# ${\it Negotiations}$ issue

IT'S AMAZING how naive most school board members and professional educators are when it comes to the area of collective bargaining.

They've had three years since Michigan teachers were given the chance to operate like a labor union, but in that span of time it's been the teachers who have learned how to bargain and negotiate, while school boards and administrators are still largely confused as to what their exact role should be.

This makes for some rather one-sided bargaining, as you might expect, and as you could de-termine by computing the gigantic gains made by teachers during those three years.

Delegates to the annual school boards and administrators convention in Detroit last week held a panel discussion on communications during negotiations. The discussion was helpful, as far as it went, but it was interesting to note that while the panel included school adminstrators, a board member, a negotiator and several public relations people, there were no representatives of the mass media included. Thus their discussions tended to resemble conferences on how to care for the patient without consulting the doctor. Lots of good ideas but no professional, technical advice.

There is an unfortunate tendency to compare public employee negotiations to those conducted by industry and labor. There are certainly enough similarities to do some comparing, but it should be remembered that the game is being played with a different set of rules, and that manage-ment—or the administrators—has to answer to the entire public instead of a group of stockholders.

GM and the UAW can wrestle in secrecy or in print and on the air, as they choose. The public, on the other hand, has a direct and personal inst in teacher contract negotiations, because in the long run it is their tax dollar that will be used to pay for the result of those negotiations.

On the other hand, it is obviously impossible to negotiate effectively in public. Trying to agree on a contract in a goldfish bowl could easily prove to be impossible and most responsible media would be reluctant to try and report completely and objectively on every proposal, counter-proposal, charge and claim that come up during negotia-

Because the schools are a public institution, they depend on public trust and confidence and support. Teachers, just as much as administrators and school board members, are a part of gaining and keeping that confidence. If every detail of the unpleasantness of negotiating—and there is un-pleasantness—is reported, it will tend to erode public confidence in the entire educational system.

A system of guidelines is needed badly if school hoards and teachers are to continue their collective bargaining. We qualify that with an if because at this writing Gov. Milliken's proposed educational reforms are not yet public. It is conceivable that any reform package might utilimately lead to statewide bargaining and uniform salary schedules, similar to civil service. This, of course, is just another loss of local control over the public schools, yet if boards and teachers continue to find it impossible to negotiate, it could easily come

If negotiations are to continue at the local level, then some effective way should be found to report on their progress and on what the issues at stake


