U. P. POTATO SHOW IS AT NEWBERRY

Peninsula-Wide Exhibits, Program Scheduled For Nov. 1, 2 and 3

The twentieth annual Upper Peninsula Potato Show will be held at Newberry on November 1, 2 and 3 under the sponsorship of the Newberry Chamber of Commerce.

It is rather fitting that the 1943 District Potato Show should be at Newberry for the Luco county potatoes are the best in the region.

Mountain, Richards Bros., Luco county's Lakefield township growers, took first place in the certified seed growers contest with a yield of 718 bushels per acre.

Alpine Farms and Boyd Kline took second and fourth places in the tablestock growers contest, with yields well over 700 bushels per acre. Luke ranks 6th among counties of the Upper Peninsula with a total potato production of well over 300,000 bushels.

Guard Personnel Get Immediate Increase In Pay

Personnel of the Michigan National Guard will receive an immediate increase in training pay under the army pay bill recently passed by Congress as the "Career Compensation Act of 1949."

The Guard is currently carrying on a campaign to gain 1,000 new men prior to November 15 when it is expected that restrictions will be placed on further recruiting. Guardsmen draw one day's regular army pay for each weekly part-time training session.

Under the provisions of the new pay bill a Guard recruit, after four months, will now receive \$2.65 per drill. Other grades will receive the following pay for each armory drill: Private, \$2.75; Private First Class, \$3.18; Corporal, \$3.72; Sergeant, \$4.35; Sergeant First Class, \$5.03; and Master Sergeant, \$6.61.

These are basic rates, with automatic increase authorized based on length of service.
