

Economic potential

AT THIS POINT there is naturally much conjecture about Manistique's economic future and the possibilities of what could result when and if the planned mill expansion becomes a reality.

Initial indications were that the mill could employ up to 500 new workers. What would such an economic boon mean to Manistique and Schoolcraft County? About five years ago governmental economic experts drew up a form chart of sorts to show the impact of 100 new jobs in any community. Using past experience and averages, they estimated that the following would result:

450 new residents.

112 new households. 174 total additional workers employed.

107 more cars registered.

1 more retail establishments.

\$360,000 more annual retail sales.

\$270,000 more bank deposits.

\$590,000 additional personal income in the community.

These estimates, remember, were based on 100 new jobs. What would 500 new jobs mean? Taking the simple route of multiply by five, the figures read:

2,250 new residents.

560 new households.

870 total additional workers employed, 20 more retail establishments.

535 more cars registered.

\$1,800,000 more retail sales. \$1,350,000 more bank deposits.

\$2,950,000 additional personal income in the com-

Too many tourists?

ALONG THE SIDELINES ... with D

Now that Labor Day has gone and passed, the youngsters are oack in school and the tourist and resort operators busily totting up the receipts and dis-. bursements, let's listen to some startling dissidence from Ore-

Some people out there have had the gall to suggest that too many tourists can be too much of a good thing. Hoo boy! The guy to voice such sentiments north of the Straits is apt to be dropped off the Mackinac Bridge in a cement para-chute by the Pastie Pushers and Souvenir Salesmen Local No.

In fact I suppose I run'a risk

of tar and feathers by reprinting such heresy, but a special report from Portland, Ore. in the respected Christian Sci-

ence Monitor says:
"The Oregon State Highway
Commission continues to woo
visitors in colored advertisements in national publications. But commission chairman Glenn Jackson recently startled a Portland audience with critical comment-on such-efforts to bring more people, more tour-ists, and more industry to Ore-

gon. "We may be selling our heritage for a pittance," Mr. Jack-son told a meeting of the Oregon Rural Area Development Committee. Is the gain high

enough to justify the loss of this environment which is the greatest asset Oregon has?'

"Mr. Jackson, who is one of the state's most influential public leaders, pointed out that the state's parks, campgrounds, fishing streams, beaches, and other public recreation areas, are greatly overcrowded. This includes the Oregon State Park System, one of the most ex-tensive in the nation.

"He said there was a con-stant effort to increase faci-Hittes to serve the mounting stream of visitors. This is at a level of 600,000 a year now, more than one-fourth Oregon's resident population. He added that a disproportionate number of these were from California where conditions are even more

The state can absorb more tourists and more industry, Mr. Jackson said, but it must plan carefully to do so without adding intolerably to pollution and other destructive effects on the environment.

"It's the people we've got to deal with," he said, 'Right now 'only a small portion of the public-is'concerned about environmental problems. What is need-ied is for the majority of people to recognize the problems and back up governmental planners in 'helping preserve our en-vironment.'
"Some Oregonians applauded

Mr Jackson's unorthodox comments. Others were critical. Accommodations for tourists is Oregon's third largest industry-behind forest products and agriculture. Some studies have shown that eventually it will be the state's biggest produces of out-of-state dollars. "The proprietors of hotels,

motels, restaurants and other tourist services want no reversal of Oregon tourist pro-motion policy. They would like to have the promotion increas-

ed.
"Dennis Clarke, director of Oregon's Travel Information Division, explains that Oregon must have an ever-growing number of tourists to support such facilities, 'It's simply a matter of economics,' he says.

"But supporters of a reduction in promotion point out that many travel services depend on the attraction of such Ore-gon natural assets as wide, sandy beaches, high mountains, clear streams, and wilderness areas. All these things, they say, are threatened by sharing them too recklessly with visi-

"Mr. Clarke has disclosed that the Travel Information Division, a part of Mr. Jackson's Oregon State Highway Depart-ment, has already changed its advertising policy in the direc-tion indicated by Mr. Jackson,

"He said the division had previously advertised extensively in camping and trailer publications. This has been stopped because of overcrowded camping conditions, he said, and the advertising appeal redirected toward the nation's upper-income families.

"Neither Mr. Jackson nor Mr. Clarke said so directly, but what Oregon officials obviously want is more travelers! dollars but not more tra-velers."

Chew on those ideas for awhile, sports fans.

Last week I had the opportunity to talk to 75 board members and school administrators in Ontonagon and Gogebic County it occurred to me that what I said to them and also to a PTA group in Menominee had really been said here. The topic was the politics of

education, and I quoted freely from Superintendent Robert Spillane from Roosevelt, New York, "If you think politics is a dirty word you're in the wrong business, Today, running a school district is a never-ending quest for power. You've got to have political clout--and lots of it. Being a good ad-ministrator and a good guy ministrator and a good guy isn't enough anymore, People have to know what you've got going for you."

I also quoted editor Jean Worth's "The School Adminis-

trator today should have a deep interest in educational politics and I think in all politics. Any citizen's attitude that its public servants should be political eunuches is an error. Pursued to the ultimate, it could dis-franchise much of the electorate on a pretension of conflict

With two good kick-off quotes. the talk. In the "good old days" administrators subscribed to the idealistically motivated dictum that politics and education

should never mix. This was based on a supposition which was accepted with little scru-tiny. Politics was considered a never-never world which an ed-ucator entered only at great ucator entered only at great risk to his personal integrity. The process of education mysteriously transcended the government process and might be contaminated by exposure to it, and education and legislation had little in common. Those assumptions are not true now, and they never were.

We ought to remember that

every school district in Michigan is really governed by one large school board-the state legislature. If you don't believe it, look at the laws. They regulate the opening day of school, the school calendar, the kin-dergarten age, who may vote, who may be transported, how employees may bargain, how schools may be constructed, who may serve on a board, who may teach, where the money comes from, and the holidays we should observe. (Incidentally, one is Will Carleton's birth-day.)

For a board member or a

school administrator to not be involved in the politics of education is to neglect the very people we have been selected to serve. And that's what it to serve. And that's what I told them at Weber's Lodge in Ontonagon County last week.


