dec. 22 because of a peculiar situation. Chase found that Neil Gallagher, who has constituted himself king of the islands since Fr. Gallagher's death, has been very busy since the arrests were made.

Not one of the witnesses from the islands, subpoenaed by the state, showing up. All had mysteriously disappeared, but Neil and his son showed up and demanded trial. Knowing the witnesses would not be there and wanted to know what the state was going to do about it. Bench warrants were issued for the witnesses and the entire sheriff's force is searching the country for them.

Chase also discovered that all the nets and tackle, \$700 worth, confiscated by the state and stored at Charlevoix, had been stolen by the fishermen. Gallagher told Deputy Chase he had no knowledge of anything, as he (Gallagher) had nothing to do with the state, but was a citizen of the United States and plied his vocation on the high seas. He said he had written to the war department to send a fleet to protect his people and their property.

What Barbers Want.

Seventy-five barbers met in the Hotel Normandie shop and introduced a bill to be presented to the next session of the legislature, calling for the examination and licensing of barbers and the appointment of an examining board by the governor. The board will consist of a barber to serve one year, another to serve two years and a physician to serve three years. After that time the term of office is to be three years. The state shall allow each member \$5 a day for expenses during the time of meeting which shall be four times a year at different places in the state. Applicants shall be examined on their ability to prepare and fit for use ordinary barber tools including proper antiseptic treatment of the same and upon the nature and effect of common skin and scalp diseases. A fine of from \$5 to \$50 and imprisonment in the county jail for a period not to exceed 20 days in the penalty attached to running a shop without a certificate. Detroit Journal.
