## NEW MUELLER SCHOOL TO BE VOTED JUNE 29

Special Election Scheduled; New Modern Structure Would Cost \$75,000

A special election to increase millage and bond the school unit will be held in the Mueller township school district on June 29, it was announced this week. The bond issue will be for \$75,000 to finance the construction and equipping of a new modern school building on the site of the present school house at the Green School location. Only taxpayers and the husbands and wives of taxpayers may vote on the bond issue. All qualified electors, however, may vote on the millage increase matter. A majority vote is required for a change in the law now requires only a majority vote on a millage increase; previously a two-thirds vote was necessary. The present school building is old and inadequate to serve the district's needs.

Tuberculosis Case-Finding Examinations Also Scheduled At Seney

Dr. E. J. Brenner, acting director of the Alger-Schoolcraft health department, announced this week that the annual free examinations here in the tuberculosis case finding program of the state health department will be from June 28 through July 5, when the mobile x-ray unit will be in Manistique and Seney. The tentative schedule is as follows: June 28 and 29—Manistique Public and Paper company, June 30—Michigan Dimension company, July 1, 5—6 and 7—Triangle Park, July 8—Seney hotel. The public is invited to take advantage of the free-x-rays. Dr. Brenner pointed out, "Only a few minutes is required to have the x-ray taken, and it is not even necessary for the person having an examination to remove outer clothing. Food handlers, including personnel working in eating and drinking establishments, are particularly urged to have x-rays taken when the mobile unit comes here. In addition, all high school students, 15 years and over, are urged to take advantage of the service."

Keith Bundy, Earl LeBrasseur Re-elected To Four Year Terms

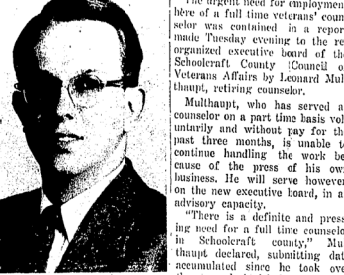

## Veterans Council Reorganized; Need For Fulltime Counselor Stressed At Meeting Tuesday

There is a definite and pressing need for a full time counselor in Schoolcraft county," Muthaupt declared, submitting data accumulated since the takeover of the council's job last March to support his statement. Pointing out that from a financial standpoint, a counselor is a "paying proposition here," Muthaupt revealed that the county is receiving about \$80,000 a year in veterans' pensions, educational benefits, health and other compensation. "We have taken many veterans off relief by securing for them the federal aid to which they were justly entitled and which would have cost the county nothing," he explained. The Veterans Council executive board want of the reorganized full time, paid counselor provided funds could be made available. There have been no operating funds on hand for more than five months, it was reported, and the board will make an appeal soon to city and township units of government for emergency financing of the service. It was decided that the county board of supervisors allocated \$1,500 to the counseling center in the tentative budget for the fiscal year. Represented at Tuesday's meeting were the following county units: City of Manistique, American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans, Rotary and Lions clubs, the Manistique-Schoolcraft Chamber of Commerce and the Manistique Women's club. The board's next meeting will be held at Suite One of the First National Bank building next Thursday, June 23, at 7:30 p. m.

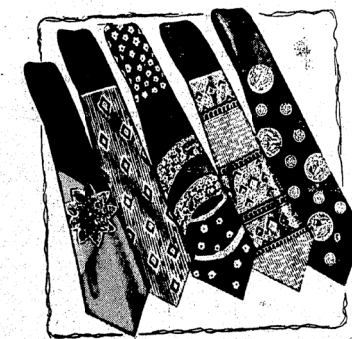

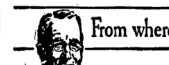

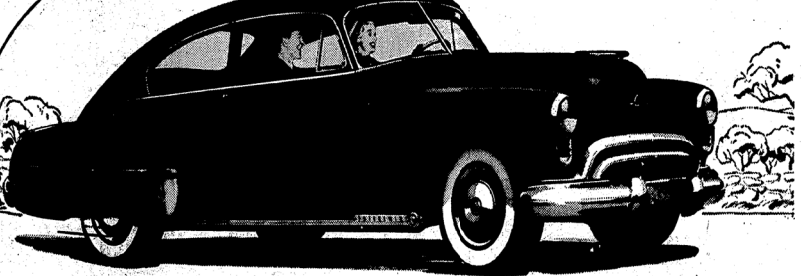

Many workers in the Schoolcraft county area may be able to collect social security benefits as well as unemployment compensation.  
According to Carl L. Johnson, manager of the Social Security administration field office at Escanaba, anyone 65 or over, who is unemployed may be eligible for these payments.  
Social security benefits are payable for each calendar month that the worker is not employed or earning less than \$15.00 a month at a job under social security. Because many workers lost benefits for failure to file on time, Johnson suggests that they contact his office without further delay.

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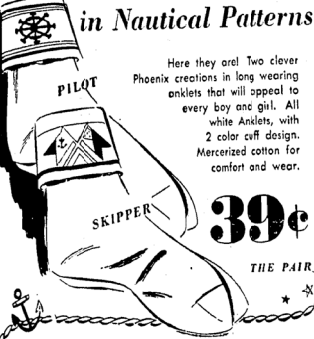
