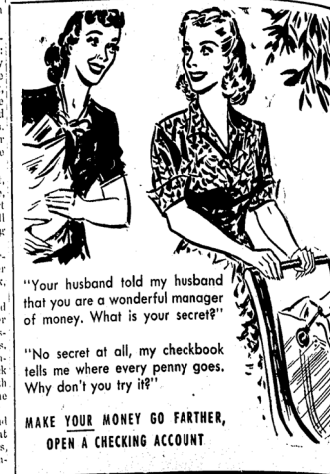

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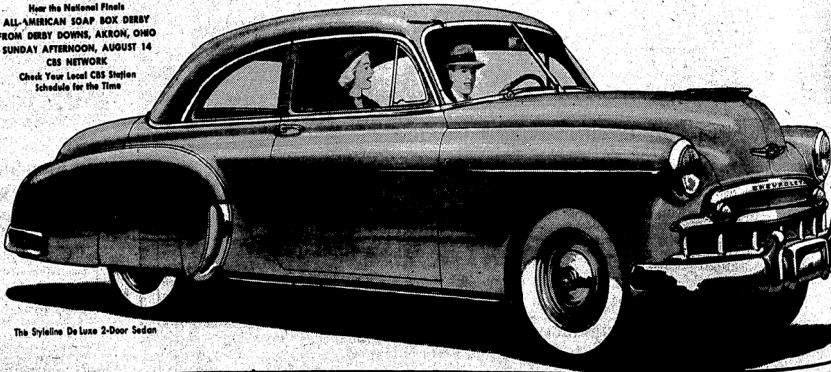

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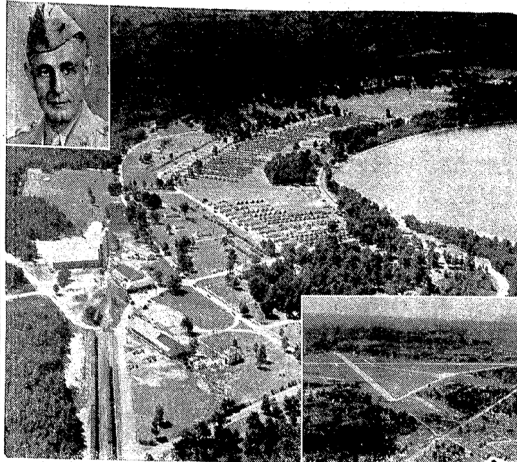

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## Randall Issues Statement On Wage Increase

Clarence B. Randall, president of the Inland Steel company, of which the Inland Line and Stone company is a subsidiary, has issued a statement saying that "there is no way whatever by which the steelworkers can get more money without having that money come out of the pockets of the public." Randall's statement was given out when he was asked to comment on the case completed Wednesday of last week by the United Steelworkers of America before the President's fact-finding board. The board is now conducting hearings in New York in an effort to solve the wage deadlock between steel producers and the union. A steel strike would have a paralyzing effect on operations of the Inland Line and Stone company, which counts Big Steel among their chief customers. A tie-up of lake shipping, also a result of a steel strike, would further contribute to a reduction in inland operations here to a minimum.  
Randall's complete statement follows:

"The case presented by the Steelworkers that money come out of the pockets of the public. The pattern is all too familiar. It is simply a fresh demand that the Steelworkers be paid a lot more money at the expense of everybody else in the United States.

"No economist but Nathan (Robert R. Nathan, economist for the Steelworkers) would dare to claim that wages can be increased and prices lowered at the same time, but that is precisely what he did at the New York hearing. "Surely the American public knows more about business than that. Wages are cost. Every increase in wages has to be paid for by the buying public. Call it what you call it, there is no way whatever by which the Steelworkers can get more money without having that money come out of the pockets of the public. If this politically-appointed Board makes a new gift to the Steelworkers, people are going to pay more for automobiles and refrigerators and everything into which steel goes. It is as simple as that, and it is time the public understood the issue.

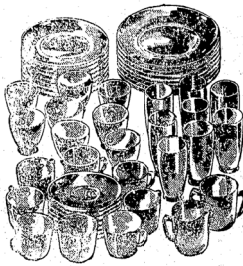
"And obviously it was along with steel. Every worker in the country will demand what the steelworkers get, and prices will have to rise on all commodities. That is inflation, and no one gains. The gentleman on the Board know all this. Let us all fervently hope that they have the courage to be statesmen."

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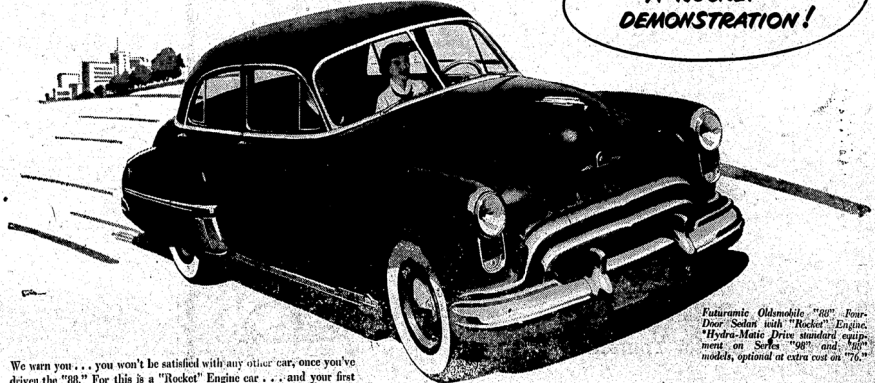

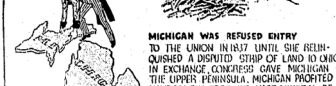

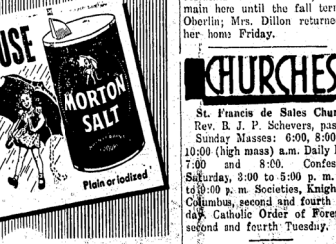

### Oldsters Warned To Take It Easy On Hottest Days

Take it easy these hot summer days, the Michigan department of health is warning oldsters.

Deaths from heat prostration and sunstroke reach their peak in August. Both result from prolonged exposure to sun or intense heat. People past their middle years,

and those who have high blood pressure, or disease of the heart or kidneys are in more danger than others. Such things as over-exercising, dehydration, over-indulgence in food or drink, worry, fatigue, anger, and lack of sleep add to the danger.

These things will help you to prevent heat prostration and sunstroke and keep cool, the Department suggested.

Avoid prolonged exposure to sun and excessive heat—this includes ball games, tent-shows, fair mid-ways and the like, as well as the

beach and garden. Keep the head covered when exposed to direct sunlight.

Wear loose, light, porous clothing, and not too much of that. Stay where there is circulation of air.

Avoid over-exercising or fatigue. Take recreation such as golf, shuffleboard, hiking, swimming and tennis in small doses.

Eat the same protective food you eat the year around—fruits, vegetables, milk, cheese, meat, and eggs, just cut less fat, greasy foods and rich desserts. Have some hot food at every meal.

Drink eight to ten glasses of liquid a day. This includes water, fruit juices, milk, soup, tea and coffee.

Get a good night's sleep. Nap in the early afternoon. Rest when you're tired.

Keep a pleasant attitude of mind. Save your worries for cooler weather.

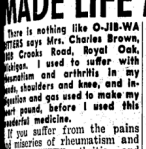

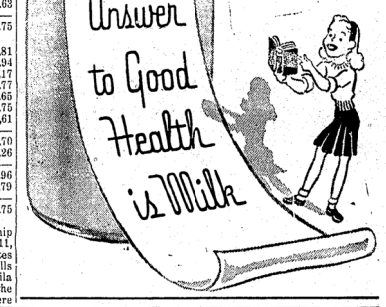

### Thirsty Children May Need Proteins, U-M Doctor Says

Thirsty children may be getting a high starch and sugar diet in warm weather and not enough proteins, a University of Michigan doctor said today.

Dr. James L. Wilson, chairman of the department of pediatrics and Communicable Diseases, added that the hot weather diet of pop, soda drinks and ice cream, containing starches and fats, should not be overdone.

"If appetites lag and the protein foods like meat, cheese and eggs are neglected, there are protein deficiencies on 'the market' containing protein, from which ice cream like foods can be made, he pointed out.

"Babies don't know how to tell you the difference between being hungry and thirsty," Dr. Wilson explained. "It's a good idea to dilute their feedings with a little water, or be sure to give them a bottle of water an hour or so before the formula, so they won't be too thirsty and take in more milk than they can digest."

"The U. S. Federal Reserve Board is authority for information that 40 per cent of business homes cost less than \$5,000. Financing of homes is still the number one problem. Senate Bill 72, extending Federal Housing Administration guarantee on loans, must be acted upon before Congress adjourns."

Governor Williams contends that housing is a government responsibility. "Everyone is aware to some degree of the acute housing problem which has afflicted us ever since the beginning of the second World War," he said recently.

"Many of us, regardless of our economic position in life, have had housing problems. I myself, had a difficult time finding a suitable home for my family in Lansing. With the exception of a very wealthy few, there isn't any group of our citizens which has not felt in some way the effect of the lack of homes."

Governor Williams also feels that the "denial of homes to veterans is a particularly flagrant contradiction of all that America stands for. The men and women who fought in World War II risked their lives for the defense of OUR homes. It is an ironic tragedy that as an indirect result of their victorious struggle, there are no homes for them."

Alles, who serves as spokesman for Michigan home builders, maintains that hundreds of homes are available throughout Michigan to war veterans at attractive terms. "Down payments are not required from World War II veterans who can obtain Veteran Administration approval," he said. "Monthly payment including interest and taxes on a two-bedroom house varies between \$40 and \$47. The VA requires interest of not more than 4 per cent on such mortgages. This advantage to the veteran becomes a handicap because of this difficulty in finding lenders, in view of the lack of cash payment, who will accept this lower-than-going rate."

"Private builders have advocated that Congress should increase this interest rate to 4 and one half per cent, the prevailing rate paid by non-veteran home owners. This would make veteran mortgages equally attractive and marketable."

One requirement in the new federal public housing act recently adopted by Congress is that cities which obtain federal housing subsidies must eliminate slum dwellings in an amount equal to the number of new public housing units provided.

A Washington business service has assured home builders that the federal housing program will call for only about 15 per cent of the housing industry's total capacity of one million homes per year. As subsidized rents are limited to low-income workers, it is the intent of Congress that the program will meet a demand almost never filled in the past by private builders.

Governor Williams may have had this in mind when he declared builders had failed to do the job. Home builders do not agree. "In the long run, the public will be the judge."

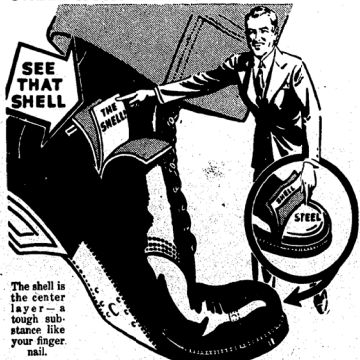
