





# A Loyal American

"A LOYAL AMERICAN" inserted a paid letter to "Fellow Taxpayers" in last week's issue of the local shopping guide and managed to hit a host of targets in the process.

It raised the issues of communism, aetheism, the Supreme Court, school consolidation, church sup-ported schools, student unrest, local control of schools and the possibility of a taxpayer's strike. Certainly these are valid areas of concern, but it is one thing to ask the questions and another to attempt to find the answers.

We are a little leery of taking issue with anyone who labels himself "A Loyal American" because of the risk of automatically being classified as a Disloyal American. We do. however, think it extreme to find a Communist behind every bush and behind every issue, and to equate next Monday's school election with the choice between freedom and communism. "We must vote for new members on the school board for if the control of the schools does not return to the community our children will be taught communism in less than (10) years and no one will dare raise a question or object." the letter said, which is an indirect implication that the present members of the school board advocate com-munism. This will no doubt come as a surprise to most of them.

We would hope that we don't wait 16 years to teach our children communism, along with socialism, fascism, colonialism and democracy, among others. We studied communism 30 years ago in school, and it suffered poorly by comparison with democracy, despite the environment of what we call the Great Depression. Events of the past 30 years have tended to reinforce the conclusions of that youthful study. Everyone who studies Oriental philosophy doesn't end up a Zen Bhuddist; everyone who studies eco-nomics doesn't end up a banker.

We would like to think that all of the present school board members, and all of the five candidates in next week's election, are concerned about the issues mentioned in Loyal American's letter. There may be honest disagreement about the solutions to many of these problems, but that is part of our political process, and it would seem to be presumptious to impugn a person's patriotism or motives merely because of that disagreement.

Loyal American urges return of the control of the schools to the local community. Where does he think the present board members reside? Is he urging that the school board refuse state and Federal aid monies on the premise that control is lost? Is he advocating that the complete cost of the local school system be borne by the local taxpayer? If that is his position the taxpayer's strike he mentioned might become a sudden reality. He urges that church-supported schools be kept open, but he does not say whether the seemingly-tainted state money should be used for this purpose or not.

We applaud anyone with a sincere interest in better education, school financing and taxation, and strong local representation and effective administration. Loyal American does not hold the exclusive franchise on these interests. We are proceeding on the assumption, and we think it valid, that all five with the present members of the board. The alternative would be to assume that these people cared little for democracy, were ready to abandon local participation, and advocated fiscal foolishness. We aren't prepared for that assumption, and we hope the voters in the district are also not prepared, despite the vague innuendoes and insinuations outlined by A Loyal American.

and enjoyed. Included novels, short stories (both those you read recently and those you've read long ago), the movies, the TV programs, the plays and even the poetry if it falls in the fiction category.

Be absolutely honest with yourself. If you enjoyed it -list it. If you didn't -- omit it.

After you've made your list, malyze it for patterns.

I did this recently for a writing assignment, and at 97 ran out of titles, but I did discover that my fiction interests vary more than I thought.

problems -- "Lost Weekend,"
(alcoholism), "The Man with the
Golden Arm" (narcotic addiction), "Suzie Wong," (prostitu-tion), "In Dubious Battle," (mi-grant workers), "Mila 18" (refugees). "The Snake Pit" (mental illness), "The Jungle" (Chital illness), "The Jungle" (Chi-cago stockyards), "Knock on Any Door," (crime and slums), "Confessions of Nat Turner," (slavery), "The Defiant Ones" (race relations), and "Waiting for Lefty" (the Depression). As a contrast there was the

novel of spiritual or human realism, the one which analyzes man's relationship to God or to fellow man based upon something Godlike in him. Some examples are the story of the South American whiskey priest in Graham Greene's"The Power and the Glory," or Steinback's backwash characters with overtones of spirituality in "Tortilla Flat," "Cannery Row" or their concern for each other in "Grapes of Wrath." Saroyan did often with almost a mystic touch; but did it best in "The Human Comedy" and "The Time of Your Life."

Another realism coming up nigh was speculative—the kind that deals with the "what hap-pens if." "Fail Safe" is a good example. What happens if our radar defenses fail and we inadvertently invite an atomic attack, or what happens if the Air Force tries to seize conrol of the country by subter-fuge and violence as in "Seven Days in May," or what happens if there is an atomic attack and the few survivors have to determine what the next set of life on earth is going to be like

But in addition to being a reader of realistic fiction, I discovered to my surprise that I also consume large quantities of humorous fiction, some of it with tinges of romanticism. It was like discovering the obvious, but there was no other conclusion after "Hellza Pop-pin," "Arsenic and Old Lace," "Auntie Mame," "Suds in Your "Treasurer's Report," "The Education of Hyman Kap-"Where are You Going lan," Out, What Did You Do, Nothing "What Makes Sammy Run?"
"Cheaper by the Dozen," "One of Our Brains is Draining," You Can't Take it with You," "Stalag 17," "Hogan's Heroes" the "Beverly Hilbillies" and anything with Don Knotts in it made the list.

after winter's bitterness and spring's fickleness, carries a heady mixture of both open water and a fast-greening land. The sea has its own special smell, even these great inland waters devoid of salt; not a fragrance as comes from the arbutus or iliacs, bul a no-nonsense punguence, a smell that brings the shoutders back and the head up, the eyes look-ing to the far horizon and higher, up among those distant glimmers of other worlds, flickering signals and signposts of a and ordered

vast and ordered universe stretching to the infinity that our mind cannot comprehend. That warming wind also brings the story of deep and fragrant forests reviving of earth and soll stretching sand warming pine needles drying. Only in early summer can that westerly wind, coming across the northern lake and over the long peninsula jutting southward, provide such a combination and mixture of land and sea.

The moon's magic pathway across the water follows you as you pick your way among the driftwood and stones, where the waves' last efforts spend themselves before collapse and withdrawal. It is a time for easing a cramped and tense mind just as much as stretching a cramped and tense leg; a time for reflection and con-jecture, contemplation and eva-luation. The cluttered mind is swept clean, and washed and perfumed by that wind from the west; the troubled eye is soothed in the bathing by the moonlight and black water; the shattered ear is eased by the universal hymn, the constant choruses of wind and water, the uncertain rhythm of the waves playing the part of erratic drummer and

tympani.
It is the time for putting things in perspective, to assign the proper proportions and dimensions to the structure built by man in the face of the universe; a time to acknowledge that as the seasons pass and the planets spin in their orbits man's greatest accomplish-ments must be in his mind; that the measure of man is his music, his poetry, his literature, his art, his philosophy. When measured by the timepiece of the universe, material wonders are transitory illusions that glimmer only briefly in the blaze of our planet's passage that starts with the creation and

ends we know not where.

Man's life is filled with trivia, and the sadness is to con-template the importance tha is placed on the irrelevant; the space that man can find for petty hatreds and lealousies and bigotries and fears; unwelcome cargo that burdens the human carrier by crowding out the basic blessings that could be everyone's if only we had the wit and courage to take them.

We can learn to live with the trivia and the irrelevancies if we can also learn to find the time to look about us; to take ourselves away periodically and look inward as well as outward; to watch the waves and water and moonlight; listen to the wind and water; to breath deep and smell the sea and land about us; to do all this and sort out who we are and what we are, and why we do the things that we do.




