Sportsmen buying their 1949 hunting license should be sure to get a copy of the game law digest, both of which are now obtainable from any of the local license agents.

The twelve page folder, which costs nothing extra, contains the substance of basic laws on hunting, season dates and bag limits. Failure to secure a copy will not excuse ignorance of any special provisions.

Although not included in the digest the sportsman also should know that bows must be unstrung while being transported in or on vehicles; 12:00 noon opening day on all trapping seasons; and that camp registration cards are required for deer hunters camping on state land.

Section 1 of the above act defines the policy of the state as follows: "It is hereby declared to be the public policy of the state to develop, extend and improve, especially in rural areas, services for assisting children who are suffering from conditions which lead to crippling and for providing medical, surgical, corrective, and other services and care, including after-care and custodial care when necessary and facilities for diagnosis, hospitalization, and special education for crippled children as herein provided; and to prevent, insofar as possible, such crippling conditions. Such policy being based not only on humanitarian but on economic considerations, it shall be carried out not only for the purpose of providing medical and physical care for crippled children, but for the purpose of making them self-sustaining in whole or in part rather than charges on the public for support."

About 30 men will be employed on the project.

OLDER FOLKS NEED NOT FEAR SURGERY

Many Factors Make Operations Safe Now, Says N University Doctor

Older people need no longer fear operations, a University of Michigan doctor declares. "Present day surgery has advanced to the point where many operations upon older people may be done with safety whereas, previously, they might have been told the risk was too great," according to Dr. Phillip W. Smith, Seelye fellow in surgery at University

of Michigan Medical School. No longer should a person of seventy, eighty, or even ninety be forced to suffer or possibly die, from some condition that can be relieved by surgery, Dr. Smith asserted. Appendicitis, bowel obstruction, fractures and ruptures are all conditions which frequently occur in older people and for which surgery can be undertaken with relatively slight risk. Many factors have made surgery in older people safe, Dr. Smith explained. In the first place, more is known now about how various organs of the body function both in health and disease. Also, careful attention is given to the patient before an operation. A careful study is made of the patient's general condition and special tests are carried out whenever they are found necessary. In older people it is especially important to carefully check the

heart, lungs, blood and kidney. Blood Available Blood is now available from well-managed blood banks in adequate quantities for use before, during and after the operation, the doctor continued. Advances in anesthesia have also contributed towards making operations safer. "The importance of this can be better understood if we realize that a tremendous number of people in our population, belong to the older age group," Dr. Smith declares. "Benefits of modern surgery should be available to these people."

The physician cited the case of a 70-year-old housewife who had suffered from what she thought was influenza for 21 years. Finally becoming incapacitated by pain, she was examined by her family physician, who found gall bladder disease present. On the third day of hospitalization she underwent an operation, under general anesthesia, and had her diseased gallbladder, containing gallstones, removed.

"The evening of the date of her operation, with the aid of a nurse, she was able to take a few steps across the room," the doctor reported. "She complained of very little pain and did not require much in the way of narcotics. By the third day she was walking around the ward."

The patient's stitches were removed on the seventh day and on the ninth she went home, riding in a car with her son, Dr. Smith said. "This case illustrates several interesting points, because it is not an exceptional one," Dr. Smith pointed out. "She expressed the fear, common among elderly people, that she was too old to be operated on."

he claim a crime has been committed."

The entire text of the Better Government League's letter to Sheahan, which the prosecutor charges, constitutes a threat to remove him from office for "dereliction of duty" follows:

Thompson, Michigan, September 9, 1949
Mr. William J. Sheahan, Prosecuting Attorney, Schoolcraft County, Manistique, Michigan
1112 1/2 Ad. of Thompson Township Records, Schoolcraft County

Dear Mr. Sheahan: Since you have not seen fit to answer our letter of September 2nd, in which we requested definite information regarding any action you have taken in the above matter, we are forced to the conclusion that you have not taken the required action to date.

... If any such investigation, examination and/or audit discloses misfeasance, malfeasance, nonfeasance or gross neglect of duty on the part of any officer or officers of the political unit being examined, for which a criminal penalty is provided by law, the attorney general, or upon his direction the prosecuting attorney of the county wherein such examination is had shall, within sixty (60) days after receipt of such report, institute appropriate criminal proceedings against the officer or officers.

... shall also be the duty of the attorney general or the prosecuting attorney as the case may be, to institute civil action in any court of competent jurisdiction for the recovery of any public moneys disclosed by any such investigation, examination and/or audit to have been illegally expended, or collected and not accounted for; also for the recovery of any public money or property disclosed to have been converted and misappropriated. Refusal or neglect to comply with this section on the part of the attorney general or on the part of the prosecuting attorney shall be sufficient cause for his removal from office by the governor.

Failure upon your part to institute proper criminal and civil proceedings against the officer or officers responsible within the next ten (10) days will force our organization to demand that the governor remove you from office.

PHOENIX PROJECT IS ROTARY TOPIC

Walter F. Gries, U. P. Chairman, Tells About University's War Memorial

Walter F. Gries, of Ishpeming, upper peninsula chairman of the University of Michigan's war memorial Phoenix Project, was the speaker at Monday's noon luncheon meeting of the Manistique Rotary club.

Mr. Gries told the Rotarians that the idea for this project originated on the campus of the University of Michigan as a living memorial to the men and women of Michigan who lost their lives during World War II. It was finally decided to establish an Atomic Research Center at the university where the application of atomic energy could be directed to humanitarian and beneficial uses.

The alumni group of the University of Michigan is about to engage in a nation wide effort to raise \$5,500,000 to finance this atomic research program which will conduct research in all the natural and physical sciences through the use of radio active and stable isotopes. Projects will include application of atomic energy in the fields of medicine, genetics, chemistry, physics, forestry, virology, botany, dentistry, pharmacy and epidemiology, the speaker said.
