Last week in an inquiry by Dit Braul, he said he remembers a high fence around the Putnam property now occupied by the Senior Citizens as a Drags-in Center.

The writer has lived here since 1920, visited Manistique many times before that, and could not recall a fence across the front of the property. There always was a high wide board fence starting at the kitchen door steps and extending to the end of the property line on Main St. This had a door rather than a gate, kept locked, so one would have to gain entrance through the front door or be admitted by the occupants at the rear.

In consulting with old residents including Mrs. Shipman, Mrs. Keller and Mrs. Lawrence Gorsche, it was agreed that they could not recall any other fence. A stepping stone, which is now in the Post Museum, was origi-

ginally at the curb for long-skirted ladies to step to the sidewalk and avoid the street mud prevalent on a dirt road before the days of stone or cement.

Last Thursday I met with Mr. James Minor, of the Department of Transportation, regarding the proposal to move Eastern Time Zone. Individual expressions of opinion on the proposal are coming in at a rapid rate.

One problem has developed. The law requires that the Department consider the effect on commerce and transportation created by a zone change. While individuals are expressing opinions, groups and organizations involved in commerce and transportation are not. It is

important that the Department hear from Chambers of Commerce, labor unions, businesses and groups involved in transportation to get a total picture of the impact of the proposed zone change. Opinions should be sent to:

There also still seems to be confusion over whether Central Time with Daylight in the summer, like Wisconsin, is a legal time in Michigan. It is not. I have carefully analyzed the Uniform Time Act of 1966 and it is clear that an entire state either observes six months of Daylight or an entire state does not. Michigan has elected not to observe six months of Daylight time. I have gone over and over this with transportation officials and there are no loopholes. There is no legal way a part of Michigan can observe six months of Daylight in the summer.

I am most sympathetic to problems that will be experienced by some of our communities near Wisconsin. I feel the Uniform Time Act is too rigid, and that there should be some local option for areas with special problems. However, I have always tried to be honest with the people of Northern Michigan, even when the news is not the happiest. To pledge to bring about Central Time with Daylight in the summer for our bordering communities would be holding out false hope -- promising something neither I nor the Department of Transportation can deliver. It is a difficult problem, but I am not going to advise any of our border communities to violate Federal law, even when I don't agree with the law. This could only create problems in the future.

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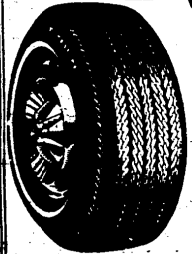
## "Pinocchio" coming

## The Senior Center

CITY COUNCIL FACED an unhappy problem at their last meeting.

A delegation of Senior Citizens wanted \$500 more next year to operate their Drop-in Center downtown. Mayor Leo DeMars and Councilman Harold Carlson felt the city couldn't afford it.

We should give DeMars and Carlson credit for the courage of their convictions. As Carlson commented, the easiest thing for a councilman to do is say yes.

We should also give the current council and City Manager Robert Nue some high marks in their efforts over the past few years. It was not too long ago when the city was struggling with a substantial deficit and not much to show for it. Now we have a balanced budget, plus a modest street improvement program, a Senior Citizens low-income housing project underway, a harbor improvement project in the works and a pension plan for city employees, as well as a new city hall under construction.

DeMars and Carlson are correctly concerned about spending money the city doesn't have, but we would have to join Councilmen Thor Reque and William Wedegartner in their concern about another city asset—our older citizens.

The Drop-in Center is not without its critics, which is typical of any public agency, but by and large it is performing a valuable service for many of our older people. It is still finding its way in its initial stages and has yet to reach its full potential, but basically it is a valuable and functional symbol that we have concern for these people. With proper encouragement and support, it could become even more effective and worthwhile.

Our thought is that we would hate to see these efforts and these beginnings cast adrift at this stage. We would think it possible for the city to find an extra \$500 in their budget for the next fiscal year and allocate it for the Drop-in Center. Such an appropriation could be made with the understanding that the program would have to be re-evaluated next year at budget time, along with all other budget requests. This would help to ease the concern that \$1,000 instead of \$500 would become an automatic obligation of the city the following year.

Once the federal funding portion of the program is phased out, which would be next year, the Drop-in Center will be able to conduct some fund-raising activities towards its own support. These efforts are barred now by the terms of the federal grant. It would not be unreasonable to expect these future efforts to take up the slack in future Drop-in budgets, so that the city's obligation could diminish, not increase.

With this sort of understanding, an effective compromise might be reached, with the city appropriating the necessary additional \$500 for next year in good conscience and with a continuing concern toward effectively spending our tax dollars. Enabling the Center to qualify for the final phase of its three-year federal program should give it the necessary strength and growth to enable it to continue on its own when the federal money ceases.

Now you can charter the finest yacht, one appointed with every luxury, and cruise the blue Caribbean with a full crew aboard. Your party of two to twelve will be catered to around the clock and comfortably berthed in double and single cabins. The congenial skipper helps you plot a course taking in an endless variety of islands, a potpourri of French and British and uninhabited beauty spots. An interplay of lush foliage, beaches and mountains, the shoreline is never out of sight. You can drop anchor at an entirely different site every night, even take a one-way cruise if you wish. Best of all, with V.E.B. Nicholson & Sons you have your pick of the choice yachts, manned by a skipper and crew who know the Caribbean and West Indies like the back of their hands. Everything is at your fingertips, from the cooks superb cuisine to radio telephone service. Any everything is done for you, though you are more than welcome to help with the sailing! There is no place in the world where so many educational topics are treated so deeply and broadly as the annual American Association of School Administrators Convention in Atlantic City, New Jersey. The sheer size and variety is overwhelming. Thirty thousand people, from every state in the union and from many of the foreign countries, register for it. The architectural exhibits run for two city blocks and the educational equipment and supplies exhibits would cover four football fields.

The convention runs 10 general sessions with such notable speakers as General William Westmoreland, Astronaut Walter M. Schirra and Dr. David Krech, Berkeley, California, speaking on Psychobiochemedication. (He was very serious about the name of his talk.)

Conventioners may elect from approximately 130 group discussion meetings with such varied topics as The Urban Education Front, The United States and International Education, Sanctions Strikes and Work Stoppages -- Are There Better Means?

I attended the session "What

Shall We Ask of the 91st Congress?" I thought it would be a good idea to ask the congress to pay more than seven cents an acre on all the Federal Forest and Wildlife Refuge we have in this district.

It is unfortunate, but this session was held at the same time as four other sessions which would have been interesting. "A Curriculum Materials Center Designed to Support Individualized Instruction," "How to Avoid School Millage Defeats" (With 157 vote margin in a renewal I thought we had better hear about that), "Is the Secondary School Auditorium/Theater a "White Elephant" and "The School Administrator as an Agent of Change." (I've always thought all school administrators were supposed to be agents of change.)

The one advantage of any conference, and especially this one, is the opportunity to expand an individual's educational horizon. We ask too often, "What are other Upper Peninsula Schools doing?" What we should be asking is, "What are the best school systems in the United States doing?" The annual MASA convention begins to supply the answers.

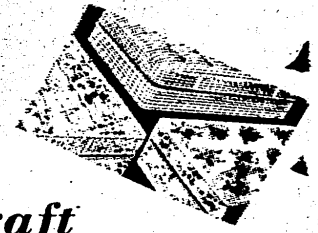
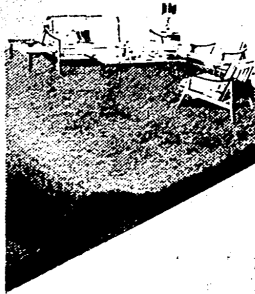

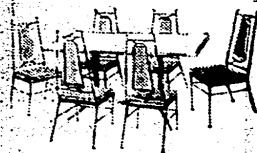

# VISTA report

Several weeks ago, Dave Road in an editorial described his dream for Manistique and Schoolcraft County.

I, too, have a dream. I have lived here just eight months, but Manistique is my home -- for now, at least.

For my dream it matters not who lives here and who comes and who goes. It holds for those living here now and for those who will live here in the future.

I seek a sense of community that draws citizens together to discover Manistique's needs and to attempt to meet these needs together. For a person to search for a community without problems is foolish; but to build in a community a sense of its

own needs and -- yes -- its own assets, is a goal worthy of any citizen.

In a community there is no such thing as the status quo. A town moves ahead -- growing as a community -- or it begins to die. This growth comes from within. It is more than economic growth and it is more than population growth. It is the growth of a sense of community.

To look for someone outside the community to solve its problems is fruitless. A sense of community is a seed germinated and nourished by the community itself. Outside forces can only help plant the seed or stimulate growth that has already started.

Most important for Manistique is that each resident like living here. Without this feeling, there is apathy, if not open dissatisfaction. With it, we have a city that is "home" for all who live here. And the glow of such an attitude cannot be hidden beneath a bushel basket. Others will see it and desire to add to it and become part of the glow.

In meeting its needs a community should avoid making its residents comfortable with what they now have. For growth as a community, Manistique needs to make its residents sufficiently uncomfortable in the knowledge of something better, that they seek comfort in a way that benefits all. But the knowledge of something better cannot be allowed to obscure the knowledge of the good that is already here.

My dream for Manistique is the sum of these two knowledges

-- the knowledge of the good that is already here and the knowledge of something better.

Manistique can do as it pleases. It can, if it wishes, work toward my dream -- and I will stay to help. But I alone (indeed, no one alone) cannot make the dream.

I am just one and my dream is so many.

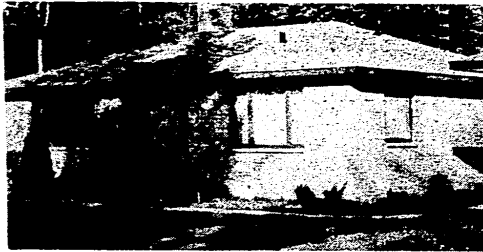

type of problem. However, independent tests for phosphorus, potassium, lime requirement, calcium, magnesium, manganese, zinc or copper are available in any or all combinations.

In addition special tests for greenhouse soils are available. The greenhouse testing program includes all of the tests mentioned above plus nitrate and soluble salt tests. Samples may be taken directly to the laboratory located at 1225 West Washington St., Marquette or submitted through my office located in the basement of the Post Office.

Cost for the sample soil tests will vary from one to two dollars, for the greenhouse test it will cost in the neighborhood of \$3.50 to \$4, unless you get into micronutrient testing in which case it is considerably higher. Results and recommendations will be quickly calculated and printed by a computer. They will then be returned to landowners through the local county Extension office.

For information on proper sampling for a good soil test, ask for Extension bulletin 498 "Sampling Soils for Fertilizer and Lime Recommendations." For you home gardeners, remember - don't guess - "test." This can make the difference between an occasional batch of table vegetables and having a freezer full for use throughout the rest of the year.
