HOME AGAIN

Admiral Dewey and Cruiser Olympia Arrive in N. Y. Harbor, Tuesday.

Cruiser Taken to Government Anchorage Wednesday Morning.

The Gallant Admiral and the Crew in Best of Health.



Made to the surprise of every one in New York, the Olympia, with Admiral Dewey on board, arrived off the Sandy Hook light ship at 3:55 Tuesday morning. There was a very heavy mist on the sea, and at first the marine observers were inclined to think the vessel sighted might be Rear Admiral Howison's flagship, the Chicago, hardly believing Dewey could arrive two days ahead of time.

The doubt was soon cleared away, however, and as passing vessels recognized the flag-ship from Myrtle bay there was a continuous blowing of whistles in salute. One of the first large vessels to sight the Olympia was the passenger steamer Sandy Hook, of the Sandy Hook line, which left Atlantic Highlands shortly after 7 o'clock for New York dock. Just as she got well under way a war vessel was seen through the fog, and passengers and crew, headed by the Sandy Hook's captain, gathered at the rail to read the newcomer's name. To get near enough to do this the Sandy Hook changed her course and headed directly for the Olympia, lowering her white ensign as she did so. As soon as the name was made out the Sandy Hook's passengers cheered with all their might, and in a few moments an answering cheer came over the water from the warship's sails, many of whom were gathered on deck.

The flag-ship came up to the lower bay and anchored inside Sandy Hook. As soon as the anchor was dropped an orderly was sent ashore with dispatches from the admiral and other officers. He said the ship had had a pleasant trip across the Atlantic and that all on board were well and glad to be home again.

Gov. Roosevelt, with the entire staff, and under escort of the naval militia of the State of New York made his official call upon Admiral Dewey on board the Olympia at 1 o'clock Thursday. He was accompanied by Gen. Francis V. Greene, and all the ex-captains of Admiral Dewey's fleet. After Gov. Roosevelt's official call, he held a reception on the old frigate. New Hampshire men were the first to be welcomed, next the members of the naval militia of the State of New York, moored at Tompkinsville.

Flag Lieut. Drumbly, of the Olympia, called on Mayor Van Wyck Wednesday. The visit was merely formal and Lieut. Drumbly conveyed to the mayor the respects of the admirals and the crew. It was the return of the visit paid by the mayor's secretary to the Olympia Tuesday.

The following is the program of the reception: Welcome of the Cruiser Olympia by Rear Admiral Sampson and North Atlantic squadron was held yesterday. In the evening, illumination of New Harbor.

Tuesday, welcome by the city of New York. Naval parade to Grant's tomb, fireworks and illumination North and East rivers by night.

Saturday, Sept. 29. Presentation of loving cup to Admiral Dewey by city of New York. Land parade, with 50,000 men in line. Review of parade by Admiral Dewey at Dewey arch, South pier at Waller-Astoria for Olympia's duty.

On Sunday the admiral will be the guest of George Boldt and Monday noon he is to depart for Washington.

Teachers' Reading Circle. The Teachers' Reading Circle is a recognized and permanent part of the system for the professional improvement of the teachers of Michigan. It has been organized by five Commissioners of Schools chosen by the State Association of Commissioners and Examiners at the yearly meeting in December. The County Commissioner is the manager for each county. The Reading Circle year begins and ends with the regular county institute or with the school year, as teachers and Commissioners may elect.

The work meets the hearty endorsement of all who undertake it. The reading for each year is both professional and of a general culture nature. The selection of three books instead of two has proved both practical and popular. Any one who is interested in the work of the schools will enjoy the work for this year. It will add to the efficiency of the teachers and bring patrons and teachers into closer relation. The Superintendent of Public Instruction recognizes the work as being of sufficient value to recommend that examining boards excuse candidates from examination in Theory and Art of Teaching, and in United States History, when the reading has been thoroughly done.

Appropriate certificates will be granted to all who do the work as suggested by the Commissioner of Schools or by the Superintendent, leaving the work in charge. The certificate will specify what has been read and be recognized as of professional value whatever shown.

A special organization for doing the work is not absolutely necessary. Teachers will receive suggestions from the Commissioner or from Superintendents and Principals who are usually leaders. A comprehensive outline for the study is furnished with the books. No membership fee is charged. The whole cost is included in the purchase of the three books. The three books can be procured for \$1.00 from the publishers, Chicago, Prof. Horabarger or J. A. Chisholm, Secy.

died From Cancer. John Lindstrom, of Chicago, who came to this city in May to visit with his sister, Mrs. Charles Ekstrom, Lake Superior, died early Monday morning. He had been ill for some time with cancer. Deceased was 17 years of age.

The funeral occurred Monday afternoon under the auspices of the members of Evergreen Lodge, No. 91, K. of P., of this city. Some twenty members of the order attended the funeral in a body. By the request of deceased only the impressive ritualistic services of the order were asked.

Opinions Disagree.

The last legislature increased from 8 per cent a year to 1 per cent a month, interest charged on payment of delinquent taxes previous to sale. The question was whether the increase was retroactive, and Atty.-Gen. Orin was appealed to. He held that rate provided by the law in force at the time of assessment, should rule, thus deciding 8 per cent on all taxes thus far returned under the 1898 law. Although this opinion was given at the request of Auditor-General Dix, the latter has apparently rejected it. He has telegraphed all county treasurers to charge 1 per cent a month, the law having become operative last Saturday.

THE SILENCING OF A SAGE
These apostles of the "Higher Americanism," who have been claiming from the house-tops that people, the masses, are righteously opposed to the war in the Philippines, will please take notice of the reception and entertainment tendered to the distinguished Sage of Medicine Lodge, Jerry Simpson, who left of a chunk of Aguinaldo's glory and held it up for admiration before a roomful of common Americans at Wichita, Kas. While holding aloft the air the detached chunk of Aguinaldo's glory he thundered forth the "Higher American" sentiment in tones of feverish eloquence, "I believe John Brown's soul is marching with Aguinaldo," whereupon the crowd of common Americans, many of whom have fought for the principle for which John Brown died, rose up in indignation to the cries of "Throw him out." "Kick him of the platform!" In the midst of the tumult the Sage of Medicine Lodge pleaded to be permitted to finish his speech, but the reply was a blast from a brass band which enthusiastically struck up "The Star Spangled Banner" and Jerry Simpson, the sickle Sage and one of the pitiful party of "Higher Americans" was booted off the platform with a parting adjuration to go "Take your personal to Aguinaldo."

The significance of the demonstration lies in the fact that Simpson was speaking to a crowd that was largely composed of his admirers, of men who had voted for him for congress and who were responsible for making him a national figure. It was reasonable to expect that to a party of his old-time friends and constituents he could talk to a finish even if he did talk treason, thinly disguised. It seems, however, that he utterly misgauged the sentiment of his hearers and incautiously trespassed upon their forbearance. The incident goes to show moreover that the school of "Higher Americanism" is recruited from a few misanthropes and professional kickers, who imagine that the wheels in their puny heads revolve in response to a healthy American feeling of hostility to carrying on the war in the Philippines. POLITICS IN THE U. P.

Chase Osborn to try for Congressional Nomination.

The following relative to U. P. politics was recently sent out from Houghton and was published in the Detroit Free Press:
Upper peninsula politics are still in the shadow of uncertainty as the candidates are busy in their efforts to reach a smelt from the mine interest, as that is the whole thing. Railroad Commissioner Osborn took a flying trip through to Duluth a day or two ago and it was only in a roundabout way that the mention of his name in connection with gubernatorial honors, was heard. The commissioner was on business bent and had nothing to say in that direction. While a U. P. candidate would be welcomed just at this juncture there is a strong suspicion that Mr. S. will bob up as a candidate for congress against Carl Sheldon, whose friends are grooming him for a third term. When asked yesterday what he intended doing in that direction Congressman Sheldon said that it was too early to talk anything and he would not commit himself.

U. P. Congressman of Menominee, leans up as a congressional candidate there is a strong probability of Senator Chase Smith being trotted out by the mining interests. Smith is in line for a reward for the manner in which he looked after the interests of the mines in the legislature and he has a strong following in Gogebic as well as Houghton county.
There is likely to be a change of management in the Gogebic county end of a. o. p., which may effect Representative Chamberlain. "The Fall Pine of the Gogebic," who has represented that district since 1898. The Oliver Mining Co., which represents the Carnegie interests, now stands as the ruling power on the Gogebic range and it is said that the new management and it is said that the new management does not look upon Chamberlain with as much favor as it might. Whether the Fall Pine sees the handwriting on the wall or not has not been ascertained in a western copper mine.
