## MP&P announces major expansion

### Community leaders hail "good news"

### Float plane capsizes on Indian Lake

A light plane equipped with pontoons came to grief in windy conditions on Indian Lake Saturday morning, State Police reported. Piloted by Joseph G. Chartier, 49, of 125 S. One wave forced the plane tip into the water, forcing the plane over on its top. The propeller was cracked and wing mechanical parts, but the pilot and his passenger, William Charlier, 13, of 118 S. First St., were not hurt. Two boats pulled the plane back to an upright position and it was pulled back to the safety of the shore.

### US-2 improvement gains support

A strong case in behalf of the improvement of the present US-2 across the Upper Peninsula was made at a meeting Thursday noon at the Fireside. Community leaders and representatives of Constantino-Doxiadis, Associates, planning consultants, participated in the discussion.

Frank Holohik, president and general manager of the Manistique Pulp and Paper Co., in opening the talks pointed out that US-2 in its present condition is a major drawback to the development of this area but that drastically changing the location of the highway would not benefit the Upper Peninsula or its people. He cited as an example the sizeable capital investment that has developed along the present US-2 and the need to build adequate highways where the people live.

### Project is divided into two phases

Manistique's hopes for a bright industrial future look sharp jump upward Tuesday as plans for major expansion were announced by Frank S. Holohik, president and chief executive officer of the Manistique Pulp and Paper Co.

Holohik made his announcement at a luncheon meeting of about 30 local governmental and civic leaders at the Fireside. Part of a five-year improvement program that began with the construction of a new boiler plant several years ago, the new plant is divided into two phases.

Phase I will include the total replacement of all parts on the paper machine that was originally built 50 years ago. Two years ago the mill replaced about half the parts, increasing the speed of the machine from 900 feet per minute to 1,500. The current project, which is scheduled to get underway "immediately," means that every part that was not replaced two years ago will be, and the speed of the machine boosted to 2,200 feet per minute, the equal to any other modern paper machine in the country. The first phase will also include other improvements to existing facilities at the plant.

Phase II is designed to again "substantially increase" the mill's capacity, the announcement said. Engineering studies for this portion of the project are currently underway, Holohik said, but eventually it will involve additional investment in equipment for producing corrugated products.

"I am not in a position at this time to elaborate or go into details on this second phase," Holohik said. "Some things cannot tell you because I do not know the answers. We are still involved in a very detailed engineering survey." He said that it would involve "considerable investment" in plant and machinery, and added that the firm was going to embark on a multi-machine operation because they have garnered the support of the town and of their employees.

The mill's expansion plans come at a time that will allow the firm to tie into the city's expected efforts to comply with new state regulations on wastewater treatment, it was pointed out.

Once the city council agrees to sign the stipulation of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, agreeing to remove 80 per cent of the phosphorus content of the city's wastewater, the mill can join in a cooperative effort to obtain a secondary treatment facility for the city.

Because new jobs are being created by the plant expansion, Federal financing will be available for the project, up to 70 per cent and possibly 80 per cent. The city and the mill would share in the remaining portion.

It was pointed out that the building of a complete secondary wastewater treatment in a cooperative governmental-private industry effort would be a first for the Upper Peninsula and one of the first in Michigan. Creation of such a utility would be a major attraction for new industry because of increasingly stringent requirements on wastewater treatment.

Development of the city's industrial park, offering site and adequate power in addition to the wastewater treatment facilities, would prove a powerful magnet for industrial expansion, it was predicted.

As he outlined his firm's plans for expansion, Holohik said that he wanted to work to help make this a good town. "We can make this a model community in the Upper Peninsula," he said, lauding the cooperative efforts of local leaders who have assisted him in the past.

Holohik said that industry needs to discover the answers to a host of questions in planning expansion, and that while it was a difficult task for existing industry, it was even more complex for those firms planning to completely relocate.

Factors include studies of raw materials, their ownership and transportation costs; the wants and future demands of the consumer; research and investment in modern machinery that will not become obsolete in a few years; the search for money for investment, increasingly difficult in these times of high interest rates; the need for people to run the increasingly sophisticated operations that a changing technology brings; and the support of the people and government of the local community.

He pointed out that this community was extremely fortunate in inducing the late Marshall Field IV to invest in this area and purchase the local mill 10 years ago. Several years ago it became obvious that the local operation could not survive as an antiquated single-machine mill, and the board of directors of Field Enterprises, Inc. was convinced to make the investment in modernization that will allow the local firm and the community to survive and grow.

"Otherwise the mill would have died," he said. "The new expansion program, coupled with the improvements made over the last five years, will complete our modernization and expansion, making Manistique one of the most modern mills in the United States," Holohik said.

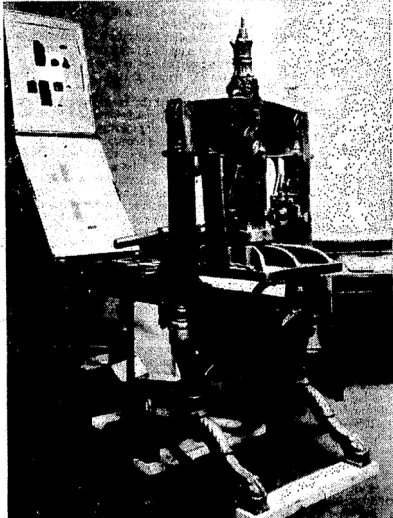

At a regular monthly meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Schoolcraft County, Michigan, held at the Court House in the City of Manistique, Michigan, on Tuesday, September 16, 1969 at 7 o'clock P.M., E.S.T.

The Board was called to order by its Chairman, Lindsley B. Frenette.

Roll was called and noted as follows: Present; Thurman Skarritt, Sr., Russell A. Tennant, Homer J. Weber, Ernest Hoholik, Norman W. Jahn, Edward Jorgenson and Lindsley B. Frenette.

Absent None.

It was moved by Russell A. Tennant, supported by Norman W. Jahn, that the reading of the minutes of the August 19, 1969 Board meeting be waived so as to permit more time for the conduct of the business at hand, and that the minutes as published in the Manistique-Pioneer Tribune, a copy of which was furnished to each Board member, be approved as printed. Carried by unanimous vote.

Mr. Robert Peckham, of Peckham Engineering, 16647 Airport Road, Lansing, Michigan #48006, appeared before the Board and discussed the proposed Airport expansion program contemplated for 1971. He further reviewed the proposed agreement between the County of Schoolcraft and the Peckham Engineering in regard to preparing a master plan report for Schoolcraft County Airport. He reported that if this project was to be funded if the July 1, 1970 appropriation, that phase #1 and phase #2 of the Master Plan must be completed by January 1, 1970.

After a lengthy and thorough discussion on various points and sections of the proposed Master Plan, it was moved by Norman W. Jahn, supported by Edward Jorgenson, that the Chairman and Clerk of the Board, be authorized to sign in behalf of the County of Schoolcraft the proposed Engineering Agreement between the County of Schoolcraft and Peckham Engineering of Lansing, Michigan, authorizing said Engineering firm to proceed with phase #1 and phase #2 of the Master Plan for Schoolcraft County Airport project, for the sum of \$6,698,000. It was further moved that an expenditure from the Airport Operating Fund in the amount not to exceed \$2,000,000, be authorized to be combined with the credit of the County of Schoolcraft now has with the Michigan Department of Aeronautics, which credit is what remains of the last airport expansion project, be used to pay Schoolcraft County's 50% share of the plan. Carried by unanimous vote.

County Treasurer, William E. Cowman, rendered his monthly report of County finances. His response to a question, as to what the financial status of the County will be as of December 31, 1969 was that from present indications, it appears that the County will be in a surplus position as of that date provided no major expenditure is authorized between now and December 31, 1969.

The County Treasurer reported on progress being made by Thompson Township in collection of delinquent personal property taxes. He reported that he has received help and cooperation from both the Prosecuting Attorney and Township Treasurer, and it is expected that the majority of delinquent taxes will be collected in the immediate future.

It was moved by Ernest Hoholik, supported by Thurman Skarritt, Sr., that the following resolution presented by the Hon. John S. Fackley, Judge of Probate, which resolution in similar form was adopted by the U.P. Probate Judges' Association, be adopted. Carried by unanimous vote.

RESOLUTION TO PROVIDE A REVOLVING FUND FOR THE SALE OF DRUGS TO CONVALESCENT PATIENTS AND OUTPATIENTS AT NEWBERRY STATE HOSPITAL.

WHEREAS, for several years the Newberry State Hospital, out of its budget, has provided out-patients and convalescent patients with prescription drugs for treatment of their condition on a cost basis; and

WHEREAS, payments made by the patients for drugs has been returned to the General Fund of the State of Michigan, and that consequently, as a result of budget difficulties at the Newberry State Hospital, the practice of furnishing drugs at cost has been discontinued; and

WHEREAS, it appears that it has been necessary for a substantial number of patients to be returned to the Newberry State Hospital for in-patient treatment because they have failed to follow prescribed drug therapy, and that the inability to obtain drugs at low cost has been contributing factor in the return of these patients; and

WHEREAS, this has resulted in an increased incident of recurring acute mental illness with increased cost to the State of Michigan and to the counties in the Upper Peninsula, and in particular Schoolcraft County.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that a revolving fund be created at Newberry State Hospital, and

That the Board of Supervisors of Schoolcraft County be authorized to make such a revolving fund as provided in the attached resolution.

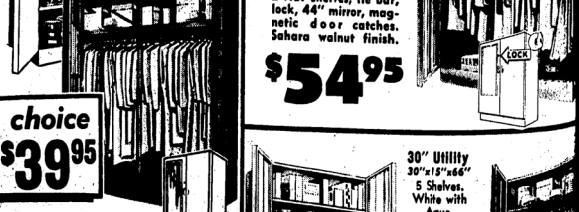

The college is now enrolling students for schooling as dental assistants, with a goal of 15 for the first semester. Some students at the college have been taking related courses like business practice and typing. These can be waived where proficiency already exists.

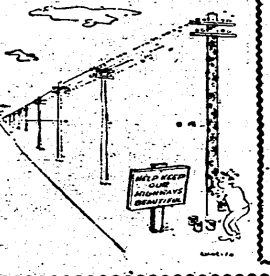
The training of young women for paramedical careers in dental offices will consist of classroom work at the college and clinical work in the CAA Dental Clinic and work experience in the offices of local dentists. Bay College's Dental Assistant Program will observe a state curriculum, which gives graduates, after work experience, a certificate.

At the CAA Dental Clinic in the Bonifas Civic Center, Dr. Sutton is taking over a children's dental health facility which was started more than four years ago by the Escanaba Exchange Club and which has been "adopted" by the CAA with assists from the Blesch Fund of Menominee, the area social welfare and public health services and with continuing support from the original sponsor, the Exchange Club.

The Clinic will be open from 8 to 5 daily 5 days a week. It has completed treatment on more than 900 children in the past two years under CAA sponsorship.

Legal Notice

Warmwater Fish Regulations (State-wide)

The Natural Resources Commission, under Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, rescinds the order of September 5, 1968, and orders that for a period of five years beginning October fifteen, 1969, it shall be unlawful to catch or attempt to take in any manner the following named species except during the open seasons prescribed and within the maximum daily limits designated:

State-wide open seasons on all waters not otherwise closed to fishing shall be from May thirtieth through December thirty-first on largemouth and smallmouth bass; May fifteenth through all of February on walleye, sauger, northern pike, and

...shall be five stringer or in combination for largemouth and smallmouth bass, walleye, sauger, and northern pike; one for muskellunge (including tiger muskellunge), and ten for white bass.

The above regulations apply except that walleye, muskellunge, and northern pike may be taken in that upper portion of Lake Huron known as Whitefish Bay, Pike Bay, Island Harbor, Les Cheneaux Channels, Pigeon-Annis Bay, and certain waters on the south side of Drummond Island from the first through March thirty-first of each year; that bass may be taken on Lake St. Clair, St. Clair and Detroit rivers before the last Saturday in June of each year; and that muskellunge in Lake St. Clair, St. Clair and Detroit rivers may be taken only from the first Saturday in June through December fifteenth of each year.
