School election Monday

Five candidates will compete for two open seats on the Manistiquie Area Schools board of education in the annual school election June 9.

Candidates for the four-year terms are: Mrs. James (Verna) Goureaux of Goureaux, Earl LeBrasseur, 318 Range St., Mrs. John (Mary) Moffat, 233 Range St., William Mueller, 302 Terrace Ave. and Leon Wood, Hiawatha Township.

Mr. LeBrasseur is the only incumbent, Robert Orr, who served two terms on the board, declined to run again because of recent illness.

Mrs. Goureaux and Mrs. Moffat are housewives, Mr. LeBrasseur is employed at the Manistiquie Pulp and Paper Co., Mr. Mueller is a route salesman for Toby's Specialties, and Mr. Wood is employed at Inland Lime and Stone Co.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 8 p.m., Eastern Standard Time. In the City of Manistiquie, voters in Precinct 1, west of the

river, will vote at the Leland School, while those in Precinct 2, east of the river, will vote at the Lakeside School.

Precinct 3, Thompson Township, will use the Thompson Town Hall as a polling place. Precinct 4, Hiawatha Township, will vote at the Hiawatha School. Precinct 5, Manistiquie Township will vote at the Fairview School. Precinct 6, Doyle Township will have the Doyle School as a polling place. Precinct 7, Mueller Township, will vote in the Mueller Township Hall, and Precinct 8, Germitask Township, will vote at the Germitask School.

Absentee voter ballots may be obtained up until 2 p.m. Saturday at the Central School office.

Three of the five candidates have accepted invitations to appear Friday at 7:30 p.m. for a "Meet the Candidates" program at the Senior Citizens Center. Mrs. Moffat, William Mueller and Earl LeBrasseur have indicated they will appear while Leon Wood and Verna Goureaux have indicated they will be unable to appear. The general public is invited.

Candidates state their views

James Goureaux lives with his first husband, she is a homemaker and a member of the Manistiquie Township Board and was elected board member last fall. Her husband was elected school trustee and she was elected as secretary of the Township Park-Organization, and has a PTO work. Her husband is employed by the Department of Highways, and she has five children, ranging in age from six to 18 years, and two grandchildren.

Seeking his seventh term on the board of education, Mr. LeBrasseur is employed as a supervisor at the Manistiquie Pulp and Paper Co. He was born and raised in this area and attended Manistiquie Schools. A Past Exalted Ruler of Elks Lodge 632, he is now the chairman of the local Senior Citizens Executive Committee.

Mr. LeBrasseur has twice served as president of the board, and is a member of the auditing committee. He and his wife, the former Katherine Hupfer, reside at 318 Range St., and have five children.

His statement: "I believe the board member is a buffer between the school and the community. He defends the school to the community and the community to the school. He understands the school system sufficiently well so that he can field the tarps of the critics. He understands the community sufficiently well so that he can clarify its needs to the school staff. The buffer role is difficult, uncomfortable, it requires patience, integrity and a sense of humor.

"Qualities that make a board member strong also make a superintendent strong. Boards and administrators face a series of common demands and must blend their values and expectations of each other with community expectations.

"Probably the most important quality is for a board member to be a contributor in policy-making functions. This produces an effective board, one that possesses group strength, that give it potential for making decisions or policies that exceed the capacity of any individual member. The ability to fulfill the obligations inherent in board membership is a genuinely significant one that requires time, experience and diligence to perfect. Therefore, I believe I qualify to continue to represent you on the Manistiquie Area Board of Education."

The mother of seven children, Mrs. Moffat has been active in civic affairs, serving as a member of the City Charter Commission several years ago; active in Parent-Teacher Association projects, and is a member of the executive committee for the Upper Peninsula Child Guidance organization. A native of Houghton, the former Mary Weber attended St. Catherine's College in St. Paul, the University of Michigan, and Michigan Technological University. She and her husband John have been Manistiquie residents since 1940.

Her statement: "I am a candidate for the board of education because I am sincerely interested in the best possible education for all of the children of this district. If elected I will work to provide this, while at the same time attempting to make the best possible use of the local tax dollar."

Mr. Mueller, of 302 Terrace Ave., is a driver-salesman for Toby's Specialties, where he has been employed for 20 years. Prior to that he operated the Manistiquie Bakery for 20 years in association with his father, the late William Mueller, and brother, Louis Mueller. A graduate of Manistiquie High School, he attended the American Banking Institute in Chicago. Born in Manistiquie, Wis., he has lived in Manistiquie since the age of two. He is a member of the First United Methodist Church where he has been treasurer for more than 20 years. For the past eight years he has served as chairman of the church official board. He is a member of Lakeside Lodge 271, P.O.M., a Past Master, and currently serves that organization as chaplain. He is also a Past Patron of the Order of Eastern Star.

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Expanded school facilities are studied by committee

A school building or remodeling plan that would allow expanded facilities for junior high, physical education, music, library, vocational education and hot lunch got a thorough airing Monday night at the June meeting of the Advisory Committee to the Manistiquie Area Schools board of education, held at the high school. Alternatives of site and the type of remodeling that could result from a building program were discussed. One proposal suggested building a large gymnasium with band and home economics facilities and the subsequent remodeling of those areas and library facilities. Remodeling of the existing building, however, would be considerably upgrade high school facilities as well.

The role of the library is such a project was also discussed. The need for expanded library facilities stressed. Possible use of the space now used as the "new" gym for a library and possible conversion of other space to a cafeteria for 200 students being used for these purposes in the existing building. The committee is concentrating on junior high facilities because they had earlier agreed that the district's greatest need was to bring in 7th and 8th grade students to a central location to enable them to fully participate in home economics, shop and library facilities. Remodeling of the existing building would, however, help to considerably upgrade high school facilities as well.

It was also pointed out that there is considerable area support for a swimming pool, and that possibly this should be considered. It was stressed that all of the discussion was merely an attempt to sound out alternatives and needs; and discuss possible action. Further alternatives will be discussed at future meetings of the group.

Plans of other U.P. schools who have been through remodeling programs of a similar nature, possibly Kingsford and Iron Mountain, are planned for later in the summer.

Also attending the 7 p.m. banquet will be Sen. Thomas Schweigert and State Representative Charles Varnum.

A 9 p.m. hospitality hour in the Playhouse will be hosted by Frank S. Holzhok of the Manistiquie Pulp and Paper Co.

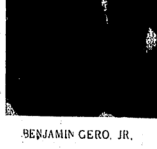

Ben Gero, Jr. dies Monday

Funeral rites for Benjamin Gero, Jr., 75, prominent Manistiquie businessman and sportsman, will be held at 11 a.m. today (Thursday) from the Kufner-Jackson Funeral Home. Mr. Gero died Monday night in the Schoolcraft County Medical Care Facility. He had been ill since 1960.

Born Jan. 11, 1896, in Cheboygan, he came to Manistiquie with his parents in 1895. He was graduated from local schools, and attended Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y. He was associated with his father, the late Benjamin Gero, Sr., in numerous local business activities. He was owner-manager of the Box Theater, formerly the Gero Theater, until 1942. He was office manager for the Gero and Carroll drug, hardware and light Co. until it was sold to the City of Manistiquie. He was also employed as a caseworker for the county welfare department.

An avid golfer, Mr. Gero built the county's first golf course in 1923, a small course with sand greens, located east of Lakeview cemetery. It proved to be the forerunner of the Indian Lake Golf and Country Club, of which he was a member. He was a life member of the

An agreement from the Michigan State Waterways Commission was read and it requested matching money be appropriated from the city for a test piling boring to be made for the local harbor project.

RESOLVED that May 26, 1969, be set as the date for the public hearing for the 1969-1970 fiscal year budget. Yes: Councilmen Cayia, Wedegartner, DeMaars, Regue. No: None. Absent: Councilman Carlson. Moved by Councilman Wedegartner, supported by Councilman Cayia.

WHEREAS the Building (5) located at the following described property in the City of Manistique to-wit:

Part of Section 22 Beginning 87.9 NELY from the Intersection of N line of Deer St. and W line of Weston Ave, thence NELY on Weston Ave, 40', thence NWLY at R 175, thence SW at R 40', thence ELY at R 175 to P.O.B., said property being (litled to State of Michigan has been found to be a "dangerous building" within the meaning of Ordinance Number 91 of 1961. Ordinances of the City of Manistique because of the following conditions:

(1) This building because of its condition shows evidence of damage or deterioration of the non-supporting enclosing or outside walls or covering, and since this building cannot be repaired so that it will no longer exist in violation of the terms of this ordinance, it shall be demolished. (Section 1 (b)) (See Photo)

The minutes of the Board of Supervisor's meeting of April 15th, 1969 were read and approved as read. Dr. Duane L. Waters, M.D., appeared before the Board and requested that the Board of Supervisors consider the sale of a portion of the Fairgrounds complex, more particularly that part located west of the Cardinal Field and south of the west entrance road and bound on the west by the western boundary of the County owned property. Dr. Waters said that the members of the medical and dental profession have agreed to form a corporation, to be known as the "Manistique Health Associates," and it was their intent and desire, if they can acquire the land and the necessary financing to construct a Doctor's Medical Center and a 50 to 75 bed nursing home. Dr. Waters said that this medical complex would be built so as to utilize more of the hospital facilities and services and should give more revenue to the hospital and give better service to the patients. He cited the advantages of being near to the hospital and medical care facility; the principal one being the availability of the medical and dental staff in emergency, especially in the busy summer months when crossing Cedar and Maple streets is very difficult due to the heavy traffic and the importance of several minutes in emergency cases. He also cited the fact that this would be a private ownership venture, and would be subject to the ad-valorem tax, and the anticipated construction cost to be approximately \$300,000.

Dr. Waters said that from visible observation, it may be necessary to move the ball field to the east several degrees; and if this is necessary, that the Corporation would make the change and bear the cost of same to put the field back in as good shape as presently constructed.

It was moved by Norman W. Jahn, supported by Russell A. Tennant, that this Board of Supervisors for Schoolcraft County does hereby resolve its "Intent to Convey" a parcel of land from the Schoolcraft County Fairgrounds Complex, which parcel is to be surveyed by a registered surveyor, and a legal description created, which legal description will form the basis of the description of land to be conveyed to Manistique Health Associates of Manistique, Michigan, a Michigan Corporation; said land to be used for the construction of a Doctor's Medical Center and a Nursing Home. It was further moved that a reversionary clause be incorporated into any conveyance whereby the land will revert to the County of Schoolcraft if and when the property is no longer used for health service purposes. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

It was moved by Thurman Skarritt, Sr., supported by Ernest Hoholtz, that the report of the County Treasurer, William E. Cowman, both written and oral on the financial status of the County as of April 30th, 1969 be accepted, carried by unanimous vote.

David Nordin, Director of the Department of Social Services, and Carlton Hubbard, Director of Schoolcraft County Medical Care Facility, spoke to the Board of Supervisors regarding the operation of the Schoolcraft County Medical Care Facility. Mr. Hubbard reported that the cost of the operation of the Medical Care Facility has been lowered from \$21.53 per day to \$18.05. This was done by reducing the staff by four people and other economy measures. He did note that he feels that the services rendered to the patients has also been reduced as a result. Mr. Hubbard reported that the facility is usually full with 38 or 39 patients and that about 75% of these are med-aid patients and subject to the \$7.00 limitation paid under med-aid. He further reported that under the rules and regulations of med-aid that any excess of \$17.00 it costs to operate the facility per patient day, cannot be charged to either the patient or responsible relative, but must be borne by the operating agency.

Mr. Hubbard reported that on May 23rd, 1969, that the Administrator of the Hospital and Medical Care Facility is to meet with employee representatives and union officials regarding the recognition of an employees union. He predicted that for sure this will result in higher operating costs for both facilities.

Theroupey, it was moved by Russell A. Tennant, supported by Ernest Hoholtz, that the report of Mr. Nordin and Mr. Hubbard be accepted. Carried by unanimous vote.

Mr. Richard Bonifas, Director Community Schools, and Denton Nelson, representing the Manistique Recreation Department, appeared regarding lands located in the Fairground complex which were promised to the Manistique Area Schools and City Recreation Department by the Board of Supervisors. Mr. Bonifas reported that efforts have been made to acquire financial assistance from the State and Federal Government for the development of the Quarry Recreation Area, of which the lands in the Fairgrounds Complex would be a part thereof. He reported that much will depend on how the \$100,000,000 State Recreation Bond Issue is split. Originally the share for Schoolcraft County was set at \$27,000,000 but that was based on the 70-30 percent split.

The Chairman instructed Mr. Bonifas and Denton Nelson that this Board would honor the commitment of the prior Board in regard to conveying said property located in the Fairground Complex but that this could not be done until such time as a legal description is created. Mr. Bonifas said that this is being

presently surveyed and that this will be done and submitted to the Office of the County Clerk very shortly. It was moved by Edward Jorgensen, supported by Thurman Skarritt, Sr., that the following resolution be adopted, Carried by unanimous vote.

RESOLUTION WHEREAS, the District Court has created a Probation Department for Schoolcraft County, NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the establishment of said Probation Department for Schoolcraft County is hereby approved pursuant to Section 8314 of the District Court Bill.

Judge Charles I. Falk reported that this probation set up will not incur any further costs to the county, as it was the intent of the District Court to use Mr. Howard Mason as the Director of Probation, and if possible, use voluntary local citizens for said work. He said that this is a new approach to the probation problem and that he would like to experiment with the theory and see if it will work in matters relative to District Court.

Probate Judge, John S. Fackely, appeared before the Board asking permission to acquire a complete set of Michigan Statutes Annotated, as the set he has in his office is incomplete, and no provisions were made to acquire the annotations. Mr. Gottfrid S. Johnson, Prosecuting Attorney, said that the old Justice Court has a set of NSA and that it may be possible to acquire this set, or at least part of the set, so as to meet the Probation Court's requirements.

After considerable discussion, it was decided that Mr. Johnson would inquire of the City of Manistique as to the NSA used by the Justice Court; that if these are available that these should be purchased. However, the Board did express itself, that it did want the Probate Court to have a complete set, along with the latest annotations; and that what could not be acquired from the Justice Court that it should be bought from the Publishing Company. That as soon as the Probate Judge determines what he does need, that he should inform the Chairman of the Finance Committee of his needs and that would be granted permission to proceed with the purchase.

The Probate Judge, John S. Fackely, commented on the quarters now used by the Juvenile Officer, and said that he felt some more adequate should be made available. The Board noted that they were in agreement with him on this point, but that as things stand presently, there is no other office space available, and until such time as more and better office space is available, all will have to sacrifice on conveniences. Supervisor, Norman W. Jahn, reviewed the history of the Airport expansion program contemplated for 1971. He reported that letters from various users, urging the need for an extended E/W runway have been mailed to the Michigan Department of Aeronautics and that a request for a meeting with said Commission has been requested and should be arranged very shortly. He said that it is hoped that after this meeting that something more definite will be known and plans will then be made accordingly. It was moved by Russell A. Tennant, supported by Thurman Skarritt, Sr., that the report of the Airport Committee Chairman, Norman W. Jahn, be approved. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

Supervisor, Thurman Skarritt, Sr., made a complete and comprehensive report of the U.P. Supervisor's meeting held at Marquette, Michigan on May 5th & 6th, 1969 attended by himself and Lindsey B. Frenette. He reported the review of many subjects of interest; special emphasis being given to law enforcement, pollution, roads, and taxation. It was moved by Ernest Hoholtz, supported by Norman W. Jahn, that the report of Thurman Skarritt, Sr., be accepted. Carried by unanimous vote. The Chairman asked the student counterparts to express themselves on what they thought could and should be done to improve County Government. It was the general consensus of the counterparts that County Government was being efficiently run; and that if more money was available, an even better job could be done. The students were concerned with law enforcement and in particular the rumor that narcotics were being used by some of the school students and they urged immediate and complete crackdown on this vice. The students expressed their support for this type of training in government and urged the continuance of Government Day of Michigan Week.

Mr. Gottfrid S. Johnson, Prosecuting Attorney, reported that he has met with the Thompson Township Supervisor, Floyd C. Sample, and that Mr. Sample has contacted a registered surveyor from Northern Engineering Company of Escanaba, Michigan, and that as soon as they could find time that they would proceed to prepare a "Supervisor's Plat" for the Ash Area, located on the west side of Indian Lake, being part of Government Lots 3 and 4, of Section 31, T4N, R16W.

It was moved by Russell A. Tennant, supported by Edward Jorgensen, that the Board adjourn, Motion carried.

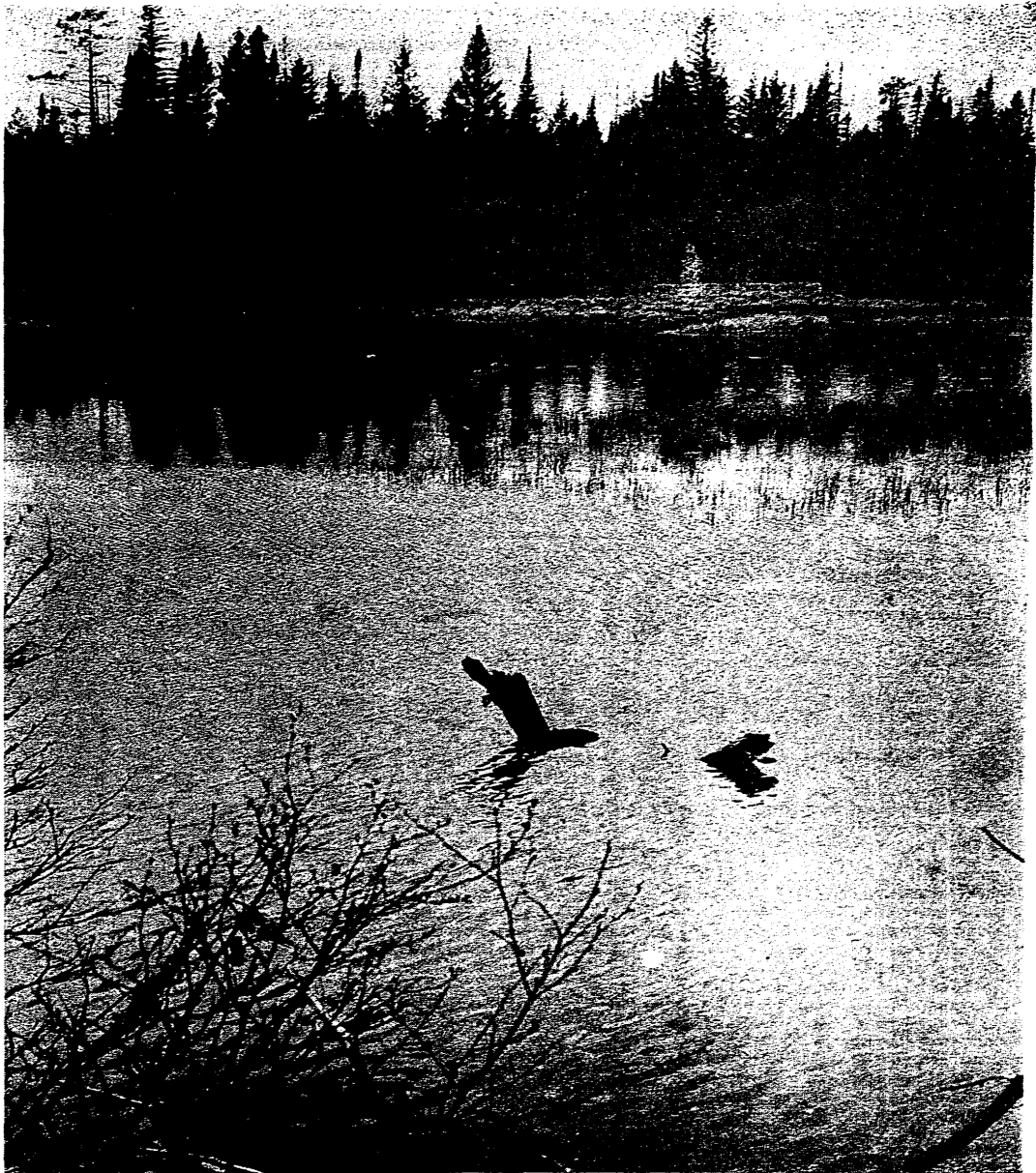

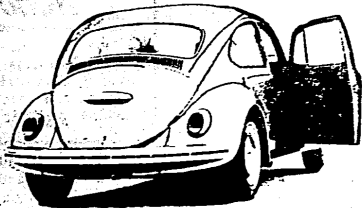

Project SELLS -- See and Enjoy our Land, Lakes, and Streams -- provided an enjoyable source of income to 57 senior citizens in Gogebic and Ontonagon counties and made a distinct contribution to the tourist industry last summer.

The project, funded by the Office of Economic Opportunity,

had as its main purpose the use of senior citizens between the ages of 51 and the mid 80's to show tourists the off-the-beaten-path areas ideally suited for fishing, camping, scenery, rock hunting, and other special interests.

A significant result of the use of senior citizen guides was the tourist reaction to the extra service. According to an article in the January 1969 Michigan Economic Opportunity Office Newsletter:

"Senior citizens acting as hosts for their area created a friendly atmosphere, and chatted with people about the various attractions of the two-county area. A sizable number of tourists decided to stay longer than they had planned in the area, instead of passing through on the main road, which prior to the tourist guide program had in many instances been the custom."

Why not Schoolcraft County?

Isn't one of the greatest complaints from people in the "dying town" of Manistique that tourists drive right on through? One of the few natural resources left in this area is open space ... countryside ... woods ... waters ... elbow room ...

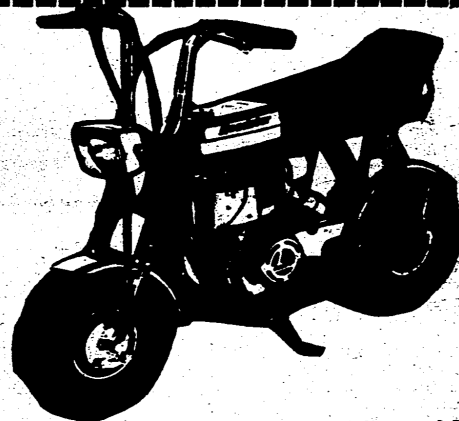

Miss Fleck honored by Ferris State

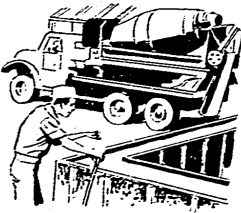

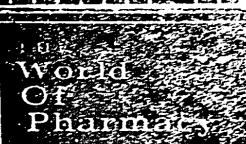

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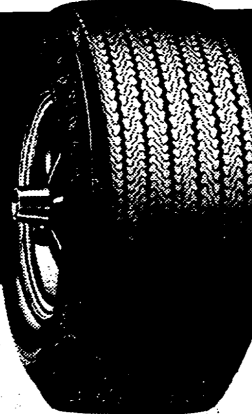
