To Saint Anne's shrine.

A special train will start from Minneapolis over the Soo line in the afternoon of July 14th for the leading shrine of St. Anne de Beaupre near Quebec, passing through Manistique, July 16th.

The shrine of St. Anne de Beaupre, which has been for over 30 years the rendezvous of devout pilgrims seeking restoration to health, is twenty-one miles from Quebec. The primitive little church was replaced by a larger structure in 1620 which was subsequently enlarged, rebuilt in 1782, and again in 1828, and converted into a chapel still occupying the original site near the sacred spring whose waters are claimed to have miraculous properties.
