IMPROVEMENTS, ETC.

St. Francis de Sales' Catholic Church Undergoing Many Changes.

The hot air furnace purchased from the R. P. Decker Heating & Ventilating Co., Chicago, has been put in place and other improvements to the basement costing over \$500 have been made. The interior of the church is going to be frescoed and otherwise decorated, the contract being let to D. J. Ward. The exterior of the church and the parsonage will be painted by Gust. Ekstrom. The fixtures and reflectors for electric light will be put in the church and the ceiling will be beautifully illuminated. Several beautiful engravings of stone composition were recently purchased from the Duprato Statuary Co. and the ladies of the societies of the church will add some fine statuary from Bernadini & Co., of New York importers of statuary and fine art.

All these improvements will be made under the direct supervision of Father Kunes, the pastor, who made his pastoral visitation to his parishioners lately and collected at the same time a neat sum of money. Father Kunes expects that with his collection and an entertainment to be given on the 18th and 19th inst. to be able to pay for all these improvements.

When the improvements proposed are completed, the pastor expects Father Hodges of New York to deliver a lecture and the Rt. Rev. Frederick Eis, D. D., the present bishop of Sault Ste. Marie and Marquette to administer the sacrament of the confirmation to about one hundred children and about fifty adults.

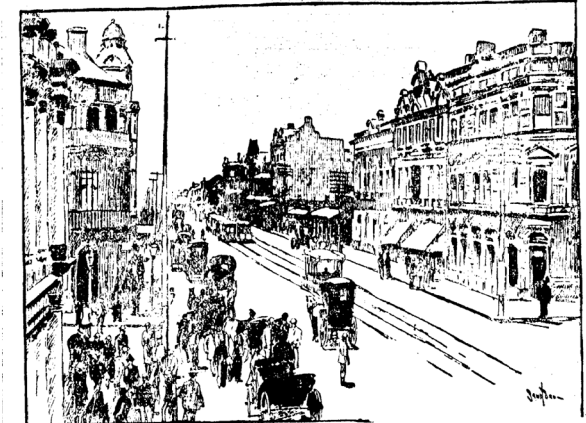

all taxpayers: The Board of State Tax Commissioners for the State of Michigan, carrying into effect Act No. 154 of the Public Acts for the State of Michigan for the year 1910, being an amendatory act to the General Tax Laws of this State...

Accordingly we offer you our services and the force of our office that these results may obtain.

The rolls for this year have been made and reviewed under existing law, but with your help much may be accomplished in preparation for the assessments for 1910 and coming years.

At this time it is not deemed necessary to detail the diverse methods and schemes employed, but which is common or general understanding, whereby property subject to taxation escapes taxation or is not put upon the rolls for one reason or another, or under such a violation that often rank inequality takes place.

A DAY AT MUNISING.

A Short Write-up of What we saw and Heard While There.

Hidden behind hills towering places nearly 400 feet above the lake level and covered with verdant foliage, looking for all the world as if matted with green velvet, lies the beautiful little city of Munising. The little city is situated on a level plateau at the base of the hills and within almost a stone throw of the business and residential portion of the place lies the mirror-like Munising bay, and to have no equal as a harbor on the great Superior. Through the west channel one passes Grand Island, which is some thirty miles in circumference and is the home of the Williams family who have sold there more than fifty-five years. To the westward, and within three miles of the city, are the famed Pictured Rocks which raise out of the water to the height of 350 ft. and perpendicular. Of note are the 'Rocks' are Miner's Castle, Miner's Falls, the Grand Portage, Chapel Beach, etc. To the east and not far distant from East Munising, hidden in almost a tangle of scruboak and a considerable elevation is Munising Falls. To reach the falls one follows a path through a pretty ravine and although the climb is not without the liking of the rotund pedestrian it is well repaid for making the trip. The recess into the mountain is horseshoe shaped and over its top a ribbon of crystal water, the thickness of one's hand, falls about 75 feet to the rock below and then winds its way down through a craggy ravine and up to Superior. Early in the fifties Henry Schoodercraft, the celebrated ethnologist and explorer, who in 1850 was geologist to the Cass expedition to Lake Superior, accompanied by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, first visited at Pictured Rocks. A more picturesque spot along the shores of the great Superior cannot be found than exists where now is located the thriving and pretty city of Munising. Located on the bay is the residence of many of Munising's people and for miles one can see the waters flowing with the wealth and grandeur of the Scenic plying between Sault Ste. Marie, Marquette and other points on the coast of Munising and nearby every Summer excursion are run to Pictured Rocks. Powell Point, lying to the west, is also a beautiful spot and is visited by many tourists.

Industries that furnish labor for Munising people are many, among them the Munising Leather Co tannery, the largest in the world, is located at east town; the Barite saw mill, said to be one of the best plants in the peninsula; the Northwestern Concrete Co's plant; the Blinn Cedar Co's plant and H. M. Lord's Saw mill.

Munisingites think that the condition of their town will be greatly improved when the new furnace is in operation. "Oh, yes, we are going to have the furnace," said one of Munising's leading citizens, and pointing toward the Anna River. "It is to be located right down there, an ideal spot for such a big plant."

There are several handsome business blocks in the city, among them one being erected by Messrs. Marke, a merchant, built of red sandstone, which is metropolitan in appearance.

John McCarthy, a few years since a resident of Munising, and is well known and popular hotel man, is running the Hotel Munising and doing quite well. He is as happy and genial as of yore and always glad to meet Munising friends.
