## SOCIAL AGENCY COUNCIL TO BE ORGANIZED HERE

### Two-Day Institute For Community Planning Also Voted For February

Two important developments came out of a meeting at the court house here yesterday of representatives of various state, county and local agencies and a number of interested citizens concerning the organization of a social service council in Manistique. The council is expected to be organized here in the near future.

The first was a unanimously voted move to organize immediately a Council of Social Agencies which will be a sort of clearing house for coordinated action on certain problems, and the second a request for a two-day institute here in February under the sponsorship of the University of Michigan's extension service for the general discussion on a wider social problem.

Clayton Reid, county agricultural agent, named to lead the organization of the Council of Social Agencies. Charles Floy, of Escanaba, extension director for the University of Michigan in the upper peninsula, will make the necessary arrangements for the institute, at which consultants, not only from the university but elsewhere in the state will discuss with local citizens a wide range of topics relating to community betterment.

Over 30 persons attending Friday's meeting, many of them consultants from welfare and child care agencies, discussed a hypothetical case dealing with an indigent family presenting a serious social problem. It is believed that the council proposed here will permit a more facile handling of welfare cases where veterans' or other services can be provided as well as direct relief.

## Deer Hunting Army Invades Woods In This Vicinity Over Weekend; Cautions Repeated

### Nearly 100,000 Expected To Comb U. P. Woods; Report Deer Plentiful

A big proportion of the estimated 100,000-strong deer hunting army which will invade the upper peninsula during the next few days is expected to converge on Manistique this week and on their way to hunting camps in the western part of northern Michigan.

Local hunters have been busy for several days now getting their camp gear and outfitting, and during the two weeks of the season, Nov. 15 to Nov. 30, there will be a heavy exodus to the woods in this vicinity.

The deer are reported to be plentiful. Last year, a total of 2,823 deer was the total killed in Schoolcraft county; there was an estimated 7,585 hunters here.

Satisfied hunters are becoming more careful in the woods during the deer season, but warnings were repeated nevertheless this week by the Michigan department of conservation, and the state health department regarding the need for special caution in the woods. Every hunter is urged to make his own law to himself: "I will shoot at only legal game in plain view; I will take every precaution with my gun; I will always keep the muzzle of my rifle pointing at ground when not shooting at a legal target."

Blanchard was arrested in Manistique township Sunday by Conservation Officer Harold Peters as he was driving a fawn, which he admitted killing.

In addition to the fine and jail term, he was also deprived of the privilege of driving a motor vehicle and revocation of license are mandatory under a new statute imposing penalties for the illegal killing of deer.

## PAPERMILL TO START UP AGAIN NEXT MONDAY

### New Steam Turbine And Speed Inserter Now Being Installed

The Manistique Pulp and Paper company shut down since Oct. 4 when a steam turbine operating the paper machine blew up by routine operations Monday. It was announced Tuesday afternoon by K. G. Heutsch, company manager.

Heutsch said that a new turbine has been secured for the mill, and is now being installed. A speed inserter, which governs the paper machine rate is part of the new equipment, and both the turbine and inserter have been lined up to the reduction gear. A new fabric has been built, and piping is being changed and relocated preparatory to the resumption of production.

The Paper company normally employs 150 men, who have been without employment since the shutdown. All have drawn unemployment compensation checks, however, it is reported.

## Inquest Is Held Here In Gun Suicide

### Funeral Thursday For Stanley K. Wilcox, 39, Germsak Rifle Victim

An inquest was held in the office of Prosecutor William J. Sheehan Tuesday afternoon in the rifle suicide Monday afternoon of Stanley Ketchel Wilcox, 39, of Germsak. A coroner's jury composed of Wallace Severs, James Simpson, Francis McNamara, Henry Gardner, Eugene McNally and Alpha Trudeau, deliberated about a half-hour before deciding "that on Nov. 7, 1949, at about 3 o'clock p. m., Stanley K. Wilcox died by a bullet wound inflicted by himself."

Coroner Edward Jackson presided at the inquest, and questions were put to witnesses by the prosecutor. Chief witness was Richard Smith, 68, who had been living with Wilcox and who found his body. Smith testified that Wilcox had been drinking heavily and expressed the belief that "he didn't know what he was doing" when he killed himself.

In addition to Mrs. Zonetti's address, the program will include two violin solos by the Rev. Paul Sobel, pastor of the Presbyterian church, two piano duets by Misses Nadine Weston and Evelyn Larson and a specially arranged devotional service. The Women's association this week issued an invitation to the church to attend the service. Mrs. Sobel is chairman of the committee in charge.

Following the service, tea will be served and those attending will have an opportunity to meet Mrs. Zonetti personally.

## City's Interest In Acquiring Idle Nursery Held Up Pending Outcome Of State Proposal

### Department Of Conservation Seeking To Use Site, City Council Told

Manistique's interest in acquiring ownership of the idle Wyman federal nursery at Intake park will be held in abeyance pending the outcome of a current effort by the Michigan department of conservation to use the nursery for growing young trees for planting on upper peninsula state forest lands, it was decided at the council Monday night.

A news story out of Lansing Monday indicated that the conservation commission would act soon on an offer from the United States Forest Service to turn the nursery over to the state. A representative of the conservation department recently investigated the nursery and made a highly favorable report to his superiors in Lansing.

Higgins Site Inadequate The state nursery at Higgins lake is inadequate to serve the state without enlargement. The Wyman nursery, idle for several years, would provide ample nursery stock for all state plantings in the peninsula, it was pointed out.

A large part of the land used in the Wyman nursery was deeded to the Forest Service by the city of Manistique after a special election in which a heavy vote was cast in favor of the gift. Operated for many years, the nursery was closed several years ago following a budgetary cut by Congress in its appropriation to the Department of Agriculture, of which the Forest Service is a part.

At its meeting two weeks ago the city council instructed the city manager and city attorney to cause the necessary documents to be transferred the land to the Forest Service, and to find out whether such land could be reclaimed by the city because the Forest Service had failed to keep the project operating.

At its meeting Monday night G. S. Johnson, city attorney, told the council that the necessary documents to be transferred the land to the Forest Service apparently was an outright gift, with no strings attached. He said he doubted the necessary documents transferred to reclaim the land on the basis of failure by the Forest Service to maintain a payroll at the nursery.

At its regular meeting Tuesday evening the Manistique Lions club voted to support the show if held here next year. Other service organizations in the community are being contacted and will be asked to give support to the project.

It is proposed that an executive committee, composed of representatives of various organizations, will be formed to take charge of putting on the show. The annual show, it is proposed, will be held concurrently with the U. P. show to eliminate duplication of work and expense.

Manistique has been twice to the U. P. show, once in 1940 and again in 1943.

## Minors Under 16 May Be Denied Patronage Of Bowling Alleys, Billiard And Pool Halls Here

First reading of a proposed new ordinance governing the operation of the playing game in arcades, bowling alleys and recreation parlors, was made at the regular meeting of the Manistique city council Monday night.

The new ordinance replaces one adopted in 1913 and will go into effect on January 4, 1950. It was drafted by G. S. Johnson, city attorney on instruction from the council.

Principal provisions of the ordinance to be known as Ordinance No. 1 are:

- 1. An annual license fee of \$5.
- 2. No Sunday opening until 12 o'clock noon.
- 3. The prohibiting of minors under 16 years from frequenting the playing game in arcades, bowling alleys and recreation parlors.
- 4. A fine of \$25 or a jail sentence of 30 days for violation of any provision of the ordinance.

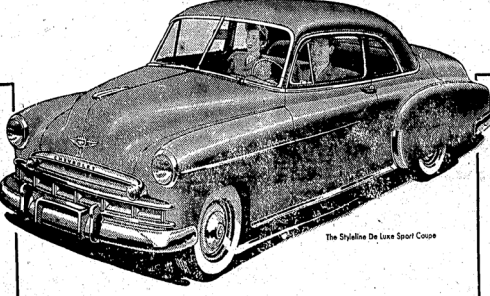

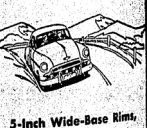

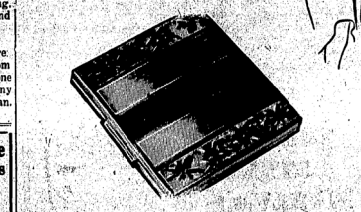
