### COLUMBIA WINS TWO.

THE AMERICAN YACHT EASILY DEFEATS LIPTON'S CHALLENGER.  
Yesterday's Race Declared off on Account of Yachts Being Brained.

The Columbia has won two races from the Shamrock and in both cases the American yacht has proven herself the superior of the two. Yesterday's race was not finished on account of the boats being brained.

THE FIRST RACE.  
The cup which the old schooner America won so commandingly against all comers over the course around the Isle of Wight in 1851 and brought back to America with her, will probably remain here another year. In a contest between a windward and leeward course of thirty miles, the Columbia scored against the Shamrock Monday in the first race of the 1899 series for the trophy. She rounded across the finish line fully a mile and a half ahead of the challenger, defeating her by sixteen minutes and fourteen seconds in actual time, or ten minutes and eight seconds corrected time, after allowing the six seconds handicap which the Columbia must concede to the challenger on account of her longer water line.

It was a decisive contest, a magnificent race, magnificently sailed and magnificently won. Opinion as to the merits of the two boats had been somewhat divided as a result of the Bunker's performance of last week. Although the preponderance of expert opinion never wavered in its loyalty to the wonderful speed and ability of the white flyer, no nautical ship expected the Shamrock would be so overwhelmingly victorious as she was in Monday's recent struggle. The Yankee boat outgunned her at the start, beat her hopelessly in windward work to the outer mark and gained twenty-two seconds in the run home before the wind.

SECOND RACE.  
The breaking of the Shamrock's topmast, 15 minutes after the start of Tuesday's yacht race, and her consequent retirement from the contest was a severe disappointment, though it did not interfere with the Columbia proceeding on her course untroubled within the time limit.

The yachts had both got over the starting line in less than a minute after 11 a. m., and were beating along to windward with the contest very even, when at 11:35 the Shamrock's topmast snapped off close to the mast and her chel-topmast came floating down. The Shamrock was to leeward of the Columbia and some leakage occurred about three miles down the coast, when the immovable stretch of upper canvas was seen to collapse. The club had apparently broken in the center, and where it hung over beat against the mainsail. The boat was set once put in to the wind and turned back to the light-ship.

The Columbia rounded the first mark 10 miles out at 12:30 p. m., and after a long reach, rounding the second mark and starting for home at 1:30 p. m., she came along fast on a reach home, crossing the line at 2:35 p. m., unofficial time. She finished almost two hours within the time limit, demonstrating that the race would have been a fine one if there had been a contest between the two boats.

NO RACE YESTERDAY.  
The yachts had a good wind to start with yesterday, and a lively run was made for several miles, then the breeze died away. The Columbia was in the lead.

The official starting line was Columbia 11:01:34, Shamrock 11:02:02. At 11:02 the American boat had about 100 yds. lead and when the finish line of the course was reached the Columbia still had the leading position.

At 1:37, the Columbia was about nine or ten miles from the light-ship and would have barely started way and could not finish within the time limit.

ANOTHER CUP.  
The Evening World announced yesterday that, in conjunction with the Daily Mail, of London, it offers a cup to be sailed for the Shamrock and the Columbia in an extra race on a day to be agreed upon between Mr. Iselin and Sir Thomas Lipton. The Evening World suggests that a change of crews be made, in order to settle the question as to whether the crew of the Columbia is better than that of the Shamrock or vice versa.

A VOTER OF BURGLAR.  
Ray McKesson entered Bestman's Saloon and Taps the till.

At about 2 o'clock Tuesday morning, Ray McKesson, son of R. C. McKesson of this city, was caught in the act of burglarizing Abraham Bestman's saloon. He was taken to jail.  
Entrance was gained through a rear window, the sash fastening being unhooked, presumably by the youthful burglar some time early in the night, he having been in the billiard room a short time before the closing hour. While in front of the Bestman building Officer Hayden heard a noise at the rear of the block and went into the alley to ascertain the cause, and then noticed someone entering. The window a few moments later heard the bell of the cash register ring. On account of the window being some feet from the ground the officer had to procure a box to get a view of the interior. Two electric lights lit up the room, one at the rear and the other in the saloon part. The youth was noticed entering through the archway to the rear room and was ordered to halt, but when he saw the officer he stepped back into the saloon and when arrested a few

moments later he was in the act of returning the money about \$37 to the till. The officer and he left the building by the side door and after the prisoner was placed in jail Mr. Bestman was informed of the attempt to burglarize his place of business.

Yesterday and that night McKesson remained in jail and on Wednesday, no complaint being made, he was permitted to go without a hearing. Officer Hayden states that if complaint was made he would testify in the matter, and also that F. H. Peters, prosecuting attorney, informed him that he was not expected to make the complaint.

BOY BRAYS SPARKS.  
Some two weeks ago the board of poor commissioners at a regular meeting appointed Mrs. L. H. Simmons, keeper of the poor house, and to get the new keeper detailed in the place is the present occupant, refuses to vacate the premises, claiming that a majority of the board have authorized him to remain in charge of the property.

W. W. Parker, chairman of the board, repeatedly ordered Simmons to vacate the premises, and Wednesday he attempted to install the new keeper, but was not permitted to enter the building. A fierce encounter between the keeper and chairman occurred, one mutually hurt and later under warrant the keeper was arrested under charge of assault and battery. Bail was tendered and accepted.

Thursday papers were served on Simmons to vacate the premises and later the court will decide which of the two will occupy the home.  
Attorney Dunton is representing Mrs. Simmons in the matter and Denny Jefferson, Patsy Mueenarra and others are leading out legal advice against Simmons.

Two members of the poor board, Messrs. Parker and Wheeler, it is rumored, held a meeting this morning. Just what they did is not as yet ready for the public.

A simple home wedding was celebrated at 6:00 o'clock Wednesday morning at the residence of O. A. Bowen, Oak street, where Miss Ella Porter Bowen was united in marriage to Roberts P. Hudson, of Lansing. Rev. Robt. Braden, of the Church of the Redeemer (Presbyterian), officiated.

A wedding breakfast followed the ceremony, which was witnessed by the immediate relatives only.

They departed on the morning train for Lansing where they will take up their residence in a handsomely furnished house.  
The bride is a daughter of Mr. O. A. Bowen, cashier of the Citizens' Bank, who during the last school year taught music in the city schools. She is a very attractive young lady, is accomplished and is highly popular in this city. 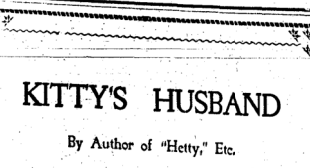
