Baltimore, Oct. 21.—Should the present rate of increase in the earnings of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad continue, almost the entire interest charges and the rentals for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1900, will have been earned by Dec. 31, 1899. This was forehanded today when the net earnings for September were made public. The estimated gross receipts were \$2,904,293, the largest for one month in the history of the company and an increase of \$216,597 over September, 1898. The net earnings for September, 1899, were also a record breaker, being \$1,009,029, an increase of \$271,804 over September, 1898. The net earnings for the first three months of this fiscal year—July, August, and September—aggregate \$3,042,759, an increase of \$1,174,608 over the same months in 1898-9. H. Maddy.
