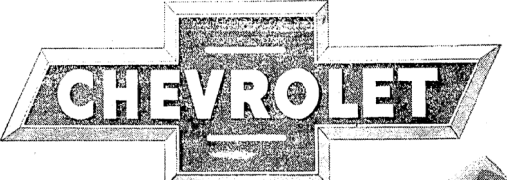

News of 4-H CLUBS

We have a scheduled two evening demonstrations to be given July 13. They will be especially for the Home Economics clubs and 4-H members. There will be movies and demonstrations presented by Miss Victoria Brust, Home Demonstration Agent at Large from Marquette.

Went on a tour of projects with Mrs. Roy Oberly, Maple Grove Club, recently. We looked at gardens at Beckman's, Taylor's, and Cody's. At Matchinski's, Arlene had a flower garden and Lawrence and Leonard were raising pigeons. Louis Busch is raising a calf. Now that there is plenty of rain the gardens are growing well. The weeds and insects are thriving. It is easier to keep weeds out of gardens than to get rid of them. Frequent cultivation will accomplish that. Insects are best controlled by spraying and dusting. DDT should not be used on plants like lettuce that will be eaten or on vines such as cucumbers, squash and pumpkins. Rotomone is a good dust that is non-poisonous and will control most insects.

We spent an afternoon with the dairy club members in Doyle township. We looked at all the heifers and heeled make notes for them. Conrad Letson has had his calf to the U. P. Fair the past two years, but the rest will be going for the first time this year.

Radio Manager Gets Figures On Bay De Noc Fish

William Frederick, manager of the Manistique studio of radio station WJAM, recently interviewed Marty Tholen, of Garden Center, on the fishing in Bay De Noc. He was the first of Manistique, following are some of his findings as related by Tholen:

There are 18 boats for hire in this area and these boats were used by over 3,000 persons between May 21, the opening of the season, and June 22.

The largest fish reported caught, weighing 12 pounds, seven ounces, up to that date, was a walleye, taken by Joe "Tarrow," of Garden Center, on May 24.

The first party of three persons to catch their limit of 10 walleyes each, or 30 for the boat, was reported on May 22. Since then many groups have caught within one or two of their limit.

There does not seem to be any time of day when the fishing is best; it varies daily from early morning until late in the evening.

The 3,000 persons who rented boats during this period do not include those who brought their own boats on trailers or car-tops, and launched them at the new park and boat dock which has been provided. Persons from as far away as Dayton, O., and Lenoir, N. C., have fished off Manistique piers during this period, Tholen told Frederick.

It was reported here this week that bass fishing also is getting good in the bay.

Explains Ruling On Licenses For Women Fishers

For those persons confused over the licensing regulations applying to female fishermen, the conservation department emphasizes that wives of resident fishermen only may fish free. They must fill out the stub attached to their husband's \$1.50 resident license at the time the license is issued.

Wives of nonresident fishermen may not fish free. Nonresidents, male or female, must purchase either a 10-day temporary license, for \$2 or the annual license for \$4.

A nonresident is any person who has not been a resident of Michigan for six consecutive months prior to making application for license. Non-residents owning property in the state are not entitled to a resident license. All regularly enlisted or commissioned personnel of the United States Army, Navy or Marine Corps officially stationed in Michigan are qualified as residents.



Weekly Report Of Congressman Charles Potter

The veterans of World War II were overcharged about two billion, 800 million dollars in premiums on their National Service Life Insurance policies. This money does not belong to the Government and should be refunded to our veterans.

I cannot help but feel—and have so stated on the Floor of the House—that the Administration is using this money due our veterans as a political foothold and purpose is withholding payment until just prior to the 1950 elections.

The Veterans Administration stated in December of 1947 that these refunds could be paid within six months after a certain case decision of the Supreme Court. This decision was handed down by the Supreme Court in the Spring of 1948, so you can see that insurance refund payments could have been made long before this time.

No official information is available as to the amount of the average refund due a veteran. However, every veteran who took out national Service Life Insurance and kept his insurance in force for three months or more will be eligible for a dividend. In the case of a deceased veteran, dividend will be paid to his beneficiary.

Payments will vary greatly because many veterans have had their insurance in effect since the beginning of the war, others have purchased their insurance to one of the several permanent plans, etc.

I have supported a Concurrent Resolution designed to be the intent of the Congress that overpayments on insurance premiums, resulting from overcharging our veterans, shall be paid not later than October 15, 1949. I can see no justification for delaying payment beyond that date.



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

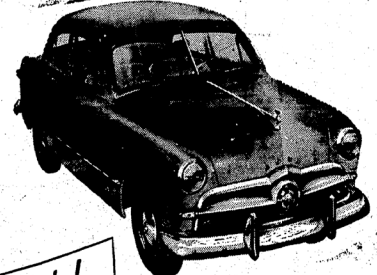
