

Flume is repaired

Mill back to full operation

Operations at the Manistique Pulp and Paper Co. should be back to normal by today following a two-week slipflow at the mill due to failure of a thrust bearing in the steam turbine that is the prime mover for the paper machine.

The bearing went out Thursday, Aug. 21, and the mill shut down.

A new turbine had been ordered in February, when first indications of trouble with the bearing appeared. When the shutdown occurred, delivery on the new unit was speeded, and it was installed over the past week end after arriving Saturday, Tuesday the mill was awaiting the arrival of a small but vital governor for the unit, and Frank S. Hololik, president and general manager of the firm, said then he expected full operation to resume in several days.

The shutdown period at the mill was used as an opportunity to make major repairs on the half-mile long flume that carries water from the Manistique River dams to the mill. It was the first chance for major repairs in a long time.

The 165-member work force at the mill was given the opportunity of either working on maintenance, taking vacations, or drawing unemployment compensation, and about half the workers remained on the job, including about a dozen students who had been hired for the summer.

Shutting-down-of-the-flume gave fishermen a field day in the riverbed adjacent to the flume, and large catches were reported during the repair period.

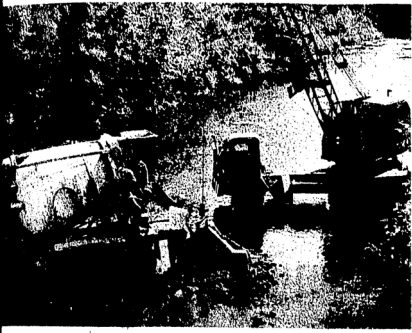

Park attendance continues to climb

Attendance and camping permits issued at area state parks continued to surpass those of last year, the latest compilation for the week ending Aug. 24 revealed.

Indian Lake State Park showed 9,995 camping permits to that date, compared to 9,469 for last year. Attendance for the year total 136,015, compared to 131,237 last year.

At Palms-Book State Park, attendance still lagged slightly, showing 56,638 this year compared to 57,324 last year. Forest State Park, however, registered gains, with 1,630 camping permits issued, compared to 1,606 a year ago, and attendance of 96,730, compared to 79,095 in 1968.

Custodians have been busy

It may have been a summer vacation for teachers and students, but it was the busiest time of the year for Joe Wood, maintenance supervisor at the Manistique Area Schools, and his crew of custodians and workers.

A listing of all work done in the schools has been prepared by Wood in a report to the board of education. Here is a school-by-school summary of what has been done:

FAIRVIEW---Painted two special education rooms, painted all corridors, replaced electric outlet covers in corridor to steel, painted flag pole, installed two new backstops on playground, repaired play-ground equipment, washed all furniture, repaired roofs, repaired toilet partitions, washed broken windows, washed down boilers, checked all plumbing and heating, scrubbed and waxed all floors, scrubbed all windows twice, repaired baseboard in audio-visual room, remodeled kitchen, repaired tables in gym, made shelves in old kitchen for more storage, repaired tile on stage, repaired piano, washed walls in gym, washed walls in locker and shower rooms, repaired floors in boys' shower room, repaired septic tank.

GERMFASK---Painted all corridors, painted one latrine, washed all classroom walls, painted one teacher's desk, washed all furniture, washed all windows, refinished 31 classroom desks, made repairs to heating and ventilators, scrubbed and waxed all rooms, varnished wood in corridor and painted outside doors and under deck entrance.

DOYLE---Washed all walls, washed all windows, varnished wall in kindergarten, washed all furniture and scrubbed shower room walls.

HIGH SCHOOL---Tarred roof, painted inside of all lights, patched and painted in chemistry lab, installed emergency shower and two walls of shelves in chemistry lab, plastered ceiling and painted third floor corridor, washed walls in chemistry lecture room, painted two walls in Room 307, painted back boards and datto in Room 302, painted all stairs and hand rails, painted toilet partitions, painted radiators in wash rooms, replaced tile floor in Rooms 213 and 215, painted rooms 203, 205 and 207, removed glass and installed boards and installed shelves in Room 205, installed tack board in Room 201, painted library storage room and audio-visual room; installed shelves in the audio-visual room and office storage rooms; painted office storage room, remodeled boys' washroom, installed hand rail at west entrance to building, painted staircase walls, the walls in the first floor corridor, all radiators in corridors, the guidance offices and the tack boards in corridors, installed carpet in the library, conference room and guidance offices.

Installed shelves for Community School storage, paneled walls in auditorium, installed new ventilation in auditorium, checked all heating and ventilation and all plumbing, washed all windows and all furniture, refinished all floors in classroom rooms, installed two new night lights in parking lots, improved parking lots, removed all playground equipment, washed all restroom walls, painted faculty room, paneled the ceiling at the guidance area, replaced broken windows, painted flag pole, cast sheeted the entire Junior High gym roof and tarred the new gym roof.

Teachers reject offer

Teachers were on Wednesday morning as usual, despite turning offer from the board on Tuesday afternoon, but are restricting their work to classroom duties only, it was learned.

Williamson, chief negotiator for the Manistique Teachers' Club, an affiliate of the M.E.A., said that the next legal step would be fact-finding by state officials. This would probably not take place for another month, Williamson said. Fact-finding results are made public, but are not legally binding on either party.

Williamson said that the teachers would "continue to teach as usual" despite the stalemate. The vote followed a session with state mediator Walter Quillico last Thursday night. A joint statement at that time from Williamson and Supl. Edwin Wuehle, representing the school board and administration said:

"Despite efforts of a state mediator, local school officials and teachers failed to reach agreement Thursday night on the monetary portions for 1969-70 in the contract between the Manistique Area Schools and the Manistique Teachers Club. School will open as scheduled next Wednesday, with teachers reporting Tuesday. The school board and teachers signed a three-year pact last year, that left monetary items as the only area to be negotiated. These include salaries, pay for extra-curricular activities, and insurance."

"Salaries in the local district last year ranged from \$6,100

for a teacher with a bachelor's degree and no experience to \$9,100 as the top with a Master's degree and nine years experience. There are 77 certified teachers in the local system. The teachers' group is asking a base of \$7,000 with a BA and no experience, with a top salary of \$12,705 for a Master's and 10 years of experience.

Headed the mediation efforts Thursday night were Walter Quillico, mediator from the State Labor Relations Board. The teachers' negotiating team is headed by Earl Williamson, assisted by Stanley Arnold, outgoing president of the local Michigan Education Association chapter, John LaPointe, incoming president, Ruth England, Arvid Larson and Seb Rubick. The school board is represented by President Don Nelson, trustee Ralph Gilman and Wuehle.

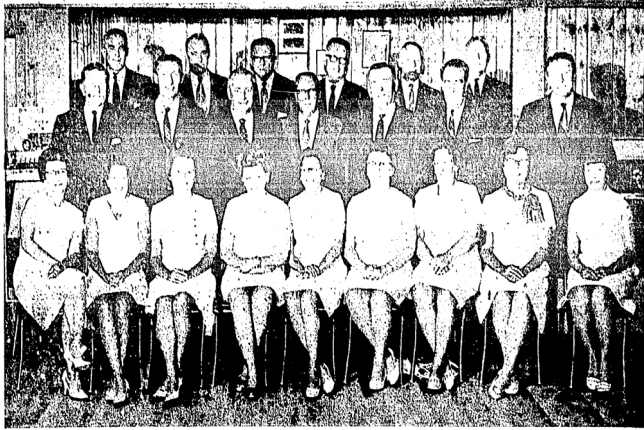

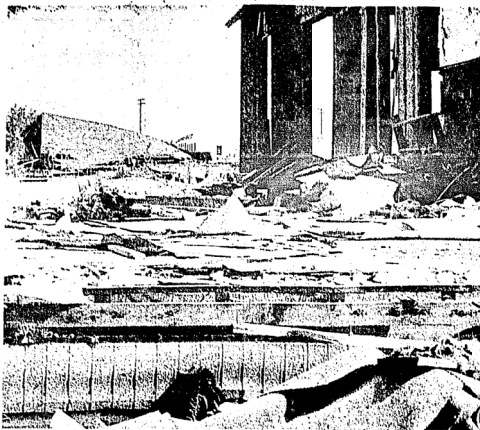

Parents cannot eat for a child; they merely provide the food. If more parents realized this, dinner table problems would be reduced. Children are born with a fifth sense concerning dietetics; that we should cultivate, not criticize. Eating habits vary with each stage of development.

During the first year a child shows preference for certain foods. If allowed, he may select edibles that satisfy particular needs. Dry toast and crackers when teething, meats and cheese after molars appear.

After twelve months, he becomes choosy and independent. This stage must be understood to avoid frustration and worry, as the child settles down to the slower pace of being less hungry, while more selective.

Parents should encourage, not suppress, the child's independence, by letting him pour his own milk and finger his food. This is not neglecting his manners! Children learn by example, and in time adopt the table manners of the parents.

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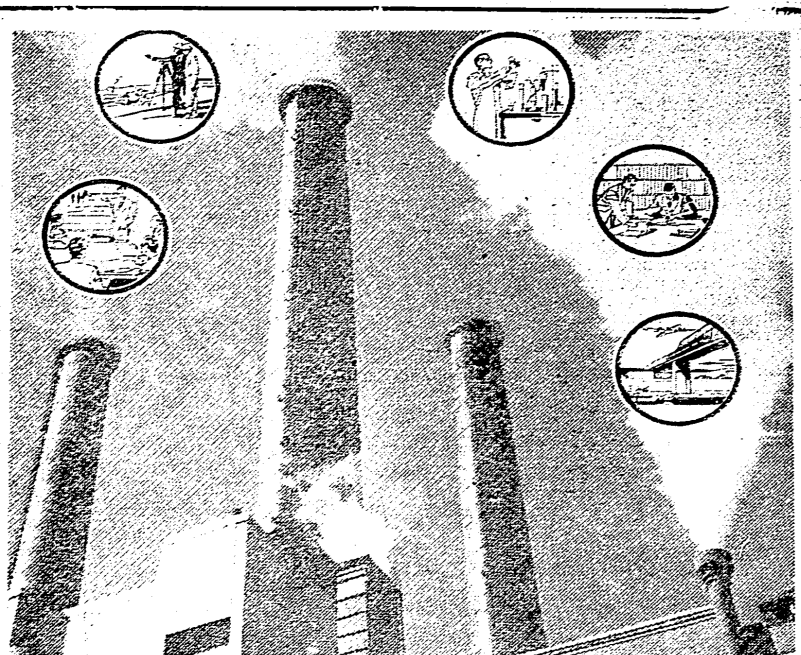
