FIRE IN KINGHAM BUILDING.

PEARL STREET BUSINESS BLOCK NARROWLY ESCAPED BEING REDUCED TO ASHES.

Fire Department Responded Promptly and did Splendid Work.

Last evening the upper portion of the building owned by Dennis Kingham, in what is known as the "Flitton" block, was gutted by fire and only for heroic work of the fire ladders, the whole block would have been reduced to ashes. The fire started in the attic and is thought to have caught in the woodwork about a chimney. Mrs. Kingham noticed the fire first and gave the alarm. The roof of the building was covered with tin, coated with tar and gravel which held down the flames and although retarding the work of fighting the fire it aided materially in keeping the flames from spreading to the adjoining buildings.

Two streams played on the fire and the steam was stationary at the Walnut street well. The engine worked admirably and the well furnished water galore. With two streams there was 50 pound pressure and with one stream over 100 pounds.

At about 9:30 o'clock flames to an alarming extent again started in the roof of the building and the engine was called out and soon extinguished it.

Mr. Kingham figures his loss at about \$1,000; \$500 on building and the remainder on furniture which was badly broken. He carried an insurance of \$200.

PLAN TO RAISE MICHIGAN DEEPER WATERWAYS THROUGH THE GREAT LAKES BY DRAINING THE NIAGARA RIVER.

The Washington correspondent of the Times Herald says that the construction of a great dam at the head waters of the Niagara river, near Buffalo, is the project of the engineer corps of the army for solving the problems of deep water way through the lake's and of the Chicago drainage canal's effect upon the lake levels. This dam is designed to raise the level of Lake Erie fully three feet and the level of Lakes Huron and Michigan one foot.

No hint of the preparation of this important plan had leaked out until last Wednesday night, and it remained for a lecturer before the National Geographic Society to disclose the fact. The lecturer was Alfred D. Henry, chief of the division of records and meteorological data of the weather bureau, and a painstaking student of the question of variations of lake levels and rainfall.

In the course of his investigations of this subject Mr. Henry discovered the plans of the engineer corps for a big dam at Niagara and Saturday night, in the lecture hall of Columbia university, before an audience of scientific men, he spoke as follows:

"A board of engineers has been engaged for several years investigating the feasibility of constructing a canal between the water of New York and the great lakes. The board has also considered a project for maintaining the level of Lake Erie constant within a limit of six inches, also, of increasing the level of this lake by about three feet. The effect of an increase of three feet on Lake St. Clair about two feet and Lake Huron and Michigan one foot, thus recovering the loss caused by the increase in cross sections of the St. Clair river."

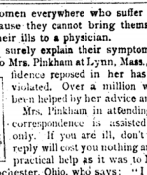

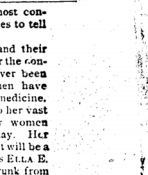
